

THE CHOSEN VESSEL

During the first few years of the Church, the Gospel was proclaimed mainly among the Jews. On rare occasions, the Holy Spirit led Peter and Philip to baptize the gentiles. However, this was an exception to the general practice. This trend was changed by the emergence of Paul, the apostle of the gentiles. His activities are presented in the Acts of the Apostles from chapter 13 onwards.

Luke gives great importance to the theme of "Journey" in his Gospel as well as in the Acts. He has presented the missionary activities of Paul in the framework of three journeys, two of which are depicted in this book, while the third one is described in the next book. The fourth and final journey was to Rome as a prisoner.

As the apostles met with opposition and rejection from the part of the Jews, they turned to the gentiles. Wherever Paul went, first he approached the Jews and when they


rejected him, he began to preach to the gentiles. Numerous gentiles believed in Jesus Christ and were baptized which in turn made the Jews jealous. In the Acts, of the Apostles we can see Jews constantly following Paul and trying to persuade the people to turn against him.

Mass-conversion of the gentiles raised serious problems not only among the Jews but also among the members of the Church. Paul insisted that the gentiles must not be


compelled to observe the Jewish Customs in order to become Christians. The Jewish Christians were adamant in their opposition to this policy. Finally, the dispute was settled in the Jerusalem Council, the first official meeting of the Church leaders. The Council decided that the gentiles should not be forced to observed Jewish laws and traditions. This gave new vigor and impetus to the apostles, in particular to Paul, to continue the missionary activities among the gentiles. Miraculous cures further helped the evangelization.


The Holy Spirit revealed to the Church leaders that people can become Christians without changing their culture and becoming Jews. Holding on to the irrelevant traditions and empty rituals as well as imposing foreign cultures are detrimental to the Christian spirit. The "Good News" is the salvation attained through Jesus Christ, not the observance of Jewish customs and traditions.


Inspired by the words of Jesus to go to another town when persecuted in one, the Apostles went from place to place, proclaiming the Gospel. The Church that was born from and brought up by the blood of Christ was not weakened by persecution. Suffering was the source of growth for the Christians. The very life of the early Christian community was a powerful witness to Christ.




Saul returned to his home town, Tarsus, and began to preach the Gospel there. After sometime Barnabas came to see him.










































Mark left Paul and Bernabas, and travelled North.
































They went as far as Iconium and preached so effectively that many Jews and Greeks became believers. But some Jews turned the people against Paul. They went to Lystra.


















They stayed in Lystra and preached the Good News. Many believed in Christ. Hearing this, the Jews arrived from Antioch and Iconium:















After leaving Derbe, they visited all the Churches they had founded and appointed elders in each of them.







Paul and Barnabas returned to Antioch and they told the disciples all that God had done through them.
























Brothers, God showed His approval of the uncircumcised pagans by giving the Holy Spirit to them. It would only provoke God's anger if we impose this burden on them.













