Before Reading

After Reading

- 2. Why do you think Mark helped with the cart instead of waiting?
- 3. What might happen next on the farm?
- 4. Skill Mastery: Find 5 words in the story that end in -rt or -rk
- 5. Fluency Tip: Try reading this again like you are giving directions on a farm!
