

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Prologue – Why the Intruders Series Exists

Many people read the Bible in pieces.

They hear individual verses.

They remember a few well-known stories.

They learn moral lessons from sermons.

Yet the larger story of Scripture often remains unclear.

Without that larger story, many passages of the Bible can feel confusing or even contradictory.

Why does suffering exist in a world created by a good God?

Why does the Bible speak of spiritual warfare?

Why does Jesus speak so often about darkness and light?

Why does evil seem so powerful if God is sovereign?

These questions are not new.

They have troubled readers of Scripture for generations.

The purpose of the **Intruders in God's Good Garden** series is to bring clarity to these questions by stepping back and examining the larger story of the Bible.

The Story the Bible Is Telling

From the opening chapter of Genesis to the final pages of Revelation, the Bible tells a single, unified story.

God created a world that was good.

Very good.

Humanity lived in harmony with its Creator. There was no death, no corruption, no deception, and no suffering. God walked with mankind in fellowship and peace.

But something happened.

Darkness entered the human story.

Once this truth is understood, many difficult passages of Scripture begin to make sense.

The Bible is not describing the normal operation of creation.

It is describing the battle between light and darkness within a fallen world.

Why This Book Matters

Among the books in this series, this one serves a unique purpose.

Before we can understand the intruders themselves, we must understand the **contrast between light and darkness** that runs throughout Scripture.

From the very first chapter of Genesis, God separates light from darkness.

This separation becomes one of the central themes of the entire Bible.

The prophets speak of a people walking in darkness who will see a great light.

Jesus declares Himself to be the Light of the world.

The apostles describe believers as people who have been transferred from darkness into light.

And the final chapter of Scripture promises a world where darkness will exist no more.

Without understanding this theme, many passages of the Bible remain difficult to interpret.

But when the story of light and darkness is seen clearly, the narrative of Scripture begins to unfold with remarkable clarity.

The goal is simple.

To help readers see the larger story that the Bible is telling.

A story that begins with light.

A story that explains the arrival of darkness.

And a story that ultimately leads back to a world filled with the light of God once again.

Understanding this framework allows the rest of the **Intruders series** to be read with new clarity.

Because once we understand the light...

we can finally understand the intruders.

Introduction — Why the World Feels Dark

Most people sense it, even if they cannot explain it.

Something about the world feels... off.

Truth is difficult to find. Lies spread easily. Violence, corruption, and confusion seem to multiply faster than wisdom and peace. Entire societies drift from clarity into moral fog. Even sincere people often struggle to understand what is true and what is not.

The Bible describes this condition in a very simple way: **darkness**.

Darkness in Scripture is not merely the absence of sunlight. It represents blindness, deception, confusion, and separation from God. It describes a world where people struggle to see clearly—spiritually, morally, and even intellectually.

Yet the Bible also begins with a very different picture.

“Let there be light.” — Genesis 1:3

The story of humanity begins in light. God created a world that was orderly, good, and illuminated by His presence. Humanity was placed within that creation not as a random accident of nature, but as a steward—an image-bearer entrusted with responsibility over the earth.

But something changed.

The world we experience today does not resemble the world described in the opening pages of Scripture. Darkness now seems to dominate much of human life. Truth is contested. Deception is common. Even people who sincerely seek goodness often struggle to find their way.

The Bible provides an explanation.

Darkness was not part of God’s original design. It **entered the story**.

One of the central themes of the *Intruders in God's Good Garden* series is that many of the painful realities of our present world are not natural features of creation. They are **intruders**—things that entered after humanity's rebellion. Sin, death, disease, corruption, grief, and confusion all trace their origin to that turning point.

Life outside that presence became life in a darkened world.

From that moment forward, the Bible records the long struggle between light and darkness. Darkness spreads through human history, corrupting hearts and societies. Yet God continually preserves a light—through individuals, through a nation, and ultimately through a person.

That person is Jesus Christ.

“I am the light of the world.” — John 8:12

With Christ, the story pivots. The light that once illuminated the garden enters the world again in human form. His life exposes deception. His teaching reveals truth. His death and resurrection defeat the power of darkness itself.

Yet the story does not end there.

Christ's followers are now called to carry that light into a still-darkened world.

“Ye are the light of the world.” — Matthew 5:14

Believers live in a unique moment in history. Darkness has already been defeated through Christ, but its final removal has not yet occurred. Until that day, followers of Christ live between two kingdoms—the present world still influenced by darkness and the coming kingdom where God's light will fully reign.

Their mission is simple, though not easy.

To walk in the light.

To bear good fruit.

And to help others find their way out of the darkness.

