Some have misunderstood this as polytheism or myth. But rightly understood, it is a picture of **God’s unmatched authority over all other spiritual beings**, who are **real but not equal**.

### What Is the Divine Council?

The phrase “divine council” refers to a **heavenly courtroom scene**, similar to a royal throne room filled with counselors or messengers. It appears in several key passages:

1. **Psalms 82** – God is pictured standing in judgment among “gods” (*elohim*). These are not idols or false gods—they are **spiritual beings** under His authority. Some have rebelled, and God pronounces judgment on them.
2. **1 Kings 22:19–23** – The prophet Micaiah sees the Lord on His throne, surrounded by “all the host of heaven.” A spirit volunteers to influence King Ahab’s downfall. This shows that spiritual beings are **presented, speak, and carry out God’s will**.
3. **Job 1–2** – “The sons of God” present themselves before the Lord, and Satan enters among them. This is a courtroom setting, where Satan accuses Job, and God allows a test.
4. **Daniel 7:9–10** – The Ancient of Days sits on a throne; thousands upon thousands attend Him, and “the court sat in judgment.”

### What Are These “gods” or “sons of God”?

- The Hebrew word *elohim* is used in multiple contexts. While most often referring to the one true God, it is also used to describe **spiritual beings**.
- “Sons of God” (*bene elohim*) appear in Genesis 6:2, Job 1:6, and Job 38:7. They are not human but heavenly, distinct from angels yet of the spiritual realm.

Importantly: **these beings are created, subordinate, and accountable**. There is no competition with God's sovereignty. Rather, this is a picture of **how God delegates and governs both heaven and earth**.

## Why Does This Matter?

### 1. The Bible assumes a spiritual structure behind the world.

- Just as kings have councils, so does the King of Kings.

— Genesis 6:2, 4

So when Genesis 6 speaks of “sons of God” marrying the “daughters of man,” the original audience would not have pictured good men marrying bad women. They would have understood this as **a crossing of spiritual boundaries**—a rebellion among the heavenly host that spilled into human affairs.

This idea may seem fantastical to modern readers, but it is echoed throughout ancient Jewish tradition and later New Testament writings. In essence, **some of God’s created spiritual beings rebelled**, not only in heaven, but on earth.

## Who Were the Nephilim?

The result of this unnatural union was the birth of the **Nephilim**, often translated “giants” or “fallen ones.” They were described as:

- On the earth “in those days, and also afterward.”
- “The mighty men who were of old, the men of renown.”

In Numbers 13:33, the Nephilim are mentioned again, and the spies say:

“We seemed like grasshoppers in our own eyes, and we looked the same to them.”

Whether the Nephilim were physical giants, spiritual hybrids, or both, their presence represented **a distorted form of what God intended for humanity**. Rather than image-bearers of the Creator, they were the offspring of rebellion—powerful, corrupted, and widely feared.

When you first find Christ, you receive something unearned and breathtaking: grace. God draws near. The burden of sin lifts. Your spirit awakens.

But make no mistake: **you just became a target.**

*“Your adversary the devil prowls around like a roaring lion, seeking someone to devour.”*

— *1 Peter 5:8*

Becoming a Christian doesn't end the war—it enlists you in it.

And the battlefield is not only external. It is **within your own heart.**

## We Are Still Fallen Creatures Being Restored

Yes, we are saved by grace. Yes, the Holy Spirit now lives within us. But we are **still in the flesh**. We still carry the residue of pride, lust, fear, and selfishness. And worst of all, we **underestimate** just how powerful those roots are.

Whether these unclean spirits come from the Nephilim or some other source, the reality is clear: **they are real, and they hate you**.



Jesus encountered them. The apostles cast them out. Paul warned us of “**spiritual forces of evil in the heavenly places**” (Ephesians 6:12).

They whisper:

- “You deserve better.”
- “Just once won’t hurt.”
- “You’re stronger than this.”
- “God will forgive you anyway.”
- “It’s not that big of a deal.”

The slippery slope is paved with **almost truths** and **delayed repentance**.

