High-Frequency Words: the, said, was, in, to, get

Before Reading

1. Remind your reader that short e says “eh” like in *red*.
 2. Have you ever found something strange in a tent?
 3. What do you think could be inside a mystery box?

During Reading

1. Sounding Out Support: Help students spot common CVCs like *met*, *wet*, *pen*
 2. Watch for words that rhyme or look similar
 3. What did Wes find in the tent?
 4. Read Wes and Jen’s lines with surprise and curiosity

After Reading

1. Retell the story with the setting, problem, and solution
 2. Why do you think the map was important?
 3. Would you go into a mystery tent like Wes and Jen did? Why or why not?
 4. Find and read 5 short e words.
 5. Fluency Tip: Read the story like you are telling a spooky secret!

Create your own mystery box and draw 3 short e items that could be inside.
