President's message

Our club celebrated Thanksgiving with the Thailand inbound journey. Before the evening ended we asked everyone to list an item for which they were thankful. No surprise, the top of the list was family,

friends, the ability to travel, meeting new friends. It reinforces the mission of FFI.

When I think of my circle of friends in Arizona and Madison, a number of those relationships are because of FFI. We have traveled together, worked on projects together, and found a purpose larger than ourselves promoting global citizenry, the idea that my identity and responsibility extend to a worldwide community.

There is a financial urgency for FFI to continue. The organization has adapted over the last years by moving its office, lessening staff, using more part time employees, seeking volunteers. FFI is making a worldwide effort to expand membership, build new clubs, and offer innovative journeys.

In order to continue the stability of FFI, a critical piece is the increase in dues. In March 2016 FFCAZ club dues were \$25. In 2025 our club dues of \$40 was \$30 for FFI

and \$10 for the club. FFI dues for 2026 will increase to \$100 (\$8.33 per month) and club dues will remain at \$10 for the year. The increase for FFI seems like a jump from last year but dues increases did not happen over the decade while expenses did.

At our January meeting I will show the FFI video, answer questions, and provide an overview of the FFI website so you can you can see all the journeys and resources FFI offers, show the portal, and help you make the payment through the portal. We will take payments for our club dues of \$10 check / cash, credit card for FFI.

Stratford is a Wonderful Place to Visit By Nancy and Bob Unferth

My family and I have been visiting Stratford for more than 30 years, and it's always exciting. The town is best known as the home of one of North America's preeminent repertory theatre companies—more on that in a moment. For planning purposes, average high temperatures are about 52°F in April and 66°F in May.

Stratford sits along the Avon River, just like its namesake, Stratford-upon-Avon in England (the English were never famous for creative placenaming). The river is home to graceful swans, descended from a pair gifted by Queen Elizabeth II. A stroll along the river is just lovely, and you'll find boat rentals and river tours available as well.

The surrounding region of Ontario includes a substantial Mennonite community. From Stratford, it's only a half-hour drive to the small Mennonite town of Milbank, where you can enjoy a very good, very plain Mennonite lunch—and get a glimpse into Mennonite culture and daily life.

The town of Stratford itself has plenty to offer: historical sites, gardens, a large variety of shops and restaurants, hiking trails, the Cat Café, and much more.

Stratford's main attraction, of course, is the Stratford Festival—the largest repertory theatre company in Canada, one of the largest in North America, and one of the best. In 2026, the Fesitival will stage 12 productions across four venues, with performances running Tuesday through Sunday beginning at the end of April. Productions include *The Habbit, Guys & Dolls, The Tempest, A Midsummer Night's Dream...*

During the season you can take Backstage tours, Warehouse Tours, and Changeover Experiences. The program starts April 21, but it has more shows in May.

Thai visitors find friendship in Sun City

"It wasn't an activity, but it was the welcome that every one of these different groups gave," Nancy Mueller, president of Friendship Force Central Arizona, said about the biggest highlight of the week.

The Friendship Force visit from Thailand has come to an end, and while memories were made, it is the camaraderie that many of the members are taking home with

One of Friendship Force International's main philosophies is "faces not places," meaning the fellowship that was formed over the weeklong trip is more important than the museums, hikes and tours that they go on.

"We love to see people," Pong Niyomca, one of the Thai members, said. "We don't care where we are. We don't care what we see. People are the main thing."

Niyomca came to Arizona around 20 years ago when she brought a group of Thai students to the United States. However, they were only in Phoenix for one night and she wasn't able to see much. This time around, she was able to really soak in the clean sky, broad land-scapes and the cacti that she loves.

Some other highlights of the week

included the welcome party on the first night, the Musical Instrument Museum, the Heard Museum and tours of the police and fire departments.

Niyomca said that her friends back home would want to know everything about the visit because she doesn't think that any of them have been to Arizona. She especially wants to share what it's like to live in a smaller community.

"As time went by, we've learned that this is the place that we should be," she said. "Not in the big city, but in a smaller community. We don't have a retirement community in Thailand. This gives us a very good example. I will bring this idea and tell the people back at home that we should really have it organized back at home."

Mueller said that an invitation to go to Thailand has repeatedly been given to the American hosts.

"It's that relationship building," she said. "Friendship Force International calls it citizen diplomacy, and that's exactly what we're seeing here."
