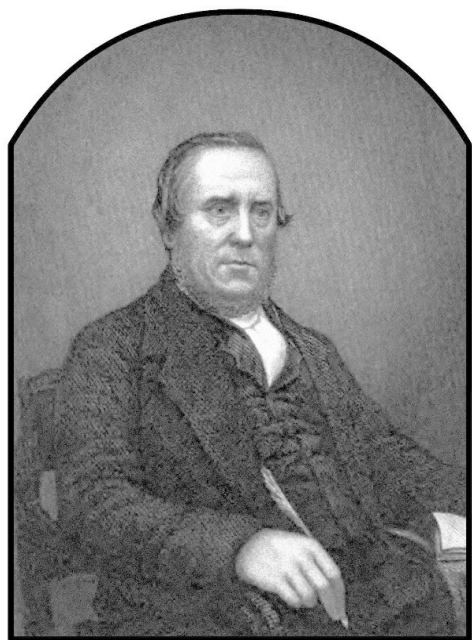

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## PUBLISHER'S PREFACE

The causes of sorrow are manifold in this life. Indeed, the Scriptures remind us that "Man is born to trouble as the sparks fly upward." (Job 5:7). Living as a sinner, among other sinners, in the midst of a sin-cursed world, means that suffering is inevitable for every one of us. We endure the loss of friends, possessions and employment. We suffer bereavements, illnesses and harsh mistreatment by others. Poverty, pain and death eventually comes to all of us.

Yet these physical sorrows are only a portion of what the Lord calls His own people to endure. For the redeemed also face great spiritual battles that the unbeliever knows nothing about. We fight against the sin that still remains in our own heart. We strive to resist temptations that come our way, and are stricken in our conscience when we fail. If we persist in our rebellion, we feel the painful rod of God's discipline. And perhaps worst of all, we start to entertain doubts about God and His character when we pass through the hard trials that He has ordained for us.

But thankfully, as Pastor Smith reminds us in this book, God remains the same faithful and compassionate Father to us throughout all our times of sorrow, whatever they may be. Though our hearts may be fickle, His love for us is unwavering. His promises remain sure and certain, even in the most uncertain of

times. Indeed, whatever may be the cause of our sorrow, He remains our ever present help in times of trouble. He will certainly supply us with all that we need to make it through our seasons of sorrow.

In this new edition, only a few minor alterations were made to Pastor Smith's original work. Bible references have been added to the text in those places where quotes and allusions to the Scriptures occur. Some punctuation has also been updated and a small number of very long sentences have been broken up into smaller ones. On rare occasions, words with archaic meanings have been replaced with a modern equivalent, and British spelling has been preferred throughout.

Some extra material has also been included in this new edition which may be of interest to the reader. This includes a short biography of Pastor Smith ("About the Author"), a timeline of his life and a list of his major works. Most of this information has been gleaned from his autobiography *Marvellous Mercy*. Above the title of each devotion is also an additional Bible passage. This serves as a suggested Scripture reading which may be read prior to the devotion itself.

May the Triune God, then, be pleased to bless this new edition of *Words of Comfort* to every reader who is struggling through difficult times. May He use it to remind you that in Him, you have a Father who loves you far more than any earthly father loves his own children. In the Son, you have a sympathetic Saviour

He will treat thee tenderly and lovingly. He observes the effect produced on thy nerves, and on thy soul. He will fulfil His precious

promises in thy experience, and looking to Him, trusting in Him, and pleading with Him, you will obtain strength, comfort, and victory.

Sweet thought, Jesus is with me — that Jesus who suffered and died for me — that Jesus who is my advocate with the Father (1 John 2:1), and who ever liveth to make intercession for me (Heb. 7:25) — *that* Jesus who is preparing for me a place in His Father's house, and who will soon come and receive me to Himself (John 14:2-3).

## SUFFERING MITIGATED

UR AFFLICTIONS ON earth are compared to the winds of heaven. They are powerful, searching, and calculated to excite alarm. But our heavenly Father holds the winds in His hand, and only suffers them to blow as He pleases. He has a purpose to answer by every blast, and always watches its working and its effect.

He will not lay on us more than we are able to bear. If He increase the affliction, He will increase the strength. We may be tossed about, but we shall never be torn from the rock. Our anchor will hold us fast, our cable will never snap. Our place of refuge is sure, for it is founded on a rock — or rather, it is the Rock itself: “God is our refuge and strength, a very present help in trouble.” (Ps. 46:1) Our great refiner sits by while we are in the furnace. He regulates the heat, and superintends the whole process of purification. He will not suffer us to be tempted or tried above that we are able, but will with the temptation make a way for our escape, that we may be able to bear it (1 Cor. 10:13).

My afflicted brother, cheer up! There is a limit set to the power and duration of thy afflictions. If the biting east wind blow, the noisy rough wind shall be

stayed. The grace of Jesus is sufficient for thee, and His strength will be made perfect in weakness (2 Cor. 12:9).

Fear not, faint not. As thy days, so shall thy strength be (Deut. 33:25), and thy present afflictions will be seen to be blessings by-and-by. Thy present sufferings are for thy future good. Many now in glory have passed through the same, and many now on the road are experiencing the same pains, the same depressions, and the same sorrows. Cheer up, then, for thy present afflictions will sweeten the joys of heaven, and heighten the brightness of glory.

