- 2. How does her mood change after finding the tower room and notebook?
- 3. What details from the journal help her feel less alone?

After Reading Discussion Questions

- 1. What is the theme of this story, and how is it revealed through Adeline's journey?
- 2. How do the past and present connect through the tower room?
- 3. How does writing her own entry help Adeline grow?

Activity Idea

Have students design their own "comfort room"—real or imagined—and write a journal entry from a character who finds peace there during a time of change. Encourage them to include emotional details that connect to a meaningful theme.
