What Is a Theme?

A theme is the big idea behind a story or piece of art.

It tells what the work is really about.

A theme can be love, hope, peace, or change.

In books, these ideas are shown through what people do and say.

In art, the theme might come from color, shape, or scene.

Some themes are clear. Others are hidden and deep.

These ideas help complete what the writer or artist wants to share.

After reading the story, have your child point to and slowly sound out each practice word.

Before Reading

- 1. Tell your child that today's nonfiction text will use e—e words like "theme" and "complete" to explain big ideas in writing and art.

During Reading

- 1. **Sounding Out Support:** Stop at tricky e–e words like "theme" and "scene." Help your child say the long E sound and notice the silent E at the end.
- 2. Watch for e-e words that name ideas and how they are shown
- 3. What are some examples of themes from the story?
- 4. Read the final line with a thoughtful, serious voice