This book explores that story.

It traces how darkness entered the human experience, how it continues to influence the world today, and how the light of Christ exposes and overcomes it. Along the way, we will see why deception is one of the enemy's greatest tools and why truth is so powerful when it finally breaks through the fog.

Most importantly, we will see the calling given to every follower of Christ:

To live as children of light in a dark world.

“For ye were sometimes darkness, but now are ye light in the Lord: walk as children of light.” — Ephesians 5:8

The darkness is real.

But the light has already come.

Chapter 1 — The World Created in Light

In the Beginning

The Bible begins with a simple and powerful statement.

“In the beginning God created the heaven and the earth.” — Genesis 1:1

Before anything existed—before the earth, stars, or humanity—God already was. Creation was not random or accidental. It was intentional and ordered by its Creator.

The First Act of Order

The first recorded act of structure in creation is striking.

“And God said, Let there be light: and there was light.” — Genesis 1:3

Light appears before anything else is organized.

Before land appears.

Before plants grow.

Before animals live.

Before humanity walks the earth.

Light establishes the environment in which life will exist.

God and Light

Scripture repeatedly connects light with God Himself.

“God is light, and in him is no darkness at all.” — 1 John 1:5

Light represents clarity, truth, and life.

Darkness represents confusion, deception, and separation.

From the very beginning the Bible establishes a contrast that will run through the entire story of humanity.

Light.
And darkness.

A World That Was Good

Genesis describes God evaluating His creation again and again.

“And God saw that it was good.” — Genesis 1:10

Finally the summary is given.

“God saw every thing that he had made, and, behold, it was very good.” — Genesis 1:31

The original world was not broken.

There was no corruption.
No disease.
No violence.
No grief.
No death.

The world functioned exactly as God intended.

Humanity's Place

Humanity was created with a unique role in this good creation.

“Let them have dominion... over all the earth.” — Genesis 1:26

Man and woman were not placed on earth as accidents of nature. They were image-bearers of God, entrusted with stewardship over creation.

The Garden of Eden became their home.

It was a place of provision, peace, and fellowship with God.

Fellowship With the Creator

Genesis gives a remarkable picture of life in the garden.

God walked with humanity.

There was no fear.

No hiding.

No shame.

Humanity lived under the light of God's presence.

Creation Through Christ

The New Testament later reveals something profound about creation.

“All things were made by him; and without him was not any thing made that was made.” — John 1:3

“All things were created through him, and for him.” — Colossians 1:16

Christ was present from the beginning.

Creation itself was made through Him and for Him.

This will become important later in the story.

Because the One through whom the world was created will also become the One who restores it.

No Intruders Yet

At the beginning, the world existed exactly as God intended.

There was light.

There was order.

There was harmony between God and humanity.

There were **no intruders**.

No sin.

No death.

No deception.

But that would soon change.

Because before darkness appeared, God gave humanity something important.

A warning.

Chapter 2 – The Warning Before Darkness

A World Still in the Light

The world of Genesis 2 is still the world God originally designed.

Creation is functioning in harmony. Humanity lives within the garden God prepared for them. The relationship between the Creator and His creation is open and peaceful. Nothing yet disturbs the order God established.

The man and woman are not struggling to survive. They are not burdened by fear, sickness, or sorrow. They live within a place of provision and clarity, sustained by the presence of the One who made them.

God places the man within the garden with a purpose.

“And the LORD God took the man, and put him into the garden of Eden to dress it and to keep it.” — Genesis 2:15

Humanity is not created merely to exist. Adam is given responsibility. He is to cultivate the garden and care for what God has entrusted to him.

This stewardship reflects the dominion God granted in the previous chapter. Humanity is meant to serve as a faithful caretaker within God’s creation.

The garden is not a prison. It is a place of abundance.

Freedom Within the Garden

God’s provision for Adam and Eve is generous.

“Of every tree of the garden thou mayest freely eat.” — Genesis 2:16

The command begins with freedom, not restriction. The garden is full of life and nourishment. Humanity is free to enjoy the gifts God has provided.

This detail is often overlooked. God does not place humanity into a world of scarcity. He places them in a world of abundance.

The single command that follows stands out precisely because everything else is permitted.

The One Command

In the midst of this abundance, God gives one restriction.

“But of the tree of the knowledge of good and evil, thou shalt not eat of it.”
— Genesis 2:17

The command is simple.

Do not eat from that tree.

Scripture does not explain every detail about the tree itself. What matters is the relationship behind the command. God is establishing a boundary that requires trust.

Adam and Eve must decide whether they will live under God’s authority or pursue independence from Him.

