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## INTRODUCTION — Look Up

### **Look up.**

Before we argue, before we quote Scripture, before we talk about covenants or Christ or eternity —  
just look up.

The heavens speak long before a preacher ever opens his mouth.

**This is not chaos.**

but to show that Christian belief fits the world as it actually is.

We will ask deep questions and give honest answers.

But all of it will point to one truth:

## CHAPTER 1 — The Universe That Should Not Exist

**Start here.**

Not with religion.

Not with doctrine.

Not even with Scripture.

Start with the world every human being can see.

Because whether someone is a believer or a skeptic,  
a scientist or a farmer,  
a child or a philosopher—  
we all live under the same sky.

And the sky is preaching.

### **The Universe Is Too Precise to Be an Accident**

If the universe were random, chaotic, or accidental,  
it would *look* random.

It would *behave* random.

It would collapse under its own chaos.

Instead, what do we find?

Mathematical precision.

Unbreakable laws.

Constants so finely tuned that a microscopic adjustment would make life impossible.

This isn't religious poetry.

This is physics.

- If gravity were slightly weaker or stronger, no galaxies would form.
- If the electromagnetic force varied slightly, atoms wouldn't exist.
- If the Earth were a hair closer to the sun, we would burn.

- A hair farther, and everything would freeze.
- If water didn't expand when it froze, all oceans would freeze solid from the bottom up.

These are not poetic exaggerations.

These are cold, hard scientific realities.

The universe looks designed because it *is* designed.

And Scripture simply names what science describes:

*"The heavens declare the glory of God."*

—Psalm 19:1

### **Fine-Tuning Demands a Fine-Tuner**

Scientists call it the "fine-tuning problem."

They acknowledge the precision.

They admit the numbers are astronomical.

They agree the universe is balanced on a razor's edge.

But many refuse to take the next logical step.

Because if the universe is fine-tuned,  
someone must have fine-tuned it.

You don't get a dictionary by shaking a box of letters.

You don't get a symphony by dropping a piano down the stairs.

You don't get moral creatures from meaningless chemicals.

And you don't get life from a universe that shouldn't support life.

A Designer is the most logical explanation for design.

This is not blind faith.

This is common sense.

### **Creation Reveals the Creator**

Long before physics textbooks were printed,  
Paul wrote these words:

*“God’s invisible attributes—His eternal power and divine nature—  
have been clearly seen, being understood from what has been made...”*  
—Romans 1:20

In other words:

### **Creation reveals the Creator.**

Even for people who have never read the Bible.  
Even for cultures that never knew Israel’s story.  
Even for atheists staring into telescopes.

God built evidence into the universe itself.

The heavens are not silent.  
The universe is not neutral.

It tilts toward meaning.  
Toward purpose.  
Toward order.  
Toward God.

### **If the Universe Has a Beginning, Then It Has a Beginner**

Everything that begins to exist has a cause.

You began to exist.  
I began to exist.  
Stars began.  
Galaxies began.  
The universe itself began.

Even secular cosmology agrees that time, space, matter, and energy all had a starting point.

If time began,  
the cause must be timeless.  
If space began,  
the cause must be beyond space.  
If matter began,  
the cause must be immaterial.  
If energy began,  
the cause must be powerful beyond imagining.

Who fits that description?

Only God.

Genesis 1:1 is not childish.  
It is profound beyond physics:

**“In the beginning, God...”**

Not chance.  
Not chaos.  
Not blind forces.  
God.

### **A Universe That Should Not Exist—But Does**

Astrophysicists admit the odds of a life-permitting universe are so small,  
you could not write the number on paper.

One physicist said the fine-tuning is like dialing a radio knob to one exact  
trillionth of a trillionth of a trillion of the spectrum—and hitting the precise  
frequency on the first try.

If the universe shouldn't exist...  
but it does...  
and everything about it points toward intention...  
then the most reasonable conclusion is:

**Someone intended it.**

Someone powerful.  
Someone intelligent.  
Someone outside of time and space.  
Someone who wanted life to exist,  
and designed it so it could.

### **The Seed We Must Plant**

Before we get to covenants...  
Before we talk about Scripture...  
Before we examine morality, purpose, or Jesus Himself...  
we must plant this seed:

**A Designer must exist.**  
**The universe demands Him.**  
**Creation testifies to Him.**  
**Reason points to Him.**  
**Scripture confirms Him.**  
**Faith responds to Him.**

This is not the end of the argument.  
It is the beginning.

And every honest seeker must begin where God Himself began:

**“In the beginning...”**



## CHAPTER 2 — The Imprint on the Human Heart

The universe tells us something about God.  
But the human heart tells us something even more personal.

Because while creation declares His power,  
**conscience declares His character.**

Every person—every culture—every era—

and some things are wrong.

That imprint is not learned.

The conscience is not created by culture.  
It is awakened by God.

### **Every Society Punishes Some Wrongs**

We may disagree on the details,  
but there has never been a society —  
not one —  
that celebrates murder,  
rewards theft,  
or admires betrayal.

