
Read the short story and answer each question.

Introducing the Text

After reading, we will discuss the theme and summarize the main events of the story."

Before Reading Discussion Questions

- 1. What do you think it means to make a difficult decision?
- 2. Can you think of a time when you had to choose between what was easy and what was right?
- 3. What challenges might someone face in a futuristic society?

During Reading Discussion Questions

- 1. How does Zane feel about the command given to him by the Supreme Leader?
- 2. What do Zane's actions tell us about his character?
- 3. Why do you think the author uses the futuristic setting to explore the theme of justice and leadership?

After Reading Discussion Questions

- 1. What is the theme of the story? How do Zane's actions support this theme?
- 2. How does the author show the internal conflict Zane faces?
- 3. How would the story have been different if Zane had followed the command without question?

Activity Idea

Have students write a short letter from Zane's perspective to a close friend, explaining his decision. In the letter, they should describe the internal struggle he faces, his thoughts on justice, and why he ultimately chooses to make his own decision. Encourage them to use quotes from the text to support his feelings and reasoning. This activity will help reinforce understanding of character development and theme.
