During Reading Discussion Questions

- 1. Why hasn't Carla finished the puzzle?
- 2. What does Mr. Lopez notice about Carla?
- 3. What happens when Carla agrees to sketch for the mural?

After Reading Discussion Questions

- 1. How do we know Carla is starting to feel differently by the end?
- 2. What specific lines or moments show she's changing?
- 3. How can placing a puzzle piece be more than just finishing a game?

Activity Idea

Invite students to write a "puzzle piece journal entry" from Carla's point of view the night after she says yes to the mural project. They must include one quote from the story and one inferred thought that's not directly stated in the text.
