Before Reading

During Reading

- 1. **Sounding Out Support:** Guide your child to stretch long vowel sounds in "ue," "oa," "ow," and "ai" words like *clue*, *stone*, and *name*.
- 2. Watch for vowel team words that describe setting, clues, and actions
- 3. What does Sage do with the clue?
- 4. Read the final line with suspense and wonder

After Reading

- 1. Retell what Sage found, read, and did at the gate
- 2. Why do you think the author used words like "glow" and "clue"?
- 3. What might the glowing path lead to in the next chapter?
- 4. Skill Check: Highlight six mixed long vowel team words from the story
- 5. **Fluency Tip:** Read it again slowly and thoughtfully, like a mystery story with big clues hidden in every line