It instructed me, and taught me to know more of myself and of my God than I ever knew before. It softened me, and brought me to lie low before God. It weaned me from the world. It corrected many of my foolish notions, and it made heaven appear ten times more precious and glorious. The affliction that brings us to the feet of Jesus, gives us sober views of all earthly things, and stirs us up to make our calling and election sure (2 Pet. 1:10), always does us good.

God's sweetest smiles, His choicest cordials, and His kindest visits are granted us in seasons of affliction. Let us, therefore, seek grace to sanctify our affliction, and to make every pain, privation, and sorrow a blessing. Let us humble ourselves under the

mighty hand of God (1 Pet. 5:6), acknowledge His justice, grace, and faithfulness in afflicting us, and so when we come out of the furnace, we also shall be able to bear this testimony, “It is good for me that I have been afflicted.”

Merciful Lord, with every affliction give us special grace, that we may thereby learn Thy truth, prefer Thy will, observe Thy precepts, and seek Thy glory! Oh, may all our afflictions prove real blessings to our souls. Sanctify us *in* trouble, and sanctify us *by* trouble, to Thy praise.

*He will have mercy upon him; and to our God, for He will abundantly pardon,” (Isa. 55:7).*

Oh, precious assurance, let us not doubt it! Oh, sweet invitation, let us avail ourselves of it! This is what God wishes us to do. He desires to manifest His love afresh — to fold us in the arms of His mercy, and feast us with the provisions of His grace. Let us, then, approach Him, plead with Him, and then shall we have to exclaim:

**I**T IS A WONDER of wonders, that God should love sinners, such sinners as we are. And yet it is a glorious fact. Nothing is more clearly revealed in the word, and yet nothing is more difficult to believe sometimes. When our souls are in darkness, when our temporal affairs are in confusion, and when our bodies are in pain, it is not easy to believe then that God loves us, and that our very trials flow from, and are a proof of, His love.

Yes, God loves His people, not because He sees any beauty or excellency in them, but simply because He chooses to love them. And because He loves them, He chastens them for their follies, and scourges them for their sins. All His children need chastisement, and they all have it — some more, some less — some in one way, and some in another.

If the Lord did not love us, He would allow us to go on, and suffer us to fill up the measure of our iniquities (1 Thess. 2:16). If He loved us less than He does, He might correct us less. But because His love to us is infinite, tender, and eternal, therefore He seems to deal hardly with us. Let us beware lest we mistake the nature of our afflictions, or misinterpret the design of God in our troubles. Rather, let us en-

deavour to believe His love, rest upon His promises, tell out all our thoughts, feelings, and fears at His throne, and say, “Though He slay me, yet will I trust in Him,” (Job 13:5).

Tried believer, God loves thee — loves thee though thy faith is small, thy fears strong, and thy infirmities many. Nor did He ever love thee more than He does at this moment. Nor will He love thee more when He receives thee to His glory.

O Father, shed abroad Thy love in my heart, and so fill my heart with love to Thee! Help me to bless Thee for Thy love, and to praise Thee for every stroke of Thy rod!

**E**VERY CHILD IN the Lord's family has his own cup, and he must drink the mixture it contains. But we often think our portion is more bitter, or that our cup contains more sorrow than that of our neighbour. And at times, looking at some of the Lord's people, we fancy that they escape the cross, and are spared the trials we are called to endure.

Nothing is more common than for Satan to tempt us to think that our case is singular, or our trials peculiarly severe. We should not believe him. We should not listen to him. His design is to produce rebellion against God, and to fill us with self-pity and complaining. Our case is not singular. No, "the same afflictions are accomplished in our brethren that are in the world," (1 Pet. 5:9).

Are we harassed and tempted by Satan? So are they. Are we tried in our domestic circle? So are they. Have we sharp and bitter conflicts of soul? So have they. Are we complaining of bereavements, or bitter trials in the world? So may they. Are our hearts cold and hard? So are theirs. Do we doubt and fear? So do they. Yes, and that experience which you

dare not name, dare not allude to, is experienced by many of them.

Tried as you are, timid as you are, doubting as you are, seeing you still cling to Jesus, you are in the footsteps of the flock. Thousands now in glory, when here on earth felt and feared just as you do. You will find it hard to believe this, but it is nevertheless true. You will be surprised by-and-by to find how much the experience of the Lord's people is alike. Not only so, but Jesus suffered before us, and was tried in all points like as we are (Heb. 4:15), and is therefore able to succour and support us, and He will do so.

**W**HAT A PRECIOUS promise for all God's feeble children, who are daily fearing that they shall fall, or be crushed under the weight of their troubles and trials! It was first made to Israel, who had so provoked the Lord by their sins, that He determined to drive them out of their own land, and send them to Babylon for seventy years. In the prospect of this heavy trial — a trial rendered more heavy because it was brought on them by their sins — the Lord says, "Do not be terrified, I am still thy God. I will give thee strength. I will appear for thy help. Yea, I will uphold thee with my righteous omnipotent arm," (Isa 41:10).