Even when cultures drift from God,  
their laws still reveal His imprint:

- Justice systems exist everywhere.
- Moral codes appear across nations.
- Some form of “right and wrong” is universally recognized.

This is astonishing if we are just evolved animals.  
Animals do not create moral categories.  
Wolves do not hold court trials.  
Apes do not debate ethics.

Morality is uniquely human  
because morality is divinely imprinted.

### **We Know What We Cannot Explain**



If we are honest,  
we recognize injustice even when we cannot explain *why* it is unjust.

When a corrupt person rises to power—something in us groans.  
When an innocent child suffers—something in us protests.  
When a hero sacrifices himself—something in us rises.

We do not reason these feelings into existence.  
They rise naturally.

And the question is:

**Why does the human heart care so deeply about justice in a universe that, without God, has no justice?**

### **Evolution Cannot Produce Moral Outrage**

Evolution can explain survival instincts.  
It can explain the desire to avoid harm.  
It can explain social cooperation.

But it cannot explain:

- outrage at injustice.

Evolution says the strong eat the weak.  
Yet our hearts insist the weak deserve protection.

Evolution says survival is all that matters.  
Yet we celebrate martyrs who died for principle.

Evolution says the fittest win.  
Yet we call it evil when the powerful crush the powerless.

The human heart rebels against a godless universe.

### **The Conscience Is a Messenger**

Where does conscience come from?  
Why does it speak with such authority?  
Why does guilt weigh us down?  
Why does righteousness lift us up?

Because the conscience is a messenger from God.

C. S. Lewis called it “the clue to the meaning of the universe.”  
Paul called it the proof of God’s law written within us.

We are not morally neutral beings.  
We are morally stamped beings.

Stamped by the One who formed us.

### **Good and Evil Require a Standard**

If there is no God,  
then there is no absolute morality.  
Right and wrong become personal preferences.  
Evil becomes an opinion.  
Justice becomes a social construct.

But no one lives that way.

Even the atheist demands justice.  
Even the relativist gets offended at injustice.  
Even the skeptic feels guilt.

Why?

Because morality requires a standard—  
and standards require a standard-giver.

You cannot have objective good  
without an objective God.

You cannot have real evil  
unless good exists.

You cannot have a moral law  
without a moral Lawgiver.

### **A Moral Universe Demands a Moral God**

The conscience is a compass.  
It points toward a moral north.

But a compass is useless unless true north exists.

The human heart feels justice  
because justice flows from the heart of God.

The human heart recognizes evil  
because evil is a departure from God's goodness.

The human heart longs for righteousness

We ache for restoration because He is Redeemer.

## **The Imprint Leads to the Imprinter**

Just as design in the universe leads us to a Designer,  
the moral imprint in the heart leads us to the Imprinter.

Eternal.

This is the seed God plants in every soul.

Not to condemn us,  
but to draw us.

wrote His law on our hearts.

## CHAPTER 3 — The Ache for Meaning and Eternity

Because the ache is not physical.  
It is spiritual.

And we cannot fill a spiritual vacuum  
with earthly things.

## **Time Doesn't Heal the Ache**

We try to distract ourselves.

We stay busy.

We accumulate.

We chase experiences.

We chase religion.

We chase self-help.

But time only exposes the truth:

**The ache is persistent  
because its source is eternal.**

Solomon—the wisest man who ever lived—  
summed it up with one sentence:

*“He has set eternity in the human heart...”*  
—Ecclesiastes 3:11

Eternity is not just a future destination.

## **If We Are Accidents, Why Do We Long for Home?**

### **What Does It Mean to Bear God's Image?**

## **CHAPTER 5 — The Problem of Evil, Suffering, and Free Will**

If God is good...  
and God is powerful...  
and God made us for relationship...  
then why is the world so broken?

Why do children suffer?  
Why do tyrants rise?  
Why does sickness come?  
Why do we lose people we love?  
Why do the righteous sometimes fall and the wicked sometimes prosper?

Every thinking person asks these questions.  
Every honest believer wrestles with them.

This is not a philosophical exercise.  
This is life.

### **The World Does Not Look Like the Garden**

If God created harmony,  
why do we live with hostility?

If He intended fellowship,  
why do we feel alone?

If He designed abundance,  
why is so much scarce?

This world still carries echoes of Eden—beauty, wonder, joy—  
but it also carries the scars of something terrible.

We see the fingerprints of God,  
but we also see the shadow of rebellion.

And to understand suffering,  
we must understand how a perfect world became broken.

### **Love Requires Freedom — And Freedom Requires Risk**

If God wanted creatures who simply obeyed without choice,  
He could have made robots.  
He could have programmed obedience.  
He could have removed the possibility of evil entirely.

But without choice,  
love cannot exist.

Forced love is not love.  
Programmed love is not love.

everything else fractured with it.

