MORE CHURCH SPEAK

In church we often have a tendency to use words that make sense to us because we have heard them often enough but to outsiders, they make little sense. Even reading the bulletin on Sunday which seems easy can be a strange event to someone unaccustomed to following the "Order of Service." If we have heard the words before, sometimes we can be hard pressed to define what they mean in ordinary terms. Continuing from last month we will address six more words: Absolution; Consecrate; Dispensationalism; Expiation; Missional; Paraclete. Most of these words have volumes written about them. If you find one interesting look it up and see what else you can learn.

Absolution - This word has to do with the wiping away of guilt and the forgiveness of sin. Jesus through his death and resurrection took away our sin and guilt. Because of Jesus we are no longer seen as guilty because Jesus bore our punishment for sin through his suffering and death on the cross.

John 3:16, 17 - 'For God so loved the world that he gave his only Son, so that everyone who believes in him may not perish but may have eternal life. 'Indeed, God did not send the Son into the world to condemn the world but in order that the world might be saved through him. Those who believe in him are not condemned, but those who do not believe are condemned already because they have not believed in the name of the only Son of God.

Acts 2:38-39 "Peter said to them, "Repent and be baptized every one of you in the name of Jesus Christ so that your sins may be forgiven, and you will receive the gift of the Holy Spirit. For the promise is for you, for your children, and for all who are far away, everyone whom the Lord our God calls to him."

1 John 1:9 "f we confess our sins, he who is faithful and just will forgive us our sins and cleanse us from all unrighteousness."

Consecrate: This means to make or declare something holy. Our sanctuary has been consecrated and set apart for the worship of the Lord Jesus Christ. This means that it is sacred space to be used for worship and fellowship with God. This is why we behave reverently in this space not allowing running or coarse language. Consecration involves dedication and pastors through ordination are also formally consecrated to the Lord which means they are set apart for service to God through their ministry. However, we can also consecrate ourselves to Jesus each and every day by giving ourselves over to Him upon awakening. We can thank Him for the day and offer ourselves to be used for Him throughout the day through our thoughts, words and actions.

Dispensationalism: God has two sets of peoples. Israel in the OT and the Church in the NT therefore God has two separate plans. One plan is for the people of Israel and the other for the Church. Dispensationalism was started by John Darby, Lewis Chafer and the Brethren in England in early 1900's and was made popular through the Scofield reference bible.

As Presbyterians we are under covenant theology and not dispensationalism. We believe that God has one people and one plan throughout the OT and NT. The plan of salvation is continuous throughout all history since the fall. There is continuity between the Old and New Testaments and the church is heir to the promises made to Abraham.

Expiation: This is similar to absolution but it is the act of removing sin and its ensuing guilt. This then allows people to be forgiven and their relationship to God to be restored. It takes away sin and guilt so one can receive forgiveness from God. The death of Jesus is an act of expiation that absolved the world of sin. Expiation is a way of atoning for wrongdoing, while atonement is the broader concept of making amends. It extinguishes the guilt incurred through sin.

Missional - Today this word is tossed about regularly within church and is a newish word used in the last 10 years or so. When we say that we are a missional church, it means that we live, think and act in a way that says we belong to Jesus. We engage with others, build relationships, share the gospel and deeply care about God's kingdom. A missional church is one that goes out in to the world to make disciples for the sake of the gospel. Jesus had a mission therefore, the church has a mission. The basic premise is that all Christians should be involved in the Great Commission of Jesus. (Matthew 28:19-20).

Although Christians frequently say, "The church has a mission," according to missional theology a more correct statement would be "the mission has a church."

Paraclete: This is another name for the Holy Spirit, Counselor or Advocate. As we have been studying in Acts, the Holy Spirit was promised by Jesus and sent by God.

John 15:15-17 'If you love me, keep my commands. And I will ask the Father, and he will give you another advocate to help you and be with you forever— the Spirit of truth.

John 14:25-26 "All this I have spoken while still with you. But the Advocate, the Holy Spirit, whom the Father will send in my name, will teach you all things and will remind you of everything I have said to you."

John 16:7 "But very truly I tell you, it is for your good that I am going away. Unless I go away, the Advocate will not come to you; but if I go, I will send him to you."