Oh, believer, what comfort is here! For this promise is confirmed to thee in Jesus, and by the death of Jesus. Yes, it is thine — as much so as if spoken to thee directly by the mouth of God. Oh, what a mercy! God says He will hold thee up! He will put strength into thee. He will enable thee to bear thy afflictions. He will bring thee safely through all thy troubles. Satan may say, "I will trip thee up." God says, "I will uphold thee." Unbelief may say, "You will one day fall and perish." God says, "I will uphold thee." Flesh may cry out, "I can never bear up under

this.” God says, “I will uphold thee.” Thy feeble heart may misgive and say, “How can I endure such privations, such bereavements, such buffetings of Satan, such temptations, such losses, such fiery trials?” God says, “I will uphold thee.”

Hence of every believer it is testified, “They go from strength to strength. Every one of them in Zion appeareth before God,” (Ps. 84:7). In weakness, the Lord strengthens them. In want, the Lord supplies them. In sickness, the Lord sustains them. And in death, the Lord gives them the final victory.

## GIVE UP THE BURDEN

**T**HE LORD'S PEOPLE are often burdened, and from their conduct, one would fancy that they preferred carrying their own burden. For though directed to cast it on the Lord, until almost compelled, they seldom do so.

Some have secret burdens, of which they never speak to others. These are made up of evil thoughts, foul suggestions, and terrible temptations. Under such a burden they sigh, groan, and stagger, and yet keep it all to themselves, fearing to speak to anyone of what lies with an almost crushing weight on the mind. Communion on the points with a judicious and experienced Christian would do much good, though the best way is to cast it on the Lord. Spread out the whole matter before Him, and pray for grace to resist Satan, to relieve the mind, and produce confidence in God. Others have visible burdens. From the state of their affairs, or from what is seen in their families, or from disease of body, it is well known that they groan, being burdened (2 Cor. 5:4).

Well, burdened Christian, there is One that is willing to carry thy burden for thee. Are you willing to commit it to Him, leave it with Him, and expect that it will be well managed by Him? Put yourself

and all your affairs into His hands, and He will work in you, both to will and to do of His own good pleasure (Php. 2:13).

As each care comes in, cast it on the Lord. As sources of perplexity arise, carry them to the Lord. As anxieties rise in your soul, go with them to the Lord. Ask for wisdom, that you may lay your troubles where God has laid your sins — on the back of Jesus. There is nothing, however great or however small, that troubles thee, but it affects thy Saviour, and He is willing that you should cast it on Him.

## REST IN JESUS

**I**S YOUR POOR body rendered restless by disease and suffering, and your mind by trouble and sorrow? Poor restless sufferer! Jesus speaks to thee. The physician cannot give thee rest. Thy attentive nurse has tried in vain. Perhaps Christian friends have endeavoured to soothe thy troubled spirit. But all have failed. Now Jesus speaks to thee. He says, "*I will give thee rest.*"

He can give rest to thy poor, weak, restless body. And coming to Him, He will, if it is for thy good. He can give rest to thy poor, perturbed, and anguished spirit. And coming to Him, He will. Yea, He will give such sweet repose to thy spirit, that the sufferings of thy body will be borne with patience and comparative ease. For when the soul is solaced, refreshed, and fed by Jesus, the pains of the body become light, and are much more easily borne.

Come to Jesus, then. Come to Him, as to a fast and faithful friend. Come to Him, as to a kind, loving Saviour, who sympathizes with thee, and with heaven and earth at His command, promises to give thee rest. Come, and lay your whole case before Him. Come, and plead with Him. Come, and believing His precious promise, ask Him, and expect Him to make it good. Thousands on the bed of sickness, and thou-

sands in deep trouble and sorrow, have found rest in Jesus, and such rest as has made them willing to be in circumstances of suffering, if they might but still enjoy the same.

Precious promise of a precious Saviour: "*I will give you rest!*" Oh, for faith to believe it, to carry it to Jesus, that He may honour it, and make it good in our experience! Faith alone is necessary, and the promise is ours, and the Promiser will soon make it good. Lord, work faith in our poor unbelieving hearts, that we may come to Jesus and enjoy rest!

## ALWAYS TRUST

*Trust in Him at all times.**Psalms 62:8*

**I**N TIMES OF trouble, and in seasons of affliction, we are often left to feel so much of the hardness of our own hearts, to see such deep and unexpected corruption in our nature, and to be so severely buffeted by Satan, that we are ready to conclude that it would be horrid presumption to hold fast our confidence. We are violently tempted to distrust God, to doubt His love, and rashly conclude that we have deceived ourselves, and everybody about us.

For we cannot help thinking that He is dealing with us in wrath, not in mercy, and to conclude, if He had love to us, He would not deal so hardly with us. All this is from the flesh, or from Satan. God is to be trusted when He cannot be traced. He is to be trusted by us in the dark, as well as in the light — when He smites us, as much as when He comforts and cheers us. We should trust in His word for it

is true, in His faithfulness for it is unchangeable, and in His love for it is immutable. We should give Him credit for wisdom, mercy, and truth, and trust Him to manifest His wisdom, display His mercy, and make plain His truth. Trusting in God honours Him, confounds Satan, and brings us peace and comfort. Therefore trust in Him at all times.

