# PRELUDE

## The Quiet Beginning

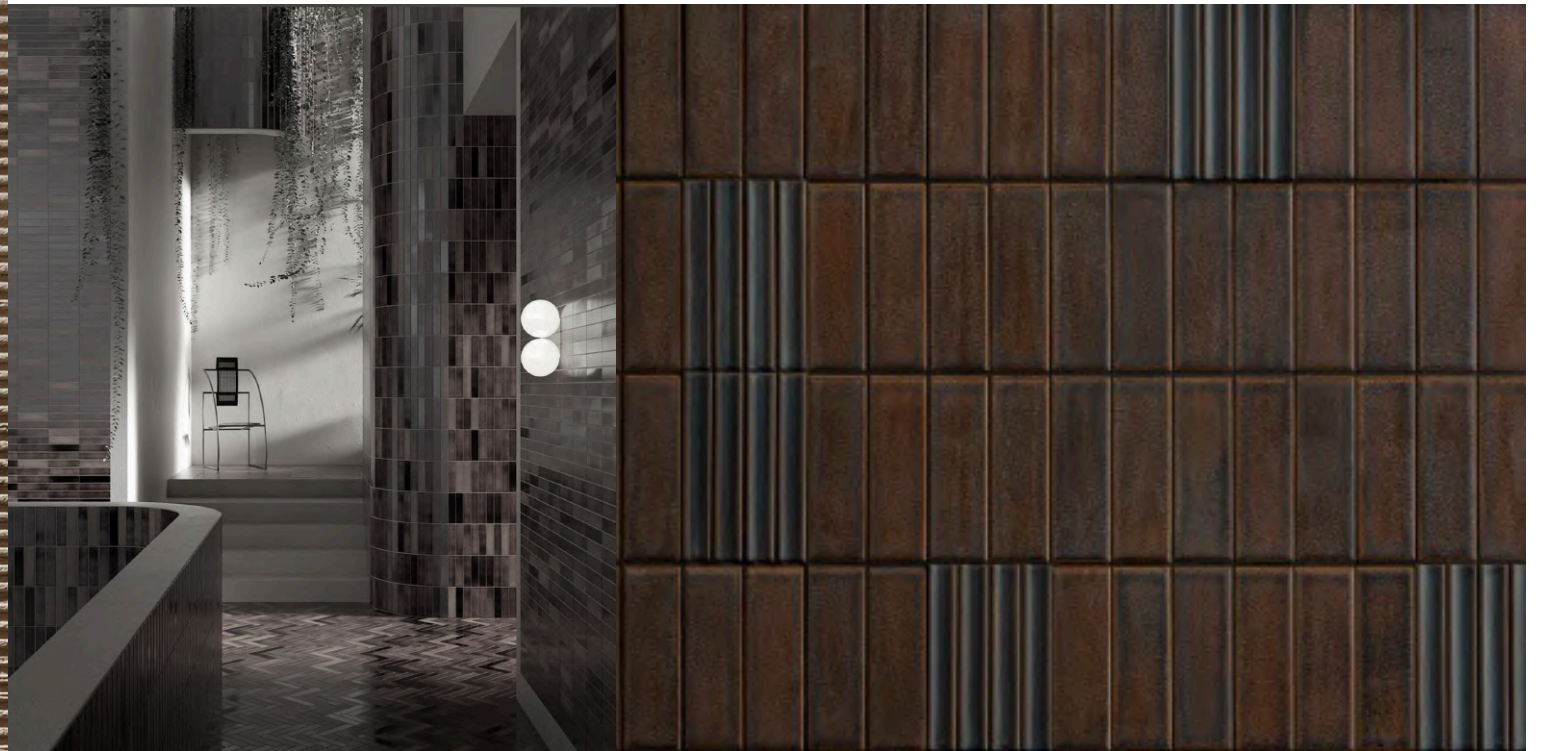
Airy. Intentional. Whisper-soft. This chapter evokes the first breath of space — where light, texture, and form reveal themselves gently. The Prelude is not silence; it's a held note. The opening movement in the rhythm of design





Every interior begins with a pause — a stillness before rhythm takes hold. A plane of stone, a softened wall, a shaft of light — these are the first notes of cadence. Quiet yet precise, they set the measure by which space will move. In the Prelude, the language is not loud. It is the silence of proportion, the balance of surface, the subtle cue that prepares the eye for what follows. The quiet beginning holds the promise of rhythm — waiting to unfold through objects, sculptures, and materials.