This explains the world better than anything else:

but damaged by sin.**

### **Suffering: The Consequence of a Broken World**

Some suffering comes from our own choices.

Some from living in a world groaning under the weight of decay.

Scripture describes it with haunting accuracy:

*"The whole creation has been groaning  
as in the pains of childbirth..."*

—Romans 8:22

Creation itself is in labor—

## **Why Doesn't God Stop All Evil?**

If God stopped every evil act immediately,

He would have to remove **us**.

Because evil is not a force outside humanity.  
It flows from the human heart.

We want God to stop evil **without touching us**.  
But the heart of evil beats inside the very people He came to save.

## **God's Answer to Suffering Was Not Distance, But Incarnation**

Other religions teach that:

- God is distant,
- God is unmoved,
- God is untouched by human pain.

But Scripture says something else:

**God stepped into suffering.**  
**God wore flesh.**

**God felt pain.**

**God entered the broken world to heal it from within.**

Jesus said:

*“In this world you will have trouble.*

*But take heart!*

*I have overcome the world.”*

—John 16:33

He did not say we would escape suffering—

He said He would overcome it.

He did not avoid pain—

He entered it.

The cross is God’s response to suffering:

Not explanation.

Identification.

Redemption.

On the cross, God Himself suffered evil  
to destroy evil’s power.

## **The Cross Answers Suffering in Three Ways**

### **1. God Is Not Distant**

He knows grief, betrayal, injustice, torture.

No one can say, “God, You don’t understand.”

### **2. God Is Not Defeated**

The resurrection proves evil does not get the last word.

### **3. God Will Not Leave Things Broken**

Justice will come.  
Restoration will come.  
A new creation will come.  
The Garden will return.

Romans 8 promises:

*“The sufferings of this present time  
are not worth comparing  
with the glory that will be revealed.”*  
—Romans 8:18

Suffering is real.  
But suffering is temporary.  
Glory is eternal.

## **God Uses Suffering Without Causing Suffering**

We must be careful here:  
God does not create evil.  
God does not delight in pain.  
God does not design cruelty.

But He can use suffering  
to accomplish what comfort never could.

Suffering:

- humbles us,
- awakens us,
- refines us,
- strengthens compassion,
- breaks pride,
- deepens faith,



- loosens our grip on temporary things,
- opens our eyes to eternal things.

Suffering is not good.  
But God is good in suffering.

## **The Problem of Evil Becomes the Evidence for God**

This chapter ends with a quiet but powerful realization:

If the world were truly accidental,  
there would be no such thing as “evil,”  
because no one would have the right to define it.

If we were just chemicals,  
suffering would be meaningless.

If morality were invented,  
injustice would be opinion.

But the very fact that we feel the weight of evil—  
that we grieve loss,  
that we protest injustice,  
that we long for restoration—  
is proof the world is not as it was meant to be.

And that longing for healing  
points directly back to the Healer.

## **The Seed for the Next Chapter**

## **CHAPTER 6 — Thus, Our Manual: Why the Bible Is Trustworthy**

We have followed the evidence to a clear conclusion:

- The universe demands a Designer.
- The conscience demands a Lawgiver.
- The human ache demands a purpose-giver.
- The broken world demands a Redeemer.

So now we must ask:

**Has this God spoken?**

**Has He revealed Himself?**

**Has He given us something solid to stand on —  
a manual for life, truth, and eternity?**

Christians claim He has.

Skeptics question it.

And the Bible remains at the center of the debate.

So the question is simple:

**Why do we trust the Bible?**

**Why this book?**

**Why these pages?**

**Why this story?**

Let's begin where we should always begin —  
with evidence and reason.

### **1. Preservation: A Miracle in Plain Sight**

The Bible has survived against impossible odds.

- Written over 1,500 years
- Cut across 3 continents
- Penned by 40+ authors
- Composed in 3 languages
- Copied by hand for centuries
- Banned, burned, outlawed, mocked
- Fought by kings and empires
- Attacked by critics for generations

And yet... it endured.

No other ancient book has survived like Scripture.

**Statistically, this should not have been possible.**

But it was exactly as God said:

*“The grass withers, the flower fades,  
but the word of our God will stand forever.”*  
—Isaiah 40:8

The Bible did not survive by human effort.  
It survived because God preserved it.

## **2. Archaeology: The Bible’s Silent Partner**

For centuries, critics claimed the Bible was myth.  
That its places, names, and kings were invented.  
That ancient Israel’s stories were legends.

Then the ground started speaking.

Shovels went into the dirt,  
and the earth began confirming Scripture piece by piece.

Examples:

- The **Tel Dan Stele** proved King David was historical.
- The discovery of thousands of **Hittite artifacts** proved they were real, not fictional.
- The **Pilate Inscription** confirmed Pontius Pilate's governance in Judea.
- The **Cyrus Cylinder** affirmed Persian policy matching Ezra's account.
- Excavations at **Jericho, Nineveh, Babylon, and Capernaum** continue to align with the biblical record.