Gracious Lord, enable us to trust in Thee, to believe the love Thou hast to us, and so glorify Thy free and sovereign grace! Oh, crush our unbelief, scatter our fears, and give us strong and steady confidence in Thy blessed self.

Keep your eye fixed on Him, as your Father, as your God in covenant, as pledged to you by promise and oath, to do you good. Looking to the Lord will relieve you, as it is written of some of old, “They looked unto Him and were lightened, and their faces were not ashamed,” (Ps. 34:5). They expected relief and deliverance from the Lord. They looked to Him for it. He was as good as His word, and they were filled with joy and peace.

Friends may fail you, relatives may neglect or be unkind to you, those you love most may be unable to help you. But looking to the Lord, He will never fail you. He will never neglect you, but will prove Himself both able and willing to help you.

Let nothing divert your attention, then, from the Lord, but carry everything to Him, be very familiar with Him, and exercise implicit confidence in Him. Cast on Him every care, commit to Him every work, lay before Him every difficulty. And you will prove that He is not only able, but willing also, to do for you exceeding abundantly above all that you can ask or think (Eph. 3:20). And whenever Satan tempts you, or guilty fears torment you, turn your eyes to Calvary, and see Jesus your substitute — suffering, bleeding, and dying in your stead. And so you will enjoy peace.

Be childlike: run to thy Father's arms, nestle in thy Father's bosom, realize safety in thy Father's love and power. He will not allow His child to be injured. He will hold thee in the hollow of His hand, hide thee under His wing, and carry thee as the shepherd does the lamb, in His bosom.

"Be still," for though painful at present, it will soon be over. Though hard to nature, it is easy to grace. Lay fast hold of this promise, believe it, plead it, and it shall be honoured in thy experience. Thousands, millions, have proved it true. Martyrs at the stake, confessors in their dungeons, and believers in the greatest sufferings which nature could endure, have found the grace of Jesus sufficient. What it was, it is. And what it is, it ever will be. In all the past you have had sufficient grace, and you shall in all the future, for Jesus will never fail you, nor forsake you. Therefore, trust in Him.

## PRAYER HEARD AND ANSWERED

*Then they cry unto the Lord in their trouble,  
and he saveth them out of their distresses.*

*Psalms 107:19*

**F**OUR TIMES THESE words are repeated in this psalm, and the truth contained in them many times in other places. Trouble is intended to drive us to the Lord. It furnishes us with matter for prayer, and puts life and energy into our prayers. When all is smooth and pleasant, we rather talk before the Lord than pray to the Lord. There is no earnestness or power in our prayers. But when we are well loaded with trouble, when we feel that we are in imminent peril, when we see that no one can deliver us but God, then we *cry unto the Lord*.

We feel more than we say. Our prayers well up from the very bottom of our hearts. The eye is fixed on the Lord, while the heart pleads with the Lord. Deliverance is certain when faith is exercised and prayer is presented.

But how the Lord will deliver us, and when the Lord will deliver us, must be left to Himself. And then will

come our last, our complete deliverance, and a glorious deliverance it will be! Oh, to anticipate it often with confidence and satisfaction!

Beloved, prayer prevails now. Prayer will prevail in all our future trials and troubles. And prayer will prevail in the hour of death. Let us not, then, yield to doubt or fear. Let us not despond or complain. But let us cry unto the Lord in our troubles, and continue to cry, until He delivers us out of our distresses, and sets us before His face forever.

## THE CLEANSING BLOOD

*The blood of Jesus Christ his Son  
cleanseth us from all sin.*

*1 John 1:7*

**I**N TIMES OF affliction and trouble, the Lord often sets our iniquities before us — our secret sins in the light of His countenance. Then it is that sin appears exceeding sinful, and we are apt to fix the eye so intently upon our depraved nature and sinful life, that we begin to doubt our acceptance with God, and question if our standing before Him is good. This is wrong, for the sight of sin is only intended to lay us in the dust, exalt the free grace of God, and endear more than ever to us the atoning blood.

Nothing can affect the standing of a believer before God in Christ, but many things will affect his comfort. When, therefore, the sins of our past lives come up before us, or the deep depravity of our hearts is anew discovered to us, we must look at once to the blood of Jesus. That blood, shed for us, has put away the guilt of our sins forever, and has obtained our eternal redemption. And that blood applied to us, removes all sense of condemnation, giving us sweet peace and holy confidence in God. The blood is for daily use. It *cleanseth* us from all sin, not only once, but every time we exercise faith in it.

Precious blood of Jesus! Let us fix the eye of the mind on it, believe that there is infinite merit in it, and that, depending upon it, we are delivered at once and forever from all the penal consequences of sin. He that trusts in the blood of Christ can never be condemned, but shall have everlasting life. He that keeps his eye fixed on the blood of Jesus, will enjoy peace with God, and be delivered from all slavish fears.

Holy Spirit, apply that blood to our consciences, and fill us with all joy and peace in believing in its infinite virtue and everlasting efficacy!