# Overture — First Impressions

The overture is the first line of architecture — an axis, a threshold, a wall or a stair that establishes direction, proportion, and the cadence of what follows.







“For me, the first gesture of a space is never ornament — it is a line, a wall, a threshold. It sets the rhythm, and everything else must follow its cadence.” — Khan

## Objects as Notes

Objects act as precise interruptions within volume — a chair, a light, a crafted piece that punctuates silence and gives measure to space.







Objects are notes that break the silence of space.





"I place objects not as decoration, but as notes that set pace within architecture — each one deliberate, each one essential." — Khan





“When I place a chair or a lamp, I am not filling a room — I am setting a note. Objects are not additions but accents, breaking silence with intention, like the strike of a key.” — Khan





## Sculptures as Chords

A sculpture is not an accent but a chord — it anchors the interior, expands its scale, and holds the resonance of rhythm within space.



"I see sculpture as architecture's deep note — it grounds proportion, creates pause, and allows rhythm to resonate beyond surface." — Khan

# Materials as Rhythm

Materials define tempo — stone aligning in veins, timber in slats, metal in grids, plaster in planes, lacquer in layers — each repetition setting cadence, each junction marking measure.

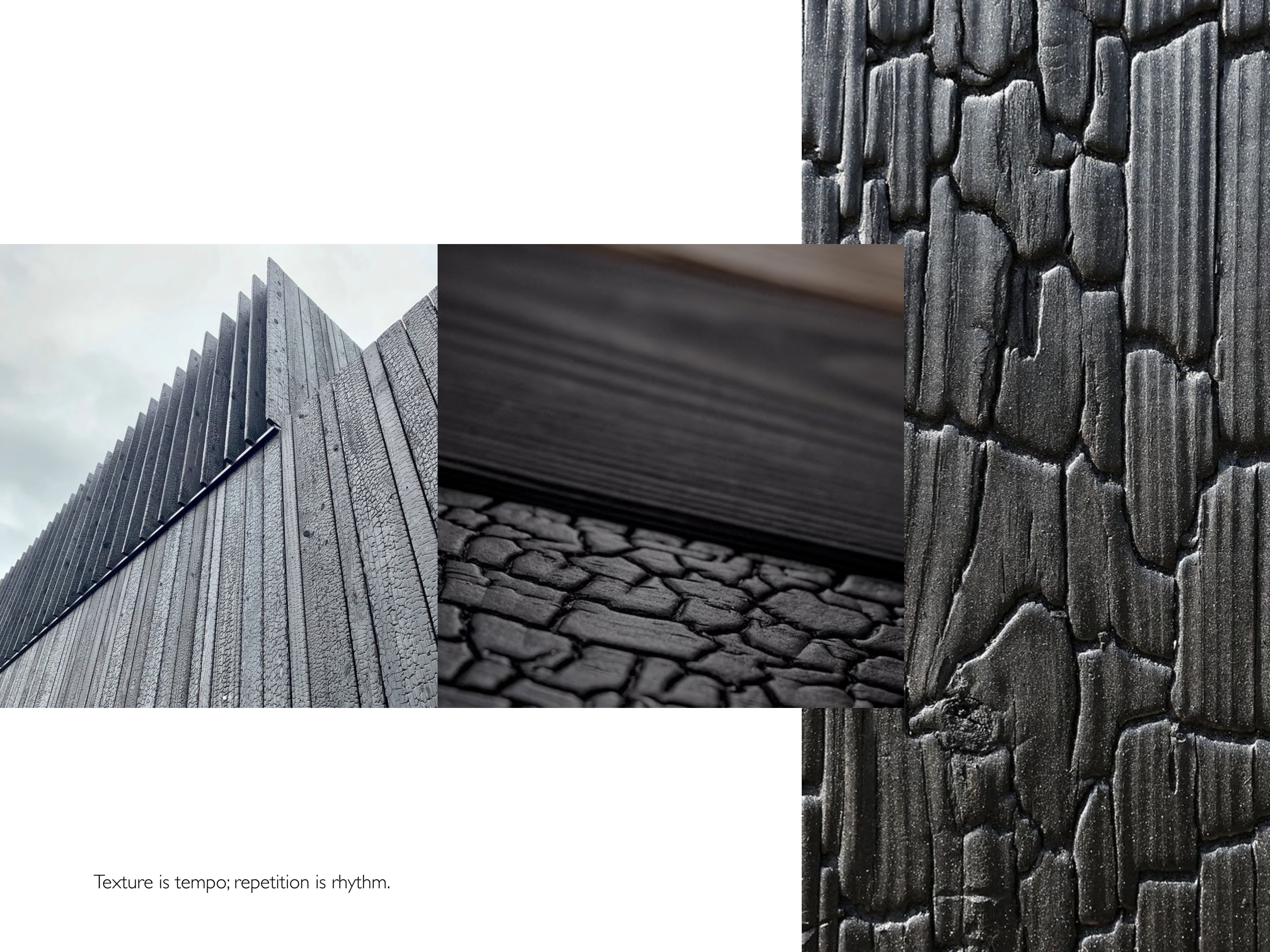






“For me, materials are not finishes but rhythm itself — the way stone flows, timber repeats, or clay breathes is the architecture’s true tempo.” — Khan





Texture is tempo; repetition is rhythm.





Clay carries rhythm in silence.





“Clay, timber, metal, and stone are not surfaces to me — they are rhythm. Repetition is tempo, texture is beat, and architecture becomes music when materials are sequenced with care.” — Khan





## Spaces as Harmony

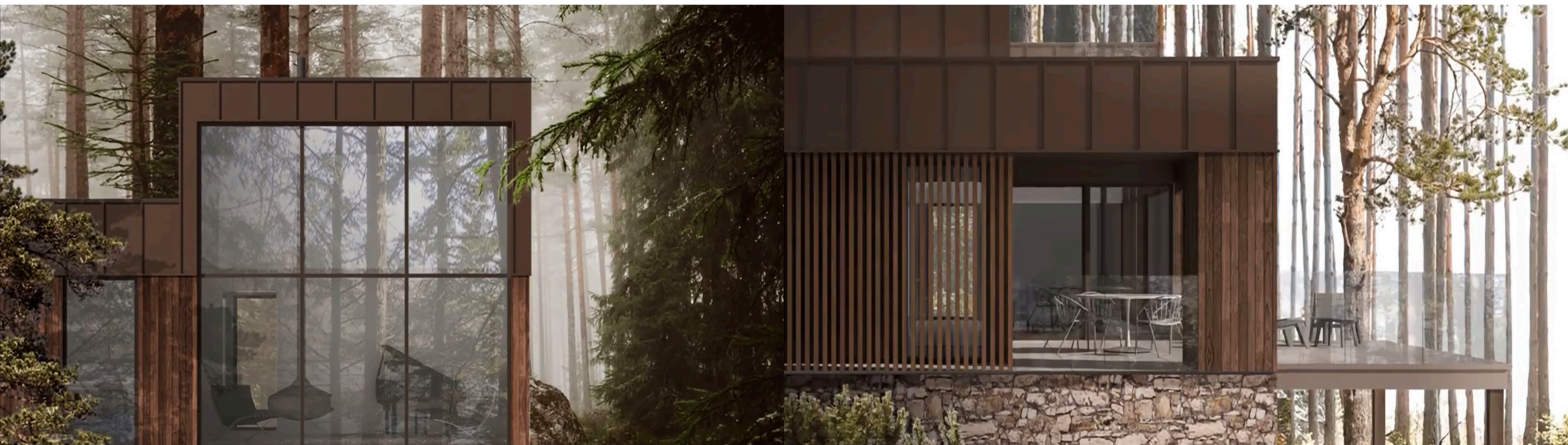
Harmony in architecture is not found but composed — light, proportion, material, and object calibrated so that rhythm resolves into balance, and silence into presence.





"I believe harmony is the highest form of architecture — when light, scale, and material no longer compete but breathe together, the space becomes complete." — Khan

## Coda — Memory of Rhythm

The coda is the lingering note — a final wall, a shadow, a crafted junction — where rhythm withdraws yet remains, leaving memory embedded in architecture.







