

Before Reading

During Reading

- 1. **Sounding Out Support:** Remind your child that "ea" usually says long E, especially in words like "meal" and "team."
- 2. Watch for ea words that describe food and how seals hunt
- 3. What do seals eat, and how do they catch it?
- 4. Read the sentence about team hunting like you're narrating a nature show

After Reading

- 1. Retell the types of food seals eat and how they get it
- 2. Why do some seals hunt in a team instead of alone?
- 3. What would you ask a seal scientist if you could?
- 4. Skill Check: Circle six ea words in the passage
- 5. Fluency Tip: Read it again like you're teaching a fun animal fact to your class!
