Why We Need Daylight

Daylight is the light from the sun during the day. We need daylight to stay healthy and strong.

Plants need daylight to grow. They take in light to make food. Without daylight, plants would turn gray and dry.

People also need daylight. Daylight helps our brains know when to wake and when to sleep.

Daylight keeps us warm, too. Even on a cold day, the sun's rays can help warm the air.

So the next time you play outside, think about how the bright daylight helps plants, animals, and you!

Before Reading