## **Pride: The First and Favorite Sin**

### Elisha and the Invisible Army (2 Kings 6)

Elisha, the prophet of Israel, had been frustrating the plans of the king of Aram. Every time the Aramean army set a trap, Elisha warned Israel in advance. The enemy king was furious and sent an entire army to capture one man.

They surrounded the city of Dothan at night.

Elisha’s servant woke up early, saw the army, and panicked. “Alas, my master! What shall we do?”

What happens next is not just comforting—it is paradigm-shifting.

Elisha calmly says:

*“Do not be afraid, for those who are with us are more than those who are with them.”*

Then he prays—not for deliverance, not for angels to arrive—but for his servant to **see**.

*“O Lord, please open his eyes that he may see.”*  
*So the Lord opened the eyes of the young man, and he saw, and behold, the mountain was*

*full of horses and chariots of fire all around Elisha.”*  
— 2 Kings 6:17

**They were already there.**

The servant didn't need a miracle to change the circumstances—he needed a miracle to see **what was already true**.

## Daniel and the Delayed Answer (Daniel 10)

In another moment centuries later, the prophet Daniel is fasting and praying for understanding. He mourns for three weeks, receiving no answer.

Then an angel appears, radiant and terrifying. And the angel says something shocking:

*“From the first day that you set your heart to understand... your words have been heard, and I have come because of your words.*

*The prince of the kingdom of Persia withstood me twenty-one days, but Michael... came to help me...”*

— Daniel 10:12–13

The delay wasn't God's silence. It was a **spiritual war in the unseen realm**.

This “prince of Persia” is not a human. It is a **spiritual power**, a territorial authority of darkness. And Michael, the archangel of Israel (see Daniel 12:1), had to come to break through.

Daniel wasn't just praying into the void. He was praying into a **battlefield**.

## What These Stories Reveal

### 1. The Unseen Realm Is Not Metaphorical

The Bible does not treat angels, demons, or spiritual warfare as metaphors for internal emotions or social issues. These are **real beings**, operating in real time, influencing real outcomes.

We are modern people, taught to see the material world as all there is. But the biblical worldview is **two-tiered**:

- The **seen** (earth, bodies, nations)
- The **unseen** (spirits, angels, demons, divine courts)

Both are real. But only one is eternal.

## 2. Prayer Is More Powerful Than We Understand

In both Elisha's and Daniel's stories, prayer did not bring about change—it **connected to what was already happening in heaven**.

- Elisha didn't summon help—he asked God to open eyes.
- Daniel didn't cause the angel to act—he simply aligned with God's will and truth.

When we pray, we are not whispering into the air. We are **joining a war effort** already in motion. Your words may seem small, but they are received in heaven and responded to with power.

## 3. Delay Does Not Mean Denial

Daniel fasted for 21 days before receiving an answer. God heard him **on the first day**. The delay had nothing to do with Daniel's worth—it had to do with **spiritual resistance**.

Many Christians give up praying because they assume silence means "no." But Scripture teaches that sometimes **the heavens are in conflict**. Your answer may be in transit. Keep praying.

## 4. God Fights for Us—Even When We Don't See It

Elisha's servant didn't see the chariots of fire. But they were there all along.

Sometimes we feel surrounded by depression, addiction, fear, or failure. But if God were to open our eyes, we might see **angels encamping around those who fear Him** (Psalm 34:7).

You are never alone. The unseen realm is not just filled with threats—it is filled with **help, strength, and holy fire**.

## You Live in a Spiritual War Zone

It is no accident that Ephesians 6 describes the Christian life in military terms:

*“Put on the whole armor of God... For we do not wrestle against flesh and blood, but against rulers... cosmic powers... spiritual forces of evil in the heavenly places.”*  
— Ephesians 6:11–12

This is not poetry. This is strategy.

Paul is saying: **If you think your struggles are only emotional, political, or relational, you are unarmed.** The real battle is being fought in the realm you cannot see. But you have been given armor and weapons:

### A Veil Was Placed Long Ago

The story begins in Eden.