“For me, the most powerful spaces end in silence — a stair edge, a wall plane, a shadow — details that stay long after the room is left. That is the memory of rhythm.” — Khan



When cadence lingers, memory becomes architecture





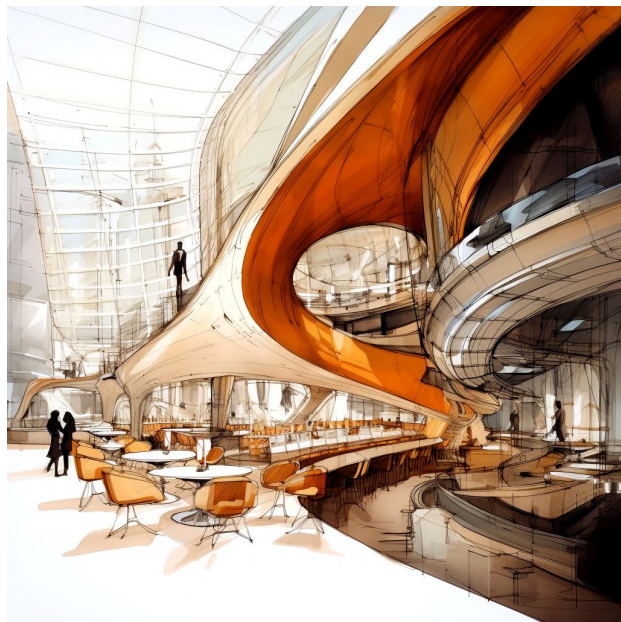
“The last detail, the final shadow, the lingering surface — these are not endings but codas. When cadence fades, what remains is memory made architectural.” — Khan

