Before Reading Discussion Questions

- 1. Have you ever imagined what it would be like to explore something lost underwater?
- 2. What kinds of places or objects might remain hidden beneath the ocean?
- 3. How do visuals or sound effects help tell stories in movies or read-alouds?

During Reading Discussion Questions

- 1. What details about the theater show it used to be important?
- 2. How does Jasper react to finding the name "Rivera"?
- 3. What makes the moment with the piano feel magical?

After Reading Discussion Questions

- 1. How would an illustration help the reader understand the inside of the theater?
- 2. Why is it important to Jasper that his family is connected to the theater?
- 3. If you turned this story into a short film, what sounds, colors, or images would you use?

Activity Idea

Have students create a diorama or digital model of the underwater theater, using materials like foil (for jellyfish), fabric scraps (for curtains), and small stones (for seats). Ask them to label or highlight magical elements from the story and explain how these would be shown in an illustrated or oral version of the tale.
