An account of forgiving (drawing from Aquinas) as an act of love by which enemies are made friends, with arguments that other contemporary views do not capture what forgiving centrally is.

# For Yourself Alone (under review)

An argument that the central reason to love someone is simply who she is.

# Against the Partnership View (under review)

A brief argument against the view that what love pursues are the beloved's ends (rather than her good).

# Forgiveness and Respect

A catalogue of objections to (unconditional) forgiveness from norms of respect, with arguments that none of them successfully establishes a reason not to forgive.

# Puddleglum's Stand

An examination of an argument structure in which one endorses a practical conclusion despite uncertainty about its theoretical grounds, with applications in philosophy of religion and metaethics.

# Meaning in Immortal Lives

An investigation of the possibility that a life which does not end could still have a meaning, drawing from Aristotle's *Poetics*, with implications for lives that do end.

## The Mechanisms of Redemption

An examination of the possibility of redemption—drawing good from evil—and an account of how it could work, applied to the problem of evil.

#### A Brief Clarification of Sub Specie Boni

An argument that the Guise of the Good thesis can only be convincingly articulated within a classical (or nearly classical) moral-psychological framework.