No other religious book on earth is validated historically like the Bible.

Archaeology cannot prove everything in Scripture,  
but everything archaeology uncovers points in the same direction:

**The Bible is rooted in real history.**

### **3. Qumran and the Dead Sea Scrolls: A 1,000-Year Leap Back in Time**

Before 1947, critics said the Old Testament had been altered over time.  
That its message had evolved.  
That we could not know what the original texts said.

Then shepherd boys near Qumran found jars filled with scrolls.

They contained manuscripts over **1,000 years older**  
than our previously oldest copies.

When scholars compared them to the Masoretic Text (which modern Bible translations use),  
something shocking happened:

**They matched—over 99% accuracy.**

The book of Isaiah found at Qumran  
was virtually identical  
to the Isaiah we read today.

A thousand years of hand-copying  
did not corrupt the message.

God's preservation stood firm.

#### **4. Unity Across Centuries: A Single Story**

If I asked 40 people today  
from different backgrounds, cultures, and centuries  
to write a book about God,  
we would get chaos.

Confusion.

Contradictions.

But the Bible—  
written by 40+ authors over 15 centuries—  
tells one unfolding story:

**God creates.**

- life-transforming power

A divine book should look divine.  
The Bible does.

## **7. The Bible Is Not Just Information — It Is Revelation**

Most books explain man’s thoughts about God.

This is why the Bible speaks with an authority  
no other book carries.

This is why its words convict.

## **CHAPTER 9 — The Resurrection: The Ground of Our Hope**

Everything in Christianity rises or falls on one event.

Not Jesus' birth—  
though miraculous.  
Not His miracles—  
though undeniable.  
Not His teachings—  
though perfect.  
Not even His crucifixion—  
though central.

**Christianity stands or collapses on the resurrection.**

Paul said it plainly:

*“If Christ has not been raised,  
your faith is futile...”*  
—1 Corinthians 15:17

If Jesus did not rise,  
He is just another teacher who died.

But if Jesus rose,  
He is the Son of God,  
the fulfillment of prophecy,  
the Savior of the world,  
and the rightful King of eternity.

The resurrection is not an accessory to Christianity.  
It *is* Christianity.

So the question is simple:

**Did it happen?**

And the evidence is overwhelming.

## **1. The Empty Tomb**

No account—Christian or non-Christian—claims the body of Jesus remained in the tomb.

Everyone agreed the tomb was empty.

Romans had no motive to steal the body.

The Jewish leaders had every motive to keep it there.

The disciples were terrified, scattered, and powerless.

Yet by dawn on Sunday morning,  
the stone was rolled away  
and the tomb was empty.

The body was never found.

The grave was never discovered.

The location was publicly known.

The authorities could not silence the story  
because they could not produce the body.

The empty tomb demands an explanation.

## **2. The Eyewitnesses**

Christianity did not begin with a feeling  
or a legend  
or a mystical experience.

It began with people seeing Jesus alive.

Paul lists the eyewitnesses plainly:

*“..He appeared to Cephas, then to the Twelve.  
After that He appeared to more than five hundred brothers at one time...  
Then He appeared to James...*

*Last of all He appeared to me also.”*  
— 1 Corinthians 15:5–8

This is not myth.  
This is testimony.

Eyewitness testimony from:

- fishermen,
- tax collectors,
- women,
- skeptics,
- doubters,
- enemies,
- and a persecutor named Saul.

These were not hallucinations.  
Hallucinations do not occur to groups.  
Hallucinations do not touch wounds.  
Hallucinations do not eat fish on the shore of Galilee.

Jesus was seen.  
Jesus was touched.  
Jesus was heard.  
Jesus was alive.

### **3. The Transformation of the Disciples**

Before the resurrection:

- the disciples were terrified
- hiding

- doubting
- denying
- running

After the resurrection:

- they preached fearlessly
- they traveled boldly
- they proclaimed Christ openly
- they endured persecution
- they accepted imprisonment
- they died for Him

Men do not die for a lie they invented.  
Cowards do not become martyrs overnight.  
Something changed them—  
something powerful enough to rewrite their futures.

That “something” was a Someone resurrected.

#### **4. The Conversion of Skeptics**

Two dramatic conversions anchor the resurrection:

##### **James — skeptical brother turned leader**

James did not believe in Jesus during His ministry (John 7:5).  
But after the resurrection, he became a pillar of the early church.

Why?

Paul tells us:

*“Then He appeared... to James.”*  
— 1 Corinthians 15:7

One moment changed him.

### **Paul — enemy turned apostle**

Saul hunted Christians.  
He approved of Stephen’s stoning.  
He breathed threats and murder.

Then he saw the risen Christ.

He went from persecuting the church  
to writing half the New Testament.

A hallucination does not do that.  
A lie does not do that.  
A myth does not do that.

Only a risen Savior does.

## **5. The Explosion of the Early Church**

Christianity spread through the Roman Empire  
not because it was convenient,  
not because it offered social advantages,  
not because it promised safety.

