Before Reading

- 1. Remind them of the target skill: Today's story uses sh, th, ch, and wh at the beginning of words.
- 2. Have you ever gone on a cold-weather trip? What did you pack?
- 3. What can happen if you hit a rock on a sled?

During Reading

- 1. **Sounding Out Support:** For tricky words, ask the child to point to the beginning digraph and say the sound first, then blend.
- 2. Watch for words with the target sounds at the beginning.
- 3. What made Chad fall into the slush?
- 4. Try reading the part about the crash with excitement in your voice!

After Reading

- 1. What happened at the start, middle, and end of the story?
- 2. Why do you think Chad smelled fish at the end?
- 3. Was this a fun trip or a messy trip? What clues helped you decide?
- 4. Circle 5 digraph words that start with sh, th, ch, or wh.
- 5. **Fluency Tip:** Try reading the story again like you're telling it to a friend who wasn't there!

Activity Idea

Draw a sledding scene showing what happened to Whit and Chad. Label items with digraph words from the story (like *chill, chips, sled, whiff,* or *thud*). Then write one or two sentences about what could happen next using at least one new digraph word.

Point out patterns as kids read—when they recognize how digraphs work, they start to unlock new reading confidence with every word.
