- 2. How does Mara's painting reflect her emotions?
- 3. What is her perspective on storms, and how is it different from her brother's?

### After Reading Discussion Questions

- 1. What does the figurative language in the story tell you about Mara as a person?
- 2. Why is it powerful to describe things like emotions through nature or the sky?
- 3. How do similes and metaphors help readers feel more connected to the story?

#### **Activity Idea**

Invite students to create a mini "cloud journal" with one illustration and a short poem or description using at least two similes or metaphors to describe a weather scene (storm, sunset, snow, etc.). Then share how their figurative language changes the mood of their writing.
