- 1. What are Maya and Ezra trying to figure out?
- 2. How does the footprint clue help move the mystery forward?
- 3. What is surprising about Theo's role in the story?

After Reading Discussion Questions

- 1. How does each scene contribute to solving the problem?
- What would the story lose if the ending scene hadn't been included?
- 3. What message do you think the author wanted readers to learn?

Activity Idea

Have students rewrite the story from Theo's point of view, organizing it into five scenes. This helps them reflect on structure, perspective, and how details shape a reader's understanding.
