He has a repertory of 20,000 words which he repeats in forty minutes, being at the rate of 500 words per minute, as can be demonstrated. This remarkable man says that he is the fastest talker in the world and that no woman talker has er been able to keep up with him for a

Herr Pollak. no woman talker has ever been able to keep up with him for a single lap. When appearing in public he dons a queer sort of costume, something like that worn by the assistant to an Italian organ-grinder, and he prefaces his "act" with various antics and grimaces, which he considers appropriate to the occasion. He speaks fifteen languages, but not all at the same rate. The one he inflicts on the public with such extraordinary rapidity is that which he learned in his native town, Prossnitz, in Hungary.