It spread because:

**Jesus rose**  
**and eyewitnesses would not stop talking about it.**

Christianity began in the city where Jesus was killed.  
If the resurrection were false,  
Jerusalem would have been the easiest place to disprove it.

Yet within weeks:

- thousands believed
- hostile priests converted
- synagogues erupted in debate
- Roman officials investigated
- churches formed

Something undeniable had happened.

## **6. The Willingness to Suffer and Die**

People will die for something they *think* is true.  
But no one dies for something they *know* is false.

Every apostle but John  
died violently for the resurrection they claimed to have seen.

They gained nothing in this world—  
no wealth,  
no kingdoms,  
no comfort.

They gained suffering, prison, beating, exile.

Why endure that?

Because they had seen Jesus alive.

## **7. The Early Creed (1 Corinthians 15)**

Scholars agree that 1 Corinthians 15 contains  
an early Christian creed dated to within **five years** of the resurrection.



It declares:

- Christ died
- Christ was buried
- Christ rose
- Christ appeared

This was not a story that developed over generations.  
It was the proclamation of eyewitnesses.

## **8. Every Alternative Explanation Fails**

**“The disciples stole the body.”**

Impossible—Roman guards, heavy stone, terrified apostles.

**“Jesus never died.”**

Romans were professional executioners; spears through hearts do not leave survivors.

**“The women went to the wrong tomb.”**

Then the authorities would have produced the right tomb.

**“It was a hallucination.”**

Groups do not hallucinate the same thing.  
Hallucinations do not have breakfast with you.

**“It was a legend.”**

Legends take time; Christianity exploded instantly.

Only one explanation fits the evidence:

**Jesus rose from the dead.**

**The Resurrection Is Not Just Proof—It Is Promise**

Because Jesus rose:

- death will not have the last word,
- sin is defeated,
- judgment is satisfied,
- the new covenant is sealed,
- the Spirit has come,
- the mission continues,
- eternity is open,
- hope is unshakeable.

Paul concludes:

*“Death has been swallowed up in victory.”*  
—1 Corinthians 15:54

The resurrection is not a doctrine to agree with.  
It is a reality to live within.

### **If Christ Is Not Raised...**

...nothing else in this book matters.  
Nothing in Scripture matters.  
Nothing in the universe matters.

But if Christ *is* raised—  
everything matters.

Your life matters.  
Your faith matters.  
Your suffering matters.  
Your eternity matters.

The resurrection is our anchor.

Our ground.

Our hope.

Our certainty.

### **The Seed for the Next Chapter**

If Jesus truly rose,  
then Christianity is not a blind leap  
into the dark.

It is a reasonable step  
into the light.

And yet questions remain.

Hard questions.  
Common objections.  
Honest doubts.

So the next chapter asks:

**If this is all true,  
why do people still struggle to believe?  
And how do we answer their questions with grace and truth?**

That is Chapter 10.



## CHAPTER 10 — The Most Common Objections (and Honest Answers)

Even with creation pointing to a Designer,  
conscience pointing to a Lawgiver,  
purpose pointing to eternity,  
Scripture pointing to revelation,  
and the resurrection pointing to Christ—  
many still struggle.

Honest questions remain.  
And God is not threatened by honest questions.

“Come now, let us reason together,”  
He says (Isaiah 1:18).

So in this chapter, we reason.  
We answer the objections that surface most often—  
not with arrogance,  
not with dismissiveness,  
but with gentleness and truth  
(1 Peter 3:15).

### Objection 1 — “If God exists, who created God?”

This sounds clever,  
but it misunderstands the question.

Everything that **begins** to exist  
must have a cause.

The universe began to exist.  
Time began.  
Matter began.  
Energy began.

So the universe needs a cause.

But God did not begin to exist.  
He is eternal.  
He is outside time.  
He has no starting point.

*“From everlasting to everlasting, You are God.”*  
—Psalm 90:2

If God were created,  
He would not be God.

Asking “Who created God?”  
is like asking “What is north of the North Pole?”

The question cancels itself.

## **Objection 2 — “Why would a loving God send people to hell?”**

Hell is not God’s desire.  
Hell is man’s choice.

God’s heart is clear:

*“He does not want anyone to perish.”*  
—2 Peter 3:9

But love requires freedom.  
And freedom means we can accept or reject God.

Hell is not God throwing people away.  
Hell is God honoring the decision of those  
who want life without Him.

God invites all to Himself.  
He paid for our salvation with His own blood.  
He holds out mercy to every person.

But He will not force anyone into heaven.

C. S. Lewis said it well:

*“There are only two kinds of people—  
those who say to God, ‘Thy will be done,’  
and those to whom God says, ‘Thy will be done.’”*

Hell is the consequence of rejecting the only source of life.

### **Objection 3 — “Why are Christians hypocrites?”**

Because Christians are sinners in need of the very grace they proclaim.

The failures of believers do not disprove Christ.  
They prove why we need Him.