## THE BLESSED MAN

**T**HE CHASTENINGS of the Lord often appear severe, but they are merciful. They are to correct our follies, subdue our proud wills, and soften and humble our hard hearts before His throne. When God chastens, He teaches. The lessons are in His word, but many of them are never learned but in the furnace. We often learn more truth in a short but sharp affliction, than we do from many books and sermons.

In affliction, God teaches us our own emptiness and vanity, our dependence on Himself, and the insufficiency of all earthly things. He endears the Lord Jesus and His great salvation to us. He shows us the value of the means of grace, and makes us grateful that we can obtain grace without the means. He makes our consciences tender and honest. He qualifies us for usefulness on earth, and fits us for the enjoyment of Himself in heaven. It is a blessed thing to be chastened of the Lord, especially when the rod teaches us such important and invaluable lessons.

We need chastening. And if we do not receive it, we become carnal, worldly, light, and trifling, unsavoury, and useless in the world and in the

church. Chastened Christians are generally useful and ornamental Christians.

But you must not suppose a Christian is not chastened because you are not called to witness his correction. The rod is sometimes laid on the body, but more frequently on the soul. The heart knoweth its own bitterness when others little suspect what it is enduring (Prov. 14:10).

Chastened Christian, seek grace to bear the rod, to bless the rod, and to kiss the hand that holds the rod. Heavenly Father, correct us tenderly, lovingly, and whenever Thou correctest us, let us see Thy face!

## ALL FOR THE BEST

*We know that all things work together for good to them  
that love God, to them who are the

***Romans 8:28***

**A**LL THINGS, yes, whatever happens to the Christian, is directed and overruled by a special providence for his good. It may be very bitter. It may lay him very low. It may try him to the quick. It may keep him in the dust for a long time. But it will do him good, not only in the end, but while it lasts.

Believer, your present trial is for your good! Nothing could be better for you. You may not see it now. You may feel as if you never could think so. But the time is coming when you will bless God for it. You love God, though it is but feebly, and that proves that God loves you with an infinite and eternal love. You have come to the cross as a poor sinner, and you look to the Lord Jesus to be your perfect Saviour, and this proves that you have been called according to God's purpose. And it is as one beloved of God, as one of God's called ones, that we have this assurance respecting you, that *all things* — light and darkness, health and sickness, hatred and love, prosperity and adversity, life and death — will work together for your good.

God asserts the fact, and therefore you should believe it. The history of all God's people proves and illustrates it, and therefore you should rejoice in it. Dark clouds bring rich blessings. Sharp winters introduce fruitful springs. And sore troubles often precede the sweetest consolations. Your present affliction, be it sickness of body, trouble of mind, bereavements, losses, crosses, or whatever else, is working for your good. Not merely will work in the future, but is working now. While your heart is bleeding, while you are tempted to think all is against you, all is working together for your good.

## THE DESTITUTE ENCOURAGED

*He will regard the prayer of the destitute,  
and not despise their prayer.*

*Psalms 102:17*

**I**N AFFLICTION we are apt to take the eye off the Lord Jesus, and turn it inwards upon ourselves. And when we look within, we appear to be so destitute of all that is holy, or excellent, or good, that we are filled with gloom, and tempted to despond.

Stripped of our own righteousness, having a vivid view of the corruptions within, and taking the eye off Jesus, we feel ourselves to be in a most destitute condition. Then we sigh, cry, and groan before God. We loathe ourselves in our own sight. We cry out with Job, "Behold, I am vile," (Job 40:4) or with Isaiah, "I am undone," (Isa. 6:5). We despise ourselves, and believe that everyone else would do so, if they did but know us. We think that prayers from such hearts as ours, and such prayers — so broken, so imperfect, and mixed with so much sin — never can be acceptable to God.

We forget, at such times, that Jesus, our great High Priest, stands between us and God, that our prayers are put into His censer and perfumed with the sweet incense of His merits, and are by Him presented to God. But so it is. And God, infinitely gracious in His nature, reading the desires of our poor troubled

hearts, regards our prayers, registers our prayers, and determines to answer our prayers.

He will not despise the poorest prayer of His feeblest and most unworthy child. Despise our poor prayers! Never. He sees them as the effect of His grace, as the production of His own Spirit, as the simple lisplings of His own child. And while they appear worthless, contemptible, and deserving of punishment to us, they are most precious to Him.

Gracious Saviour, look upon us in our destitution, and give us more grace — grace to spiritualize our affections, regulate our wills, purify our consciences, and fill us with light and love!

## COMFORT FOR THE POOR

*Hearken, my beloved brethren, Hath not God chosen  
the poor of this world rich in faith, and heirs of the  
kingdom which he hath promised  
to them that love Him?*

*James 2:5*

**P**OVERTY IS NOT spirituality, but sanctified poverty is a great friend to it. Poverty is no sin, but it is sometimes a preventative to sin. Poverty has its temptations, but it has also its consolations. The poor ought not to repine at poverty, because God, in His infinite wisdom, has appointed it, and is able to render it the greatest blessing.