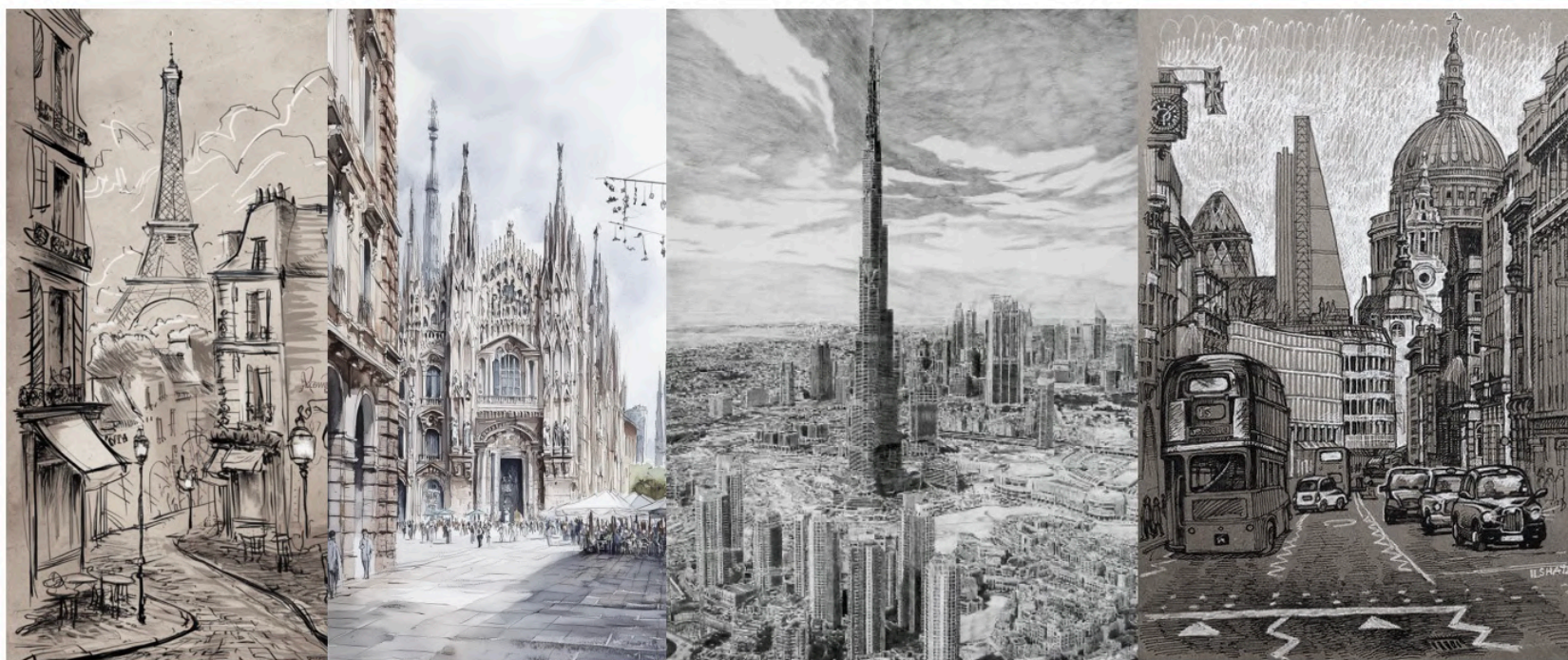

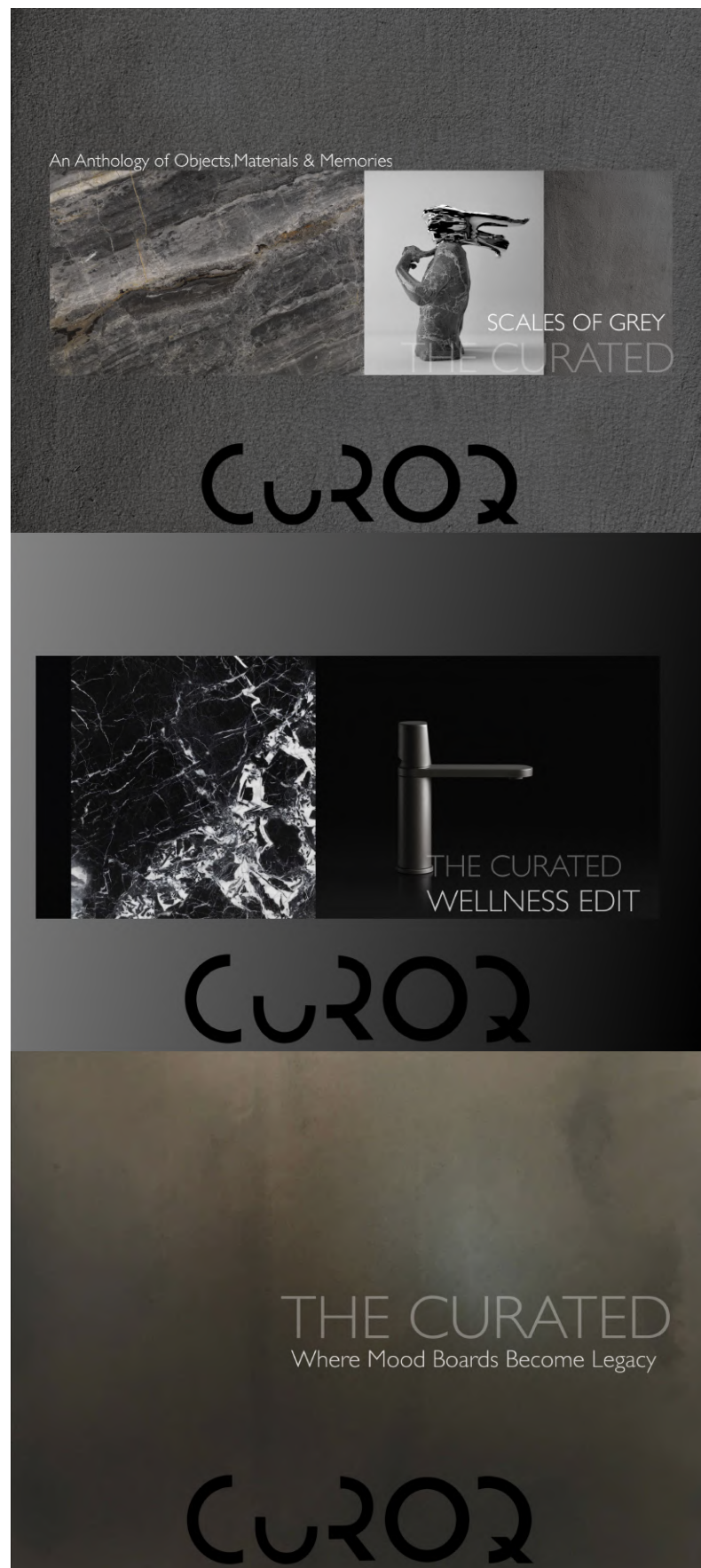