Jesus was blunt:

*“Those who are well have no need of a physician,  
but those who are sick.”*  
—Mark 2:17

The church is not a museum of perfect people.  
It is a hospital for sinners.

Hypocrisy hurts.  
It confuses.  
It wounds.

But the failure of Christians  
does not erase the faithfulness of Christ.

Judge Christianity by Christ,  
not by those who fail to follow Him.

### **Objection 4 — “Aren’t all religions the same?”**

No.

All religions attempt to explain:

- the world,
- morality,
- meaning,
- and what comes next.

But only Christianity declares something unique:

**God came down to us.**

**God did for us what we could never do.**

**God saved us by grace, not works.**

Every other faith says,

“Climb the mountain. Become worthy.”

Christianity says,

“You cannot climb. God descends.”

One Savior.

One cross.

One resurrection.

One empty tomb.

Jesus is not one teacher among many.

He is the only One who conquered death.

*“No one comes to the Father except through Me.”*

—John 14:6

Not arrogance.

Truth.

The only door to life

is the One who rose from the dead.



### **Objection 5 — “Does science disprove faith?”**

Science cannot disprove God  
because science cannot address anything outside the natural world.

Science explains **how** creation works.  
It cannot explain **why it exists**.

Science is the study of God’s handiwork.  
Following the evidence honestly  
leads us to a finely tuned universe  
that screams design.

The conflict is not between God and science—  
it is between God and *scientism*,  
the belief that only scientific methods reach truth.

But even that belief is not scientific.  
It is philosophical.

True science and true faith  
walk in harmony.

### **Objection 6 — “Why doesn’t God make Himself more obvious? Why is He hidden?”**

God is not hidden.  
He is humble.

He reveals enough for the seeker,  
but not enough to satisfy the scoffer.

Creation points to Him.  
Conscience whispers of Him.  
The Bible speaks His words.  
Jesus shows His heart.

If God overwhelmed us with glory,  
faith would no longer be faith—  
it would be forced compliance.

God invites freely,  
not coercively.

He could blaze His presence across the sky every morning,  
but then no one would love Him—  
they would only fear Him.

God reveals enough for the honest heart.  
He withholds enough for the rebellious heart  
to continue rebelling if it chooses.

### **Objection 7 — “Why don’t we see miracles today like in Bible times?”**

We do.  
But we misunderstand what a miracle is.

In Scripture:

- miracles cluster around major revelations,
- not every generation saw them,
- they served to confirm God’s message at key moments.

Today:

- the greatest miracle is still the new birth  
(2 Corinthians 5:17),
- God still heals, intervenes, provides,
- testimonies across the world describe visions, dreams, protection,  
transformation,

- persecuted nations often see more overt miracles because desperation sharpens dependence.

Miracles never existed to entertain.

They exist to point to God.

And He still points.

### **Objection 8 — “Why doesn’t God stop all evil instantly?”**

Because God is patient,  
not absent.

If God stopped all evil today,  
He would have to stop all sinners today—  
including us.

Instead, He gives time  
for repentance, salvation, and grace.

This world is not heaven.  
It is the window for mercy.

*“The Lord is patient...not wanting any to perish.”*  
—2 Peter 3:9

A God who instantly crushed evil  
would crush the very people  
He is trying to save.

### **Objection 9 — “What about people who never hear the gospel?”**

God is just.  
God is good.  
God judges fairly.

Scripture affirms:

- creation reveals God's existence (Romans 1:20),
- conscience reveals His moral law (Romans 2:14–15),
- God is not far from anyone (Acts 17:27),
- God moves heaven and earth to reach the seeker (Jeremiah 29:13).

No one will stand before God  
and say they were judged unfairly.

God seeks.

God draws.

God reveals.

And God saves those who turn to Him  
with the light they have.

But this objection should not make us complacent.  
It should send us.

### **Objection 10 — “If God is real, why is faith necessary at all?”**

Because faith is the relational response  
to a relational God.

Not blind faith.

Not irrational faith.

Reasonable faith.

Faith says:

“I trust the One who made me  
more than what I can see.”

“I trust His character  
more than my circumstances.”

“I trust His promise  
more than my understanding.”

*“Without faith it is impossible to please God...”*  
—Hebrews 11:6

Faith is not the absence of evidence.  
Faith is the proper response to overwhelming evidence.

### **Gentleness, Not Victory**

Apologetics is not about winning arguments.  
It is about winning people.

Every answer must be seasoned with grace.  
Truth without gentleness hardens hearts.  
Gentleness without truth misleads hearts.

Jesus held both perfectly.

So must we.

### **Seed for the Next Chapter**

If these objections have answers,  
if Christianity is reasonable,  
if Christ is risen,  
then the question now becomes:

**What is faith?**

**What does it look like?**

**Why does God require it?**

**And how do we respond?**

That is Chapter 11.



## CHAPTER 11 — Faith: Not Blind, But Reasonable Trust

Faith is one of the most misunderstood words in the world.

