Before Reading

1. Remind them of the target skill: "We're working on words where 'ea' and 'ee' say the /ē/ sound!"

- 2. Have you ever been to a parade? What do you remember about it?
- 3. What would you like to see in a parade float?

During Reading

- 1. **Sounding Out Support:** Remind kids to try the long /ē/ sound when they see 'ea' and 'ee.'
- 2. Watch for 'ea' and 'ee' words and try sounding them out slowly.
- 3. What did Lee and Bea add to their float to make it glow?
- 4. Try reading the part where the crowd cheers in a loud, excited voice!

After Reading

- 1. Can you retell what happened at the parade?
- 2. Why do you think Lee and Bea wanted their float to shine brightly?
- 3. Would you rather watch a parade or be in one? Why?
- 4. Skill mastery prompt: "Highlight 5 'ea' or 'ee' words in the story!"
- 5. **Fluency Tip:** Try reading the story again like you're announcing the parade to a big crowd!

Activity Idea
