Before Reading

During Reading

- 1. **Sounding Out Support:** Remind kids to try the long /ī/ sound when they see 'igh.'
- 2. Watch for 'igh' words and stretch them out slowly.
- 3. What happened when the wind picked up?
- 4. Try reading the judges' words with lots of excitement!

After Reading

- 1. Can you retell how Miles made his kite the brightest?
- 2. Why do you think the judges loved his kite so much?
- 3. Would you like to be in a kite-flying contest? Why or why not?
- 4. Skill mastery prompt: "Find and underline 5 'igh' words in the story!"