## Chapter 4.b: The Warrior God – Fighting in the Unseen

*“The Lord is a warrior; the Lord is His name.”*

It is one of the earliest descriptions of God in Scripture—and one of the most arresting.

After delivering Israel through the Red Sea, Moses and the people sing. They do not describe God as a kindly shepherd or distant architect. They call Him **a warrior**.

Why?

Because He had just **crushed Pharaoh's army**, not with weapons of man, but with **plagues, power, and parted seas**. The people had seen with their own eyes what happens when **God fights for His people**.

But was it only metaphor?

### Not Just Poetry, but Power

Yes, the language is poetic. Yes, the song of Moses is a hymn.

But the actions were real. And the same God who brought visible judgment upon Egypt was also waging **invisible war** against Egypt's gods.

*“On all the gods of Egypt I will execute judgments: I am the Lord.”*

— *Exodus 12:12*

The plagues weren't random—they were **targeted strikes** against Egypt's spiritual system. God wasn't just delivering Israel; He was **demonstrating supremacy** over false powers.

This is spiritual warfare in the highest sense. A God who confronts both earthly oppressors and **heavenly rebels**.

### God as Warrior Throughout Scripture

## Chapter 4.c: The Weapon of Prayer – Real, Unseen, and Effective

We often say “all we can do now is pray” as if it’s a last resort.

## Chapter 5: He Hangs the Earth on Nothing

*“He stretches out the north over the void and hangs the earth on nothing.”*  
— Job 26:7

The Bible is not a science textbook. But it is not ignorant, either.

Across its pages are glimpses—some poetic, some prophetic, some almost accidental—of physical truths that ancient people could not possibly have known. These statements were not made through scientific research, but through **divine inspiration**, from the One who built the cosmos.

And one of the most striking is found in one of the Bible’s oldest books: **Job**.

“He hangs the earth on nothing.”

In an ancient world where nearly all cultures believed the earth sat on something—pillars, turtles, gods, or water—this is nothing short of **revolutionary**.

How did Job know?

He didn’t.

But the God who **made** the earth knew. And under the Spirit’s guidance, Job spoke what he could never have understood fully.

## The World Is Suspended in Space

To the modern reader, Job’s statement might seem unremarkable. Of course the earth “hangs on nothing”—we’ve seen it from space. We’ve studied gravity. We’ve mapped orbits.

But this concept was **unthinkable** to the ancient mind. The prevailing cosmologies of the time saw the world as a flat disc, suspended on waters or supported by mythic structures. Babylonian, Egyptian, Greek, and Hindu traditions all described the earth as held up or resting on something solid or divine.

Job, however, describes something else—a **planet in suspension**, not resting on anything, but simply “hung” in a void. It’s as if the language is straining to describe gravity and orbit before such words existed.

This is not coincidence.

This is revelation—**God pulling back the curtain** on the unseen foundations of the physical world.

## He Stretches Out the North Over the Void

In the same verse, Job writes:

*“He stretches out the north over the void...”*

Ancient readers had no concept of a cosmic vacuum. But today, we understand that **the northern sky contains vast, starless regions**—areas of deep space nearly empty to the naked eye. One of the largest known voids in the observable universe is, in fact, found in the northern celestial hemisphere.

Coincidence? Possibly. But when such statements appear alongside others like them, a pattern emerges—one that invites us to look more closely at Scripture’s **physical accuracy**.

## Other Physical Insights in Scripture

The Bible contains other remarkable phrases that hint at **scientific knowledge unknown at the time**:

### 1. The Shape of the Earth

*“He sits enthroned above the circle of the earth...”*  
— *Isaiah 40:22*

The Hebrew word for “circle” (*chug*) can also mean sphere or roundness. Isaiah doesn’t describe the earth as flat, but as curved—another unusual insight in a time when a flat earth was the cultural assumption.

### 2. The Water Cycle

*“All the rivers run into the sea, yet the sea is not full; to the place where the rivers go, there they return again.”*  
— *Ecclesiastes 1:7*



*“He draws up the drops of water, which distill as rain to the streams.”*

— *Job 36:27*

Long before meteorology, the Bible describes the **evaporation–condensation–precipitation cycle** with surprising clarity.