To the skeptic, faith means  
“believing without evidence.”

To the culture, faith means  
“a spiritual guess.”

To the confused, faith means  
“closing your eyes and jumping into the dark.”

But that is not biblical faith.

Biblical faith is not naïve,  
not irrational,  
not baseless,  
not blind.

Biblical faith is **reasonable trust**  
in a God who has revealed Himself—  
in creation,  
in conscience,  
in Scripture,  
in Christ,  
and in the resurrection.

Faith is not a leap away from evidence.  
Faith is a bridge built on evidence  
leading into relationship.

### **Faith Begins Where Sight Ends—Not Where Reason Ends**

Scripture never asks us to deny reality  
or shut off our minds.

Jesus said the greatest commandment includes:

*“...love the Lord your God with all your heart,  
all your soul,  
all your mind...”*  
—Matthew 22:37

Biblical faith is thinking deeply,  
reasoning honestly,  
trusting fully.

We don’t believe because we turned our brain off.  
We believe because the God who made the brain  
has given us every reason to trust Him.

Faith is not belief *without* reason.  
Faith is belief *beyond* reason—  
trusting the God who has proven Himself trustworthy.

## **Hebrews 11: Faith Defined in Motion**

Hebrews 11 — often called the “Hall of Faith” —  
describes faith this way:

*“Faith is the substance of things hoped for,  
the evidence of things not seen.”*  
—Hebrews 11:1

Two words stand out:

### **Substance — something solid**

Faith has weight.  
It is rooted in truth, not imagination.

### **Evidence — something credible**

Faith is built on God’s revealed character,  
not human speculation.



Hebrews 11 then shows us that faith is always active:

- Noah built the ark.
- Abraham left home.
- Moses walked forward.
- Rahab hid the spies.
- David faced Goliath.

Faith is not static belief.

Faith is trust that produces movement.

## **Faith Bridges Evidence and Relationship**

Faith stands on two pillars:

### **1. Evidence**

God does not hide from the mind.

Creation points to Him (Psalm 19:1).

Conscience echoes Him (Romans 2:15).

History reveals Him.

Prophecy verifies Him.

The resurrection confirms Him.

Faith acknowledges these truths  
and responds to them.

### **2. Relationship**

Faith goes beyond intellectual agreement.

It is trusting the Person behind the evidence.

You may know a bridge is strong,  
but you only trust it when you walk across it.

Faith is walking—  
not merely knowing.

This is why Jesus repeatedly said:

*“Follow Me.”*

Not “understand everything.”  
Not “solve every question.”  
Not “prove every detail.”

Follow.

Faith is evidence + relationship.  
Truth + trust.  
Reason + surrender.

## **Why Christians Trust What They Trust**

Christians do not trust blindly.  
We trust because God has earned our trust.

We trust because:

### **1. God has shown Himself faithful in Scripture.**

Every promise He made, He kept.

### **2. God has shown Himself faithful in history.**

Empires have risen and fallen.  
His Word stands.

### **3. God has shown Himself faithful in Christ.**

Jesus fulfilled prophecy,  
proved His identity,  
died for sin,  
rose again.

#### **4. God has shown Himself faithful in our lives.**

He answers prayer,  
guides hearts,  
strengthens weakness,  
comforts sorrow,  
convicts sin,  
changes lives.

Christians trust  
because God is trustworthy.

#### **Faith Is Relational, Not Mechanical**

Faith is not checking a box.  
Faith is not reciting a creed.  
Faith is not belonging to a church.

Faith is knowing a Person.

Paul said:

*“I know whom I have believed...”*  
—2 Timothy 1:12

Not “what I believed.”

**Whom.**

Faith is not merely believing facts about Jesus.  
Faith is trusting Jesus.

Faith hears His voice  
and responds with obedience.

Faith rests in His promises  
because it knows His character.

Faith walks with Him  
because it loves Him.

### **Faith Strengthens Through Use**

Faith grows like a muscle—  
not by sitting still,  
but by being exercised.

When God calls us to obey,  
faith stretches.  
When He calls us to wait,  
faith deepens.  
When He calls us to endure,  
faith thickens.  
When He calls us to give,  
faith loosens its grip on the world.

Faith develops through trials  
because trials reveal  
whether we trust God  
or trust ourselves.

This is why James says:

*“...the testing of your faith produces perseverance.”*  
—James 1:3

Faith is not fragile.  
Faith is forged.

## **Faith Looks Forward**

Faith always leans toward the future.

Abraham looked forward to a city not yet built.

Moses looked forward to a kingdom not yet seen.

The early church looked forward to a Savior who would return.

Faith anchors itself in God's promises —  
promises that stretch beyond this world  
into eternity.

Faith believes the God who raised Jesus  
will also raise us  
and restore creation.

Faith believes the story ends  
not in death  
but in new creation.

## **The Seed for the Next Chapter**

Faith is not blind.  
Faith is not foolish.  
Faith is not weak.

