# June 9th Meeting

## **Speaker BIO**

Christopher Satch is a Professor at the New York Botanical Gardens, as well as the CEO and Founder of <u>NYC Plant Help</u>, a horticultural consultancy for indoor and outdoor growers in the greater New York area.

Having been featured on NPR, the Wall Street Journal, Architectural Digest,

and more, Christopher breaks down the science behind growing plants and explains how plants grow in human-understandable terms. Having specialized in plant physiology and pathology, you can ask him any orchid question, and he will know the answer.

Chris is a member of the American Orchid Society Education Committee, and grows over 200 plants on windowsills, in terrariums, and more in his tiny Manhattan apartment. His favorite orchids are Miltoniopsis, Lepanthes, and anything else that's either odd or fragrant.

#### **Paphiopedilum** air Orchids 'Slippers' in NJ = Phragmipedium it gets at night). WATERING: Need to dry out between waterings. P3 group: P4 group: Check each species, some vary seasonally. P1, 2, 5 & 6: Do NOT let these dry out. Drench when watering. Water again when still moist. Cut back only slightly in Dec-Jan. P8: Similar to P1, but wants even more water. P9: These plants do best when standing permanently These two genera are Old World (Paphs) & New World (Phrags) 'cousins'. Paphs flowers last 6-12 weeks. in a tray with 2-3" deep water. P2, P3, P5 & P6 prefer temperatures 5-10°F (3-6°C) **BUD INITIATION:** warmer than the others. Requires 2-3 weeks with cooler night temperatures. If you grow outdoors in summer, this happens automatically in P4: Look up each species. Some come from a warm late September = blooms in February/March. & humid environment. Some need those conditions in summer, but require cool, bright & rather dry conditions in winter (micranthum). In north/central NJ plants can be outdoors from Me-