### 3. Ocean Currents

*“Whatever passes through the paths of the seas.”*

— *Psalms 8:8*

This verse inspired Matthew Maury, the “father of oceanography,” to study and map ocean currents—which he called “**the paths of the sea**” after reading this psalm.

### 4. Life in the Blood

*“For the life of a creature is in the blood...”*

— *Leviticus 17:11*

In a time when physicians might “bleed” the sick to purge illness, the Bible affirmed a truth that modern biology confirms: blood is not just symbolic—it is **the carrier of life itself**.

## Why This Matters

Some claim the Bible is anti-science. But these passages show something different: **the Bible may not explain science, but it never contradicts true discovery.**

More than that, the Bible often **precedes** discovery. Not with formulas or diagrams, but with language that stretches beyond its time—describing a world **far bigger, deeper, and more mysterious** than ancient people could grasp.

And that tells us something essential:

- The Bible is not limited by the era in which it was written.
- The God who inspired it sees **what we cannot yet imagine**.
- And even when His words sound poetic—they often **prove prophetic**.

## We Are Still Catching Up

Scientists today speak of:

- Dark matter we cannot see,
- Energy that fills the void,
- Unobservable dimensions,
- Quantum entanglement,

*"What do You want with us, Jesus of Nazareth? Have You come to destroy us? I know who You are—the Holy One of God!"*

— Mark 1:24

They didn't need convincing. They knew.

*“Our struggle is not against flesh and blood, but against rulers, authorities, cosmic powers over this present darkness, against spiritual forces of evil in the heavenly places.”*

Paul didn’t see governments or enemies or sickness as the primary threat. He saw **invisible rulers**—organized spiritual resistance to the Kingdom of God.

But he also taught that believers are not helpless:

## Peter and the Invisible Battle

— 1 Peter 5:8

He doesn't describe Satan as myth or metaphor. He's **an active enemy**, hunting souls, resisting the work of God, and targeting believers who lose their focus.

But Peter also speaks of victory:

They had every reason to despair.

Instead, they sang—because **their eyes weren’t fixed on the prison.**

They knew angels were listening.

They knew God was near.

They believed in a throne room greater than Caesar’s.

And God responded. An earthquake came. Chains fell off. The jailer was saved.

All because two men believed **they were never alone.**

## **5. They Were Willing to Die Because They Had Already Crossed Over**

Stephen, the first martyr, was being stoned. As he died, **he saw heaven opened** and Jesus standing at the right hand of God (Acts 7:55–56).

He prayed for his killers, not because he was strong, but because he **saw what others could not.**

For the early believers, **death was not the end—it was the doorway.**

And when you know what’s behind the curtain, you’re no longer afraid of it.

## **6. They Prayed Like Heaven Was Listening**

When Peter was in prison, the Church gathered to pray (Acts 12). An angel showed up, chains fell off, and Peter walked out. He knocked on the door of the prayer meeting—free.

They weren’t surprised that God answered. They were surprised by **how fast.**

To them, prayer wasn’t a tradition.

It was a **tool of war.**

A hotline to the throne room.  
A cry that shook the heavens.

## 7. They Gave Generously Because They Knew Earth Was Temporary

In Acts 2 and 4, the believers shared all things in common. Some sold land and gave the money to the apostles. They did this not because of rules, but because of perspective:

## Chapter 14.a: Blind to the World We're In

*“Now we see through a glass, darkly...”*

You assume you can see.

And what you call “reality” is only a whisper of what actually surrounds you.

## The Frail Window of the Human Senses

Modern science confirms what Scripture has long implied: we live behind a veil.

Let's begin with light.

Your eyes detect only a razor-thin slice of the electromagnetic spectrum—what we call **visible light**. But the spectrum is vast:

- **Gamma rays** rage in the cosmos.
- **Infrared** heat pulses from every object.

## A Profound Implication

You are surrounded by a world you cannot perceive.

This isn’t speculation.

It’s science.

And it should humble us.