God's chosen are generally found among the poor. Not that He chose them because they were poor, but choosing them in Christ, He appointed them to be poor as the best thing for them. His enemies have their portion in this life. Here they have their good things. Not so His children. Here they have their evil things, and the best things are to come.

The poor Christian has a rich Father in whom to trust, the fullness of Jesus to which to look, the precious promises on which to depend, the Holy Spirit in whom to confide, and a glorious inheritance to anticipate and prepare for. "The kingdom," — grace here, and glory hereafter! "The kingdom," in which Jesus will reign, and where they will be princes, yea,

kings and priests! (Rev. 5:10). “The kingdom,” prepared for them from the foundation of the world! (Matt. 25:34).

My poor brother — my poor sister! Look up, look forward. The cottage will soon be exchanged for a mansion, sickness for health, poverty for wealth, sin for holiness, earth for heaven. You will not always be poor. You will not be poor long. Jesus will soon come, and then the meek, the spiritual poor, shall inherit the earth (Matt. 5:5). For you, an inheritance is reserved in heaven (1 Pet. 1:4). For you, a mansion is being prepared (John 14:2). For you, glory, honour, immortality, even eternal life, is in reserve (Rom. 2:7).

## COMFORT FOR THE WIDOW

*A father of the fatherless, and a judge of the widows, is  
God in his holy habitation.*

*Psalms 68:5*

**T**HE WIDOW OFTEN feels destitute and desolate, and when she most needs the sympathy of man, she often experiences it least. But the God of Israel is the widow's God. He offers to be her husband, to fill the husband's place, and perform the father's part. He says, "*Let thy widows trust in me,*" (Jer. 49:11). As if He had said, "I am able to supply all the widow's needs, to crush all the widow's foes, to sanctify all the widow's sorrows, and to fill the widow's heart with comfort and peace. Let her ask Me to do so. Let her trust Me to do so. Let her expect Me to do so."

My widowed sister, carry all that pains thy heart or depresses thy spirit to Jesus. Look to Jesus through thy tears, and for the supply of all thy needs. And if enemies arise, if man would oppress thee, go to Jesus as the judge (Luke 18:1-8). He will listen to thee, take thy case in hand, carry thy cause for thee, and even turn man's curse into a blessing. Take thy poor fatherless children to Him. Put them into His hands. Ask Him to adopt them for His own, to manage them for thee, and make them holy, honourable, and useful — a comfort to thee, and a blessing to others.

You cannot ask too much of Jesus, nor expect too much from Jesus. He will love to hear thee. He will kindly listen to thee. He will value thy confidence. He will crown and reward thy faith. Fret not, fear not, but put Jesus in thy husband's place, and expect Him to do a husband's part.

## OLD AGE

*Now also, when I am old and grey-headed,

**A**GE AND ITS infirmities will creep on us. And with age come weakness, pains, and fears. But an old Christian should be a happy creature, for he has proved the Lord to be faithful so many years. He has had answers to prayer so many times, and the God of his youth stands pledged never to leave nor forsake him.

The Lord forsake an old servant? Never! The Father of mercies forsake one of His children when compassed with the infirmities of old age? Impossible! No, no! The Lord who has borne with us so long, will bear with us to the end. The Lord, who has glorified Himself in our life, will get glory to Himself in our death. As the God of all comfort, He will comfort us on the bed of languishing, and will make all our bed in our sickness. And when heart and flesh are failing, He will be the strength of our heart, and our portion forever (Ps. 73:26).

Aged believer, doubt not, fear not! God has given you His word, trust it. He has confirmed His word by the death of His Son, therefore exercise confidence in Him. He has been a friend and a Father to you for many years, and He will be your friend and Father to the very last. Be much with Him in prayer, and with

all the simplicity of a little child let your requests be made known unto Him. He has grace for old age, as He had for youth. And He has grace for a dying bed, as He had grace for all the conflicts of life.

Believe His word, rest in His love, expect His blessing to the end, and you shall be more than a conqueror through Him that loved you (Rom. 8:37). God never loved you more than He does now in your weakness, pains, and old age. And, sweet thought, He will never love you less! His love is infinite, everlasting. Having loved, He loveth to the end (John 13:1).

## MOURNING ENDED

**S**IGHING AND SORROW are confined to earth. They are limited by time, and a blessing is pronounced upon them: “Blessed are they that mourn, for they shall be comforted,” (Matt. 5:4).

Every believer is a mourner. The Saviour’s dove is a mournful bird. We mourn over our imperfect duties, feeble graces, neglected privileges, and many shortcomings. We mourn, because our hearts are unholy and our lives are sinful, because our children are unconverted and our other relatives love not the Saviour. We mourn, because we suffer, but more because we sin. How much there is in the world, in the church, in the family, and in the heart, to make us mourn! We do groan, being burdened (2 Cor. 5:4).

But soon, very soon, the days of our mourning will be ended. We shall see Jesus, be with Jesus, and be like Jesus (1 John 3:2). All sin and all sorrow will be left on earth when we ascend to heaven. Then our tears will be wiped away (Isa. 25:8). Every cause of sorrow will be removed. And joy, peace and pleasure will be our portion forever. Then we shall be made perfect in love. Then we shall be filled with holiness. Then we shall enjoy full satisfaction. Then we shall reap in joy who have sown in tears (Ps. 126:5).

