Chapter 4.a: What If Love Is Not a Feeling?

How We Misquote It

We say things like:

“Love is love.”

“I fell in love.”

“I don’t feel it anymore.”

And we imagine love is just a warm rush of emotion.

We confuse it with affection.

We confuse it with attraction.

We confuse it with chemistry.

We confuse it with comfort.

But biblical love — the kind Jesus commands —
is not a feeling you chase.

It is a choice you make.

It is a discipline you practice.

It is an action you take — especially when you don’t feel like it.

What Is Agape?

The New Testament word for this love is **agape**.

It means:

— Unconditional.

— Unwavering.

— Undeserved.

— Not rooted in what they’ve done but in who you’ve become.

It is not based on their merit.

It is not canceled when they hurt you.

It does not wait until you “feel it.”

It moves anyway.

This is why Jesus could say:

“Love your enemies.”

If love is not a feeling — then it’s on you to act anyway.

Consider This

— If love is not a feeling, then your lack of affection is no excuse.

— If love is not a feeling, then you cannot claim to love God while refusing to love people.

— If love is not a feeling, then you cannot wait for others to deserve it before you give it.

— If love is not a feeling, then you cannot let your emotions dictate your obedience.

What Does That Mean For You?

If you are a non-believer — maybe this is why Christianity seems fake to you.

Because you've only seen people who spoke of love but waited to feel it before they acted.

You've seen people who mistook emotion for devotion.

But true love shows up even when the feelings don't.

It cleans the wound.

It pays the debt.

It stays when everyone else leaves.

If you are a believer — stop waiting to “feel led.”

Stop waiting for love to feel natural.

Stop excusing yourself because it's hard.

Pick up your towel.

Pick up your cross.

Pick up the phone.

Act.

Love anyway.

Because it's not about how you feel.

It's about who He is — and what He's done in you.

So what say you?

Will you keep waiting for the feeling?

Or will you obey?

A Prayer

Lord,

I confess I have mistaken feelings for faithfulness.

I've loved when it was easy.

I've acted when it made me feel good.

I've held back when it cost too much.

Forgive me.

Teach me to love like You loved —

without waiting for permission from my emotions.

Give me the courage to act even when my heart resists.

Give me the strength to choose love when the feelings have fled.

Until the day I stand before You —

and hear You say I loved well.

Chapter 5: What If Denominations Do Not Matter?

A House Divided

The night before the cross, Jesus prayed:

“...that they may all be one, just as you, Father, are in me, and I in you...”
(John 17:21)

Yet here we are.

Divided.

Fragmented.

Branded and boxed.

We've split over every imaginable line:

- Baptism methods.
- Worship styles.
- Which gifts of the Spirit still operate.
- How to dress.
- Who can lead.
- Which Bible translation to read.

We've even split over which splits were justified.

And yet, we all pray to the same Father
through the same Son
by the same Spirit.

What happened?

Why We Divide

Some of it started with good intentions.

To protect the truth.

To guard against error.

To purify worship.

To preserve holiness.

But pride crept in.
And then envy.
And then arrogance.

We stopped seeing brothers and sisters.
We started seeing competitors.
We stopped seeing the body of Christ.
We started seeing rival brands.

We wrapped our preferences in Scripture
and called them convictions.
We confused secondary matters for primary ones.
We mistook our tribe for the Kingdom.

And now we wear our divisions like badges of honor —
as if Jesus is impressed.

What Jesus Actually Said

Jesus didn't say:

"They will know you by your doctrinal statement."

He said:

"By this all people will know that you are my disciples, if you have love for one another." (John 13:35)

He didn't say:

"Go into all the world and make more denominations."

He said:

"Go and make disciples of all nations..." (Matthew 28:19)

He didn't say:

"Fight over the secondary things."

He said:

"Seek first the kingdom of God..." (Matthew 6:33)

If Denominations Do Not Matter...

If God sees one body,
then our walls are invisible to Him.
If God sees one family,
then our factions are irrelevant.
If God sees one bride,
then our squabbles are shameful.

The church is not a buffet where you pick what you like.
The church is not a stadium where you cheer for your team.
The church is not a business where you compete for market share.
The church is a body — and it is already wounded enough.

