Before Reading Discussion Questions

- 1. What do you already know about how people used to travel in harsh weather without modern tools?
- 2. Have you ever read a survival story? What makes it exciting or suspenseful?
- 3. What does a story's structure do to help you understand the events clearly?

During Reading Discussion Questions

- 1. What choices do Jakob and Ella make to survive the storm?
- 2. How do the characters respond differently to the danger?
- 3. What clues in the text show how cold and dangerous the storm was?

After Reading Discussion Questions

- 1. How did the author use each scene to build toward a moment of relief and hope?
- 2. What might have happened if the story skipped one of the middle scenes?
- What does the story's structure teach you about patience, teamwork, or survival?

Activity Idea

Ask students to storyboard their own five-part survival tale using the same structure. They can illustrate or describe each "scene" and explain how one part builds to the next, showing problem, tension, and resolution.
