Before Reading

During Reading

- 1. **Sounding Out Support:** Support your reader by covering word parts—start with the digraph (like "ch" in *chimp*), then blend the rest.
- 2. Watch for beginning digraphs and animal action words.
- 3. What do chimps do to talk to each other?
- 4. Read the sound words like *chirp* and *whinny* with expression!

After Reading

- 1. What are three ways chimps chat?
- 2. Why do chimps need to help each other in a group?
- 3. How did this story change what you thought about animals and communication?
- 4. Highlight 5 digraph words that show chimp actions or behavior.
- 5. **Fluency Tip:** Read the story again using actions or sound effects where you can!
