Before Reading Discussion Questions

- 1. What kinds of adventures or mysteries have you read that happen in everyday places?
- 2. What does it mean when a story is told in third person?
- 3. How do you think it changes a story if we hear more than one character's thoughts?

During Reading Discussion Questions

- 1. What does Tasha feel when she discovers the floorboard is hollow?
- 2. How does Nico's reaction differ from Tasha's?
- 3. Why is it important that we see both perspectives?

After Reading Discussion Questions

- 1. How does the third-person omniscient narrator influence how we view the characters?
- What might have been misunderstood if the story was told from just one perspective?
- 3. Why is it useful to understand the point of view when reading a story?

Activity Idea

Invite students to write a short retelling of one scene using third-person **limited** from either Tasha's or Nico's view. Then compare how it feels different when the narrator only shares one character's thoughts.