Let us, then, look upward, and look forward remembering, when our cup is bitterest, when our burden is heaviest, when our sorrow is greatest, that in a very little time the days of our mourning will be ended. The night of sadness will soon be past, and the morning of joy, everlasting joy, will break upon us (Ps. 30:5). Then there shall be no more pain, neither sorrow nor crying (Rev. 21:4). Then, perfect in knowledge, perfect in holiness, and perfect in happiness, we shall be ever with the Lord. Then we shall see Jesus, be with Jesus, and be like Jesus, and that forever. Everlasting joy succeeds the sorrows of a day.

## NO MORE PAIN

**H**OW MUCH PAIN many of the Lord's people are called to suffer, and how severe that pain often is! It spoils, or prevents, the enjoyment of everything earthly. But blessed be God, spiritual things may be enjoyed, even while much pain is being endured. The light of God's countenance, the application of some precious promise, or the sweet communion we are privileged to enjoy with Jesus at times, almost raises us above the sense of pain. The sufferer rejoices in his gracious God, feeds like a hungry man on the rich promises of grace, and triumphs in Christ Jesus as his Saviour and friend.

But there are times when pain is hard to bear, when our spirit is exhausted, and we are sorely tempted to doubt the pity and tender love of our heavenly Father. Then, it is often sweet to look forward to the place and anticipate the time when there shall be no more pain, neither sorrow nor crying, for the former things will have passed away (Rev. 21:4).

Suffering Christian, thy pain will soon cease, thy sufferings will soon be over! Jesus will come and fetch thee from the bed of pain, the chamber of affliction, and the house of mourning. And absent from the body, you will be present with the Lord (2 Cor.

5:8). Seek grace from the Lord to suffer patiently. There is a need be for every pain, and soon, very soon, you will bless the Lord for the very pains which now cause you to sigh and groan. The songs of heaven will be sweetened by the groans of earth. And the pleasures of eternity will be heightened by the pains of time.

Every pain endured leaves one less to suffer. And every hour passed brings us nearer to the time when the ransomed of the Lord shall return from the land of darkness and death, and come home to their Father's house with everlasting joy, while sorrow and sighing shall forever flee away (Isa. 35:10).

## A CLOSING QUESTION

*What will ye do in the day of visitation?*

*Isaiah 10:3*

**T**ROUBLES, TRIALS, and afflictions, are the lot of all. None can finally escape them. It becomes everyone, therefore, to be prepared for them. We may soon, we may suddenly, be visited with sickness, bereavement, or death. Therefore the Lord kindly asks us what we intend to do when they come.

Reader, *what will you do?* Will you bear them with fortitude and patience? Will you look to the Lord for wisdom and strength to enable you to triumph over them? Will you have Jesus to sympathize with you in them, support you under them, and bring you through them? Or will you be left to grapple with them in your native strength? Few sights are more painful than to see a sinner, without a hope in Jesus, without peace with God, without a prospect of glory, sinking in the floods of deep affliction.

Reader, *will this be your case?* Is there the least probability of it? If so, let me most earnestly and affectionately beseech you now, before the day of visitation comes, before the storm falls, before the tempest bursts upon you, to seek and find refuge in Jesus. Make personal religion your great object. Seek pardon and peace through Jesus without delay. Set

your heart upon union to Christ, and never rest until you enjoy it. It may be realized, and it may be realized by you. *In* Christ, deriving strength *from* Christ, and enjoying communion *with* Christ, you will be prepared for the day of visitation, whether that visitation be temporal losses, soul conflicts, domestic troubles, or even death itself.

Seek, oh, seek, then, an interest in Christ! Rest not until you know that Christ is yours, and that you are entitled to all the promises of His grace. And then, if asked “What will you do in the day of visitation?” you will be able to say, “*I will trust in JESUS.*”

## ABOUT THE AUTHOR

James Smith (1802-1862) was a 19th century English Baptist pastor who became a prolific and much-loved devotional author. Called to the ministry in his mid-20s, he served as pastor of two churches in Cheltenham over a period of 12 years. In 1841 he accepted a call to the New Park Street chapel in London - the church which Charles Spurgeon would later pastor for almost 40 years. Health issues eventually forced him to leave London in 1850, and he eventually returned to Cheltenham to pastor a third church in the area from 1852 until his death. In total, he authored more than 50 books, along with numerous tracts and articles for various Christian periodicals and magazines.

Smith's writings were full of Christ, and he sought to magnify and exalt His precious Saviour in every book. He aimed to not only cultivate a genuine love for the Lord Jesus in the hearts of his readers, but to see such love for Christ manifested in their everyday lives. In the preface to his popular *The Believer's Daily Remembrancer*, he wrote:

"In this little work, I aim to speak in the closet, in the cottage, in the kitchen, and even in the field, to the different classes of the Lord's family; endeavouring to draw them nearer to their God and gracious Father. My desire is to

promote the power of godliness; and these little pieces are written to convince, comfort, and correct; to fan the flame of devotion, and to produce holiness of heart and life...Habitual dependence upon God for all we need, acknowledging the hand of God in all we receive, and walking with God, notwithstanding all that may happen to us below, enter into the very vitals of genuine Christianity; and it is only while we are thus acting that we enjoy peace with God, and walk in the comforts of the Holy Ghost.”

