

Basic Principles:

Follow the Rs to reduce plastic waste: Refuse, Reduce, Reuse, Repair, Repurpose, Recycle.

Local resources:

- **Second hand** store: Nearly New, Facebook groups: Buy Nothing Chelsea, QC and Chelsea Quebec Buy & Sell, The Wakefield dishes library.
- Bring **clean styrofoam** to StyroRail inc. in Wakefield for recycling.

Educational:

- Learn more about plastics and our plastic waste on **credible websites** such as Canada Statistics, Environment Canada Canada Plastic Pacts, Government of Canada's Zero Plastic Waste Policy.
- Check out the **Chelsea library for books on tips** and information to reduce plastic waste. Currently, they have a special display on this topic.



- Choose reusable and plastic free products such as mugs, food containers, shopping and vegetable bags.
- Use your items for longer. **Mend** your clothes.
- Participate in your local waste management program and recycle.
- Do not use plastic garbage and recycling bags, rather **put your garbage directly** into the brown and blue bin.
- There is no need to use cling wrap to cover food items. Use e.g., waxed cloth wrappers or a plate over a dish. You can make waxed food wrappers and bowl covers from old clothing. Check with our sewing group for instructions.
- **Reuse old glass containers** from e.g., pasta sauce, pickles and jam as bulk food containers to store home-made salad dressings, dips and other items.
- Use **reusable storage containers** made out of glass or ceramic. If plastic is needed, choose a recyclable option. **Wash out and reuse containers** and bags instead of buying new ones.
- Make tea from loose leaves and herbs. Research has shown one tea bag can release millions of microplastic particles in a single cup of tea. If you buy tea bags, make sure the tea bags are plastic free. Some plastic free tea brands are:

 Yogi, Pukka, Stash and Republic of Tea.

Easy Steps to Reduce Plastic Waste Away From Home

- Bring your **own cup** for take-out coffee, tea, etc. Make sure to use a **reusable** cup in the coffee shop rather than disposable paper cups that typically also have a thin plastic coating. Because of that no coffee cup yet is completely compostable.
- Avoid buying small quantities of items wrapped in plastic. Choose larger quantities and non-plastic packaging.
- Buy in bulk and unpackaged. Bring your reusable containers and bags as much as possible. There are several stores that are set-up to weigh the containers you bring, e.g. La Forêt in Wakefield, the Bulk Barn, and Zero Waste in Ottawa. The Brunet Pharmacy in Wakefield offers bulk detergents and cleaning products.
- Engage with your local store to provide plastic free solutions and less plastic packaging, for example: unwrapped food products (grocery stores) and natural fiber fabrics (clothes stores). Promote and support businesses which actively reduce their plastic footprint.
- Buy vegetables without plastic wrapping and store them in reusable containers in the fridge. They also tend to keep longer stored in this manner. Bring your own reusable plastic-free vegetable bag. Check with our sewing group on how to make them using old clothes







Easy Steps to Reduce Plastic Waste



Clothing

- Clothes and other fabrics are increasingly made of synthetic materials. Synthetic materials are prone to release microplastics upon washing and drying. **Purchase natural fiber clothes** (like linen, cotton, wool) when possible, although purchasing less overall is the best option.
- Check out **second hand stores** before you purchase new items.
- If you need to wash synthetic materials on the cold cycle, **install a filter** to collect microplastics.
- Go back to using **washable cotton handkerchiefs** rather than paper ones that are sold in plastic packages. Check out our sewing group on how to make your own hankies from old clothes.

Soap, Dental and Cosmetics:

- Solid soap and powdered laundry and dishwashing detergent are available in plastic free packaging.
- Choose biodegradable cosmetics, toothpastes and soap free of microplastics. Plastic-free tooth floss is available from at least one Canadian company.

Garden:

Are you a gardener? Consider having soil delivered in bulk to your house rather than buying individual bags.

Used egg cartons can be repurposed to start seedlings instead of plastic containers.