When we divide unnecessarily, we dishonor the Head.
When we elevate preference over mission, we insult the Cross.
When we slander other believers, we blaspheme the Name we share.

Why This Matters

— Because the world is watching.
They see us fighting and wonder why they should listen to us.
They see us splitting and doubt our message of reconciliation.
They see us building walls and assume our love is fake.

— Because hell is still real.
While we bicker about how to sing,
souls are dying without Christ.

— Because Jesus is coming back.

Consider This

- If denominations do not matter, then neither does your pride in yours.

- If denominations do not matter, then you cannot keep treating Christians outside your camp as enemies.
- If denominations do not matter, then you need to spend less time defending your brand and more time building His Kingdom.

What Does That Mean For You?

If you are a non-believer — don't let our divisions keep you away.

We are sinners too.

We are still learning to live like one family.

But the Savior we preach is not divided.

His offer to you is the same no matter which church you walk into —
repent, believe, and follow.

If you are a believer — it's time to repent of your contempt.

It's time to stop nursing old wounds over which hymnbook someone chose.

It's time to stop treating brothers and sisters as competitors.

It's time to stop pretending that the church exists to make you comfortable.

Stop saying "my church" — it's His.

Stop saying "my people" — they're His.

Stop dividing the bride He bled for.

So what say you?

Will you keep fighting for your little corner of the kingdom?

Or will you lay down your arms and love your family?

A Prayer

Lord,

Forgive me for loving my label more than my brother.

Forgive me for judging Your children because they don't worship like I do.
Forgive me for speaking about the body of Christ as if it were mine to dissect.

Break my pride.

Strip away my tribalism.

Open my eyes to see one family, one mission, one Spirit, one Lord.

Teach me to love those I've treated as rivals.

Teach me to see the beauty in our diversity.

Teach me to care more about Your name than mine.

Until the day we stand together — every tongue, every tribe,
and worship You as one.

Chapter 5.a: What If There Is No Rapture?

A Hope We Cling To

For many Christians — especially in the West —
the rapture is a cherished hope.

That Jesus will snatch His Church away before the worst of the tribulation
begins.

That we will escape the horrors to come.

That we will be spared what others will have to endure.

We read:

*“We will be caught up together with them in the clouds to meet the Lord in
the air...”* (1 Thessalonians 4:17)

And we picture a sudden vanishing,
a dramatic rescue,
a merciful exit before the storm.

And maybe that’s exactly how it will happen.

Maybe.

Let’s hope.

Let’s pray.

But What If Not?

What if we misunderstood?

What if we’ve misread the signs?

What if the rapture is not what we think — or when we think?

There are passages that seem to point to it.

But there are many others that seem to suggest otherwise:

- That the Church suffers.
- That the saints endure.
- That believers are still present when judgments fall.

For almost 1,800 years of church history, no one taught the rapture as it is
popularly understood today.

It appeared in the 1800s, spread by preachers like John Nelson Darby, and later popularized through the *Scofield Reference Bible* and American revivalism.

Even today, belief in a pre-tribulation rapture is concentrated mostly in the United States.

Elsewhere in the world — where Christians already suffer under persecution and hardship —

the idea of escaping tribulation is far less assumed.

(Exact global statistics are hard to come by, but estimates suggest that less than 20–30% of Christians worldwide hold to the classic “pre-trib” rapture view — and nearly all of them are in North America and parts of Europe.)

Why It Matters

If the rapture comes — praise God.

But if it doesn't — will we be ready?

If the rapture comes — we escape the nightmare.

But if it doesn't — will we still stand firm when the nightmare comes to us?

If you assume rescue and instead face persecution,
will you fall away?

If you expect to fly and instead are told to fight,
will you desert your post?

If you hope to be gone but find yourself here —
will you still call Him good?

We cannot afford to build our faith on an exit strategy that may not come when we want it.

Gird Up

Scripture warns us over and over:

— “*In this world you will have trouble.*” (John 16:33)

— “*All who desire to live a godly life in Christ Jesus will be persecuted.*” (2

Timothy 3:12)

— *“The one who endures to the end will be saved.”* (Matthew 24:13)

So even as we hope for rescue,
we must prepare for battle.

We must put on the armor of God (Ephesians 6).

We must train our hearts to endure.

