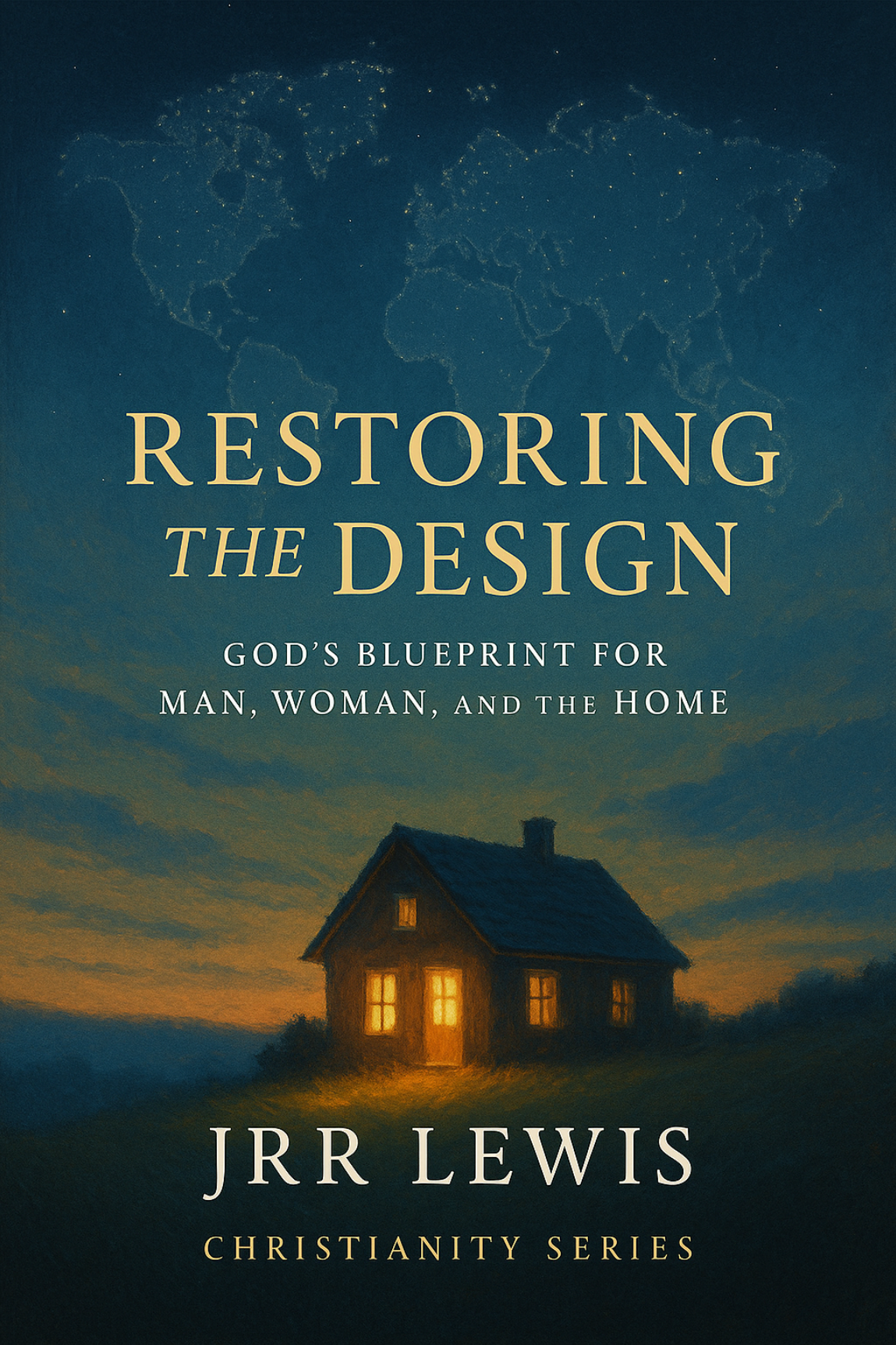

Chapter 2: The First Attack

Chapter 8 – Mutually Yoked