This command introduces something humanity has not yet experienced: the possibility of disobedience.

The Warning

Along with the command comes a warning.

“For in the day that thou eatest thereof thou shalt surely die.” — Genesis 2:17

This statement introduces a concept that has not yet appeared in the story: death.

Until this moment, death has no place in creation. Nothing in the garden suggests decay, suffering, or loss. Yet God warns that disobedience will bring a consequence humanity cannot yet fully understand.

The warning does not mean death is already present. It simply reveals what will happen if God's command is ignored.

In this moment, the possibility of darkness is introduced—but it has not yet arrived.

Trust and Relationship

The command in the garden is not arbitrary. It serves a deeper purpose.

God desires a relationship with humanity that includes trust. Love and obedience cannot exist without the freedom to choose otherwise. The presence of the command allows Adam and Eve to demonstrate their trust in the Creator who has provided everything they need.

The choice before them is simple but profound.

Trust God and remain within His design.

Or reject His word and pursue their own understanding.

At this moment in the story, humanity still lives entirely within the light of God's presence. Nothing has yet been broken. The garden remains a place of life, peace, and fellowship.

But the warning introduces tension into the story.

Something could go wrong.

A Moment Before the Storm

Genesis 2 ends quietly. The man and woman live in innocence, unaware of the turmoil that will soon follow.

“And they were both naked, the man and his wife, and were not ashamed.” —
Genesis 2:25

There is no shame. No fear. No hiding.

Humanity stands fully exposed before God without embarrassment or guilt.
This is what life looks like when nothing separates people from their Creator.

The world is still filled with light.

Yet the warning remains.

The possibility of death has been spoken.

And soon another voice will enter the story—one that challenges the truth
God has already given.

That voice will introduce the first lie.

Chapter 3 — The First Lie

A New Voice Enters the Garden

Until this moment, the only voice shaping humanity's understanding of the world has been God's.

His words created the earth.
His commands established order.
His presence defined reality.

But in Genesis 3, another voice appears.

“Now the serpent was more subtil than any beast of the field which the LORD God had made.” — Genesis 3:1

The serpent does not arrive with violence.
He does not force anything.

Instead, he speaks.

This is important. The first intrusion into God's good creation is not destruction. It is deception.

Darkness does not begin with force.

It begins with a lie.

The Question That Changes Everything

The serpent's first words seem harmless.

“Yea, hath God said...?” — Genesis 3:1

With a single question, doubt enters the human mind.

The serpent does not immediately deny God's command. Instead, he invites Eve to reconsider it.

Did God really say that?

The strategy is subtle. If God's word can be questioned, then God's authority can be weakened. Once doubt takes root, obedience becomes negotiable.

This moment introduces the method that will define darkness throughout human history.

Truth is not attacked directly.

It is slowly eroded.

Distorting God's Word

Eve responds by repeating God's command.

“God hath said, Ye shall not eat of it, neither shall ye touch it, lest ye die.” — Genesis 3:3

Whether the additional phrase “neither shall ye touch it” reflects Eve's interpretation or Adam's earlier explanation, the conversation has already shifted.

God's clear command is now being debated.

The serpent presses further.

The First Direct Lie

Now the serpent speaks plainly.

“Ye shall not surely die.” — Genesis 3:4

This is the first recorded lie in human history.

God said death would follow disobedience.

The serpent says it will not.

Two competing truths now stand before Eve.

Trust the word of God.

Or trust the voice questioning Him.

The serpent continues by attacking God's character.

“For God doth know that in the day ye eat thereof, then your eyes shall be opened.” — Genesis 3:5

The suggestion is clear: God is withholding something good.

Instead of protecting humanity, God is portrayed as limiting them.

This accusation introduces the core deception that still shapes human thinking today.

Maybe God cannot be trusted.

The Appeal of the Lie

Genesis describes Eve's growing interest in the forbidden fruit.

“The tree was good for food... pleasant to the eyes... and a tree to be desired to make one wise.” — Genesis 3:6

The temptation unfolds in three directions:

Physical desire.

Visual attraction.

The promise of wisdom.

The lie makes disobedience appear reasonable.

Instead of rebellion, it begins to look like opportunity.

The serpent has successfully shifted Eve's focus away from God's command and toward her own judgment.

Darkness is beginning to take hold.

The Pattern of Deception

The New Testament later identifies the serpent clearly.

“That old serpent, called the Devil, and Satan, which deceiveth the whole world.” — Revelation 12:9

Jesus Himself describes Satan’s nature.

“He was a murderer from the beginning... for he is a liar, and the father of it.” — John 8:44

From the beginning, deception has been Satan’s primary weapon.