Faith is the reasonable, relational trust  
in the God who has revealed Himself  
and proven Himself  
and invited us into covenant with Him.

So now the question becomes:

**What does this faith require of us?**  
**What does God call us to do**  
**in response to everything He has shown us?**  
**What does a life of belief look like?**

That is Chapter 12.

## CHAPTER 12 — So What? The Life That Follows

If all of this is true —  
the universe pointing to a Creator,  
morality pointing to a Lawgiver,  
purpose pointing to eternity,  
Scripture pointing to revelation,  
the resurrection pointing to a living Savior —  
then the final question is unavoidable:

**So what?**

**What now?**

**How should we live if this is real?**

Christianity is not simply a set of beliefs.  
It is a new way of being.  
A new way of walking.  
A new way of living.

If Christ rose,  
then the only reasonable response  
is to follow Him.

### 1. Follow Christ

Jesus' call is simple and demanding:

*"Follow Me."*  
—Matthew 4:19

Not "admire Me."  
Not "agree with Me."  
Not "add Me to your life."

Follow.

To follow Christ means:

- trusting Him as Lord,
- imitating His character,
- obeying His words,
- submitting to His authority,
- walking where He leads.

Following Christ is not passive belief.  
It is active surrender.

He is not a consultant.  
He is King.

He is not an accessory.  
He is life.

## **2. Live With Purpose**

If God designed you,

You have a role in the Kingdom of God.

Jesus summarized our purpose in one sentence:

- Use your gifts for His glory.
- See your life as stewardship, not ownership.

You are part of God's story —  
and your chapter matters.

### **3. Walk in Love**

Love is not the soft virtue of the sentimental.  
It is the hard virtue of the committed.

—John 13:35

The world recognizes true faith  
not by how much we know,  
but by how much we love.

Love proves the presence  
of the Spirit within us.

Love reveals the character  
of the Christ we follow.

#### **4. Share the Gospel**

If Christ is risen,  
we do not keep Him to ourselves.

Before He ascended, Jesus gave a simple mission:

*“Go therefore and make disciples of all nations...”*  
—Matthew 28:19

Not everyone is called to preach from a pulpit—  
but every believer is called to live as a witness.

You share the gospel when you:

- speak the truth in love,
- forgive your enemies,
- serve the hurting,
- give generously,
- live with hope,
- explain the reason for the hope within you.

The world is starving for truth,  
meaning,  
and hope.

We carry the message that meets all three.

#### **5. Live for the Eternal, Not the Immediate**

This world is not the final world.  
This age is not the final age.  
This life is not the final life.

Jesus makes this clear:

*“Do not lay up for yourselves treasures on earth...  
but lay up for yourselves treasures in heaven.”*  
—Matthew 6:19–20

We live among people  
obsessed with the immediate:

- success
- comfort
- applause
- convenience
- pleasure
- distraction

But followers of Christ  
bend their lives toward eternity.

We invest in what lasts.  
We build what endures.  
We seek what cannot be taken.

The kingdom of God is already here in part.  
It will come in full when Christ returns.

Live as if that is true—  
because it is.

## **6. The Garden-to-Garden Hope**

But the story ends  
with a new creation:  
a city-garden  
like Eden restored

Revelation describes:

- no curse,

- no night,
- God dwelling with His people again.

The story does not loop back  
to the original Garden.

It moves forward  
to a restored one.

Everything God began  
He will complete.

Everything broken  
He will renew.

Everything lost  
He will restore.

This is the hope that drives us.

## **7. Urgency: Today, Not Tomorrow**

If Christ rose,  
then delaying your response  
is the most dangerous decision  
a person can make.

Life is short.  
Eternity is long.  
The soul is priceless.

*“Today, if you hear His voice,  
do not harden your hearts.”*  
—Hebrews 3:15

Not tomorrow.  
Not someday.  
Not when life slows down.

Today.

The call of Christ is urgent  
because the stakes are eternal.

## **8. Invitation: Come and Follow**

Jesus’ invitation remains open:

Come weary.  
Come doubting.  
Come broken.  
Come curious.  
Come skeptical.  
Come sinful.

Come as you are—  
but do not stay as you are.

Christ calls you to:

- forgiveness,
- freedom,
- transformation,
- purpose,
- relationship,
- eternal life.

He is not calling you to religion.  
He is calling you to Himself.

He does not ask you to clean up first.  
He cleanses.  
He restores.  
He renews.

He simply says:

**“Follow Me.”**

The life that follows  
is the only life worth living.

### **Closing Note for the Reader**

If the heavens declare His glory,  
if conscience whispers His law,  
if Scripture reveals His Word,  
if Christ confirms His love,

and if the resurrection secures His promise—  
then your response matters.

God designed you.

God seeks you.

God calls you.

The door is open.

The invitation is extended.

The King is waiting.

Step into His story.

Walk toward His Garden.

Follow His voice.

Come.

And live.





## **Epilogue — The Invitation Still Stands**
