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EXODUS — BOOK TWO

Living With a Holy God

(Chapters 21–40)

The first half of Exodus answers a decisive question:

Who is the LORD, and how does He rescue His people?

The second half answers a different—and equally important—question:

How do a redeemed people live with a holy God who has drawn near?

Exodus 21–40 is not a detour into legalism, nor a pause in the story. It is the necessary continuation of redemption.

Deliverance without direction would leave God’s people free—but unformed. Presence without instruction would invite chaos rather than communion.

These chapters show that **God does not merely rescue His people from slavery; He reshapes them for relationship.**

From Revelation to Relationship

At Sinai, God revealed His holiness with thunder and fire.

The laws, instructions, and designs that fill these chapters are not arbitrary. They teach Israel how to live as a people who belong to God—distinct from surrounding nations, shaped by justice, mercy, responsibility, worship, and obedience.

The goal is not compliance alone, but **communion**.

Law, Grace, and Order