He does not create new truth.

He distorts what God has already said.

This explains much about the confusion that surrounds humanity even today. Darkness often hides behind words that sound reasonable.

But behind the lie stands the same ancient enemy.

The Shadow Before the Fall

At this point in the story, the world has not yet changed.

The fruit has not been eaten.

Humanity has not yet rebelled.

The garden is still filled with light.

Yet something new now exists within the human mind.

Doubt.

The serpent has successfully planted a question about God’s goodness and authority.

Darkness has not yet entered the world.

But its shadow has appeared.

The decision that follows will determine the course of human history.

Chapter 4 — The Choice That Changed the World

The Moment of Decision

The conversation with the serpent reaches its turning point in a single moment.

The doubt planted by deception now moves toward action.

Genesis records the decision simply and directly.

“And when the woman saw that the tree was good for food, and that it was pleasant to the eyes, and a tree to be desired to make one wise, she took of the fruit thereof, and did eat.” — Genesis 3:6

What had been only a conversation now becomes rebellion.

The command of God is no longer debated.

It is ignored.

The First Act of Disobedience

Eve eats the fruit. But the event does not stop there.

“And gave also unto her husband with her; and he did eat.” — Genesis 3:6

Adam participates fully in the act.

Scripture later identifies Adam as the representative head of humanity in this moment.

“Wherefore, as by one man sin entered into the world...” — Romans 5:12

This is the moment where the human story changes.

The steward of God’s creation rejects the command of the Creator.

The trust that once defined the relationship between God and humanity is broken.

Eyes Opened

The serpent promised that their eyes would be opened.

In a sense, he was telling the truth.

But not in the way Eve expected.

“And the eyes of them both were opened, and they knew that they were naked.” — Genesis 3:7

The awareness that comes is not wisdom.

It is shame.

Something inside humanity has changed. What was once innocent now feels exposed. The man and woman immediately attempt to cover themselves.

“They sewed fig leaves together, and made themselves aprons.” — Genesis 3:7

For the first time, humanity feels the need to hide.

Hiding From God

The next scene reveals how deeply the relationship has been damaged.

“They heard the voice of the LORD God walking in the garden... and Adam and his wife hid themselves from the presence of the LORD God.” — Genesis 3:8

Before this moment, God’s presence was the center of their life.

Now it produces fear.

Humanity hides among the trees of the garden.

This is the first sign of spiritual darkness beginning to take hold.

The relationship that once produced peace now produces dread.

The First Question

God calls out to the man.

“Where art thou?” — Genesis 3:9

The question is not asked because God lacks knowledge. It invites Adam to step forward and acknowledge what has happened.

Adam answers honestly.

“I heard thy voice in the garden, and I was afraid... and I hid myself.” — Genesis 3:10

Fear has entered the human experience.

Fear had no place in the garden before this moment.

The Blame Begins

God continues the conversation.

“Hast thou eaten of the tree...?” — Genesis 3:11

Adam’s response reveals another change.

“The woman whom thou gavest to be with me, she gave me of the tree, and I did eat.” — Genesis 3:12

Responsibility is shifted.

Adam blames Eve.

Eve blames the serpent.

“The serpent beguiled me, and I did eat.” — Genesis 3:13

This pattern will continue throughout human history.

Instead of acknowledging guilt, humanity instinctively looks for someone else to blame.

The Entrance of Darkness

Until this moment, the world still existed under the light of God’s design.

Now the consequences of disobedience begin to unfold.

Sin has entered the human story.

The relationship between God and humanity has been fractured.

Shame replaces innocence.

Fear replaces peace.

Blame replaces unity.

The garden still stands.

But something inside humanity has changed.

Darkness has begun to enter the world.

And its effects will spread far beyond this single moment.

Chapter 5 – The Birth of Darkness

When the Light Was Lost

The moment Adam and Eve disobeyed God, something profound changed in the human condition.

Yet every life transformed by Christ becomes another point of light in the darkness.

And the promise of Scripture remains clear.

The light is growing.

And the darkness will not ultimately prevail.

Chapter 15 – Carrying the Light in a Dark World

The Struggle of the Light-Bearer

When a person comes to Christ, the light of God enters their life.

They are delivered from the authority of darkness and brought into the kingdom of God's Son.

Yet something surprising quickly becomes clear.

The battle is not over.

The believer now lives in a world still deeply shaped by darkness. Temptations remain. Old habits whisper. Pride quietly returns. Even sincere followers of Christ sometimes stumble.

Scripture never hides this reality.

The Christian life is not effortless.

