Before Reading

1. We'll look for -mp words like camp, damp, and stump.

- 2. Have you ever been on a nature walk or hike?
- 3. What things might a guide show at a swamp?

During Reading

- Sounding Out Support: Break the word into two parts—short vowel + -mp ending: da...mp → damp
- 2. Watch for -mp words like *swamp*, *camp*, and *stump*
- 3. What is one thing Lex points out to the group?
- 4. Use a calm and smart tone when reading Lex's lines.

After Reading

- 1. Can you name three things the kids saw at swamp camp?
- 2. Why do you think they needed a guide like Lex?
- 3. Would you want to go to swamp camp? Why or why not?
- 4. Skill Mastery: Highlight 5 words in the story that end in -mp
- 5. **Fluency Tip:** Try reading the story like you're teaching a group of campers!

Activity Idea

Create a "Swamp Camp Field Guide" using paper and markers. Have students draw and label items from the story like *map*, *stump*, *frog*, and *moss*. Then write one sentence about each item using -mp words.