Most Christian authors would naturally have similar desires. But whereas many are able to speak about the Christian life in theory, Smith had first-hand experience of the truths that he wrote about. In God’s providence, he learnt them by passing through his own fiery trials. Smith’s father died while he was still an infant, and as a young child he was pressed into the workforce to help his mother support the family. As an apprentice and employee, he battled with the opposition that he received from ungodly co-workers. As a father of at least seven children, he saw three of them die at an early age. As a pastor, he experienced the hatred, slander and nastiness that sometimes comes from professing Christians, and he went through more than one bitter church split. Nor was he exempt from health and financial worries either. In addition to all this, Smith endured the normal internal battles against sin that plague every

believer, while also bearing the heavy burden for the souls of others that accompanies a faithful ministry.

Not surprisingly, Smith's writings began to resonate with other readers who were enduring similar trials. Through his pen, they were being comforted with the same comfort that he himself had received from God (2 Cor. 1:4). Before long, Smith's books began to spread throughout England and eventually around the world. Many wrote to him, expressing gratitude for the tremendous help they had received, or explaining how God had used his writings to awaken unbelieving friends and relatives. Hungry souls were being fed, and for a while, his writings were even more popular than those of Charles Spurgeon. Sadly, his works are now largely unknown by most 21st century Christians, but it is hoped that as more of them are reprinted, the Lord will again use them to exalt Christ and bless the souls of His beloved saints.

Further information about Pastor James Smith can be found in his autobiography, *Marvellous Mercy, as Displayed in the Life and Experience of the Author, James Smith of Cheltenham*. The first edition contains a record of his life up until August 1861, and was published prior to his death in December of the following year. In a subsequent printing in 1864, his son Joseph Smith, provided some additional details about Pastor Smith's final months.

## Brief Timeline

- 1802 Born in Old Brentford, Middlesex (19th November).
- c.1812 Taken from school to work in a soap factory to help his widowed mother earn an income for the family.
- c.1816 Commenced work as an apprentice fell-monger (tanner and dealer of sheepskins).
- 1819 Conversion (28th February).
- 1820 Publicly baptized (31st March) and received into church membership (2nd April).
- 1824 Marriage to Ann Cook (29th August).
- 1825 Moves to Chertsey for work purposes as his employer's fell-monger business begins to expand (April).
- 1826 Preaches publicly for the first time at Alton from Ps. 9:18 (19th November). It was his 24th birthday. Preaches twice more that same day from Zech. 9:10 and Zech. 13:1.
- 1827 Brentford church sets him apart for the ministry of the word (March), and he begins preaching in various places as needed.
- 1828 Accepts an invitation to preach for a 12 month trial period at Cheltenham, with the possibility of becoming the church's pastor. During this time he faced severe opposition from some in the church, and a number of members decided to leave.

- 1829 Ordained as pastor of Bethel Chapel in Cheltenham (26th May) and the church continues to grow, despite ongoing controversies. Members with hyper-calvinistic and antinomian views become increasingly critical of his ministry and message. In order to divert his mind from these trials, Smith begins to write, print and circulate gospel tracts.
- c.1830 Death of daughter Mercy.
- 1831 Death of 19-month-old daughter Anne after a three day illness (13th Jan.)
- 1833 Death of son Charles.  
  
Comes to believe in the universal offer of the gospel to all lost sinners, and determines to start calling them to repent and believe in the gospel, and offer them the Lord Jesus as Saviour. Previously, he held the view that gospel invitations should only be made to sinners who had been made to feel their need of Christ. He anticipates further opposition from the church as a result.
- 1835 The church situation deteriorates further and he resigns as pastor of Bethel Chapel. A number of members also leave, and he begins preaching among them at a local gallery for the next three months.
- 1836 Becomes pastor of the newly-formed Salem Baptist Chapel in Cheltenham (1st January). Though the original premises could seat 600 people, the congregation numbered more than 1200 within just 2 years and the building had to be enlarged.

## WORDS OF COMFORT

- 1841 Resigns as pastor of Salem Chapel (9th November) and accepts a call to New Park Street Chapel, London. He describes the London church as 'in a very low state, and the congregation very small,' but between 400 and 500 new members would be added to the church during his pastorate.
- 1850 Resigns as pastor of New Park Street Chapel (February) due to ongoing lung and asthma problems. Commences a two year trial at Byrom Street Chapel in Liverpool (August) which only lasts until the end of the year.
- 1851 Invited to oversee the church at Shrewsbury for 12 months (February).
- 1852 Returns to Cheltenham to pastor a church which was meeting in Ebenezer Chapel (February). This church, which had formed in 1843 from previous members of Salem Chapel, was now itself in danger of disbanding. It recovered under Smith's ministry and would soon become Cambray Baptist Church.
- 1861 Suffers a sudden stroke and paralysis (September), which prevents any further work as a preacher or writer.
- 1862 Death at the age of 60 years (15th December)