It is a daily walk that requires vigilance.

The Battle Within

One of the most honest descriptions of this struggle comes from the Apostle Paul.

“For the good that I would I do not: but the evil which I would not, that I do.”
— Romans 7:19

Paul is not describing an unbeliever. He is describing the internal conflict experienced by someone who loves God yet still lives in a fallen body.

The believer has received the light.

But the old nature has not yet disappeared.

This creates tension within the heart.

The spirit longs for righteousness.

The flesh often resists it.

The Temptation to Take Shortcuts

Because of this tension, believers sometimes try to accomplish God's work in their own strength.

Instead of patiently trusting God's timing, people attempt to "help" Him.

Scripture records many examples of this mistake.

Abraham believed God's promise of a son, yet he attempted to secure the promise through human effort with Hagar.

"Sarai said unto Abram... go in unto my maid." — Genesis 16:2

The result created conflict that lasted generations.

Even faithful believers can fall into the trap of trying to force God's purposes through human methods.

But the kingdom of light does not advance through human control.

It advances through obedience and trust.

The Danger of Pride

Another danger for those carrying the light is pride.

When believers begin walking faithfully, it can become tempting to view themselves as stronger or wiser than others.

Yet pride itself was the original doorway through which darkness entered the human story.

Scripture repeatedly warns believers about this danger.

“Wherefore let him that thinketh he standeth take heed lest he fall.” — 1 Corinthians 10:12

Even mature Christians must remain humble.

The light they carry does not originate from themselves.

It comes from God.

The Need for Vigilance

Because the believer still lives in a dark world, Scripture calls for watchfulness.

“Be sober, be vigilant; because your adversary the devil, as a roaring lion, walketh about, seeking whom he may devour.” — 1 Peter 5:8

The enemy who introduced deception in the garden continues using the same strategy today.

Lies.

Distractions.

Half-truths.

Small compromises that slowly dim the light.

Without vigilance, even sincere believers can drift.

The Light Within

The good news is that Christians are not left to fight this battle alone.

When someone comes to Christ, God places His own Spirit within them.

The Holy Spirit becomes the believer’s guide, helper, and source of strength.

Jesus promised this before His departure.

“The Comforter, which is the Holy Ghost... he shall teach you all things.” — John 14:26

The light that believers carry does not depend on their own ability.

It depends on the presence of God within them.

Walking in the Spirit

Because of this, the Christian life is not about trying harder.

It is about walking with the Spirit of God.

Paul explains the difference clearly.

“Walk in the Spirit, and ye shall not fulfil the lust of the flesh.” — Galatians 5:16

The believer’s strength does not come from discipline alone.

It comes from dependence.

The Spirit guides, convicts, strengthens, and corrects.

When believers remain close to the light, they gain the strength needed to resist the darkness.

Progress, Not Perfection

The journey of faith is rarely smooth.

Even faithful believers experience setbacks.

Yet Scripture consistently encourages perseverance rather than perfection.

Growth happens over time.

The light becomes clearer as believers continue walking with Christ.

Each step of obedience strengthens the next.

Each moment of humility deepens trust.

The Christian life is not defined by flawless performance.

It is defined by continual return to the light.

And through the Spirit of God working within them, believers gain the strength to keep shining in a dark world.

Chapter 16 – Darkness Defeated, Yet Still Present

The Decisive Victory

When Jesus went to the cross, something happened that many people did not immediately understand.

To the outside observer, it looked like defeat.

The Son of God was rejected by His own people, condemned by earthly authorities, and executed on a Roman cross.

This moment marked the turning point of human history.

The intruders that entered through the fall—sin, deception, and death—had been confronted directly by the Light of the world.

Christ had overcome them.

Why Darkness Still Exists

Chapter 17 – The End of Darkness

Direct fellowship with God.

In Eden, God walked with humanity.

The darkness that once dominated the world will disappear.

Why This Matters

When people misunderstand the source of the world's problems, they often search for the wrong solutions.

Some try to fix humanity through politics.

Others trust education, technology, or economic progress to repair the human condition.

While these things may improve certain aspects of life, none of them can address the deeper issue.

The problem of darkness begins in the human heart.

This is why the story of the Bible does not end with judgment or destruction.

It moves toward redemption.

God did not abandon His creation to the intruders.

He sent the Light.

The Light That Confronts the Darkness

Jesus entered the world as the Light of God.

He revealed truth, confronted deception, and demonstrated the power of God's kingdom. Through His death and resurrection, He defeated the deepest powers of darkness.

The victory has already begun.

Believers now live as children of the light in a world that still struggles with darkness.