We must strengthen each other to stand.

When the tribulation comes — whether we are here for it or not —
our job is the same:

To glorify Christ.

To comfort the fainthearted.

To rescue the perishing.

To overcome by the blood of the Lamb and the word of our testimony
(Revelation 12:11).

Consider This

— If there is no rapture, then you must prepare to suffer well.

— If there is no rapture, then you must strengthen your faith beyond
sentiment.

— If there is no rapture, then you must practice courage now — before it's
tested.

— If there is no rapture, then you must resolve to endure, even when it costs
everything.

What Does That Mean For You?

If you are a non-believer — stop assuming you'll have time later.

You may not.

The world is already groaning, and your soul is not promised another hour.

Don't wait for a sign to convince you — the cross was your sign.

Come to Him now.

If you are a believer — stop living like you're promised an escape.
You are promised His presence, not His absence from suffering.
You are promised His strength, not your comfort.
You are promised His reward, not immunity from trial.

Start preparing your heart for hardship.
Start fortifying your faith for the fire.
Start comforting others who are already suffering — because your turn may come.
Stop assuming you'll be gone when it gets bad.
Live like you'll be here — and fight like you're staying — until He calls you home.

So what say you?
Will you hope for rescue but live like a soldier?
Or will you cling to an easy exit and find yourself unarmed when the battle comes?

A Prayer

Lord,
I hope You come quickly.
I hope You rescue us before the worst comes.
But if You don't —
then give me the courage to stand.
Prepare me to endure.
Strengthen me to suffer faithfully.
Teach me to comfort others who are already bearing the weight.

Forgive me for treating my faith as a guarantee of ease.
Forgive me for thinking I deserve to avoid what others have endured for centuries.
Make me ready — for whatever comes.

Until the day You return —
whether in the clouds or through the fire —
and make all things new.

Chapter 6: What If Our Job Is to Reflect God's Love and Emulate Christ?

What Are We Even Doing Here?

Let's be honest.

Many Christians live as though the entire point of faith is to

- get saved
- wait it out
- then go to heaven.

We treat this life as a holding pattern.

We think our only job is to stay out of trouble
and show up at church until Jesus calls us home.

But if that's all God wanted —
why didn't He just take you the moment you believed?

Made in His Image

then it shapes everything:

- Your career is not about success — it's about service.
- Your relationships are not about your happiness — they're about holiness.
- Your time is not your own — it belongs to Him.
- Your body is not yours to use as you please — it is His temple.

If this is our job, then nothing in your life is neutral anymore.

Stop assuming this life is just about staying out of trouble until heaven.
You are already in the game — whether you want to be or not.
You are already being watched — whether you realize it or not.

You are called to reflect His love, not your opinions.
You are called to imitate His humility, not defend your pride.
You are called to sacrifice, not sit.
You are called to build His Kingdom, not your own.

So what say you?
Will you keep playing it safe?
Or will you finally step out and shine like the Son you claim to follow?

A Prayer

Jesus,
I confess I have called myself Yours
while living for myself.
I have admired You but not followed You.
I have loved Your blessings more than Your example.

Forgive me.
Break my pride.
Burn away my selfishness.
Teach me to love as You loved, to walk as You walked,
to shine in the darkness as You did.

Make me a mirror that reflects You — not me.
Until the day I see You face to face —
and at last, become fully like You.

Chapter 7: What If the Spiritual Realm Is Real?

What We Don't See

You already know you see very little of what exists.
You don't see radio waves — but they carry your voice across oceans.
You don't see ultraviolet light — but it burns your skin.
You don't see atoms — but they make up everything you touch.
You don't see dark matter — but it seems to hold the galaxies together.

Scientists say we see and understand less than one percent of all that exists.

Less than one percent.

So why do we scoff when the Bible says there's more?
Why do we laugh at talk of angels and demons?
Why do we treat the spiritual realm as superstition —
when even the physical world hides more than we can comprehend?

What Scripture Says

The Bible is clear:
There is another reality intertwined with ours — unseen, but very real.

“For we do not wrestle against flesh and blood, but against the rulers, against the authorities, against the cosmic powers over this present darkness, against the spiritual forces of evil in the heavenly places.” (Ephesians 6:12)

Why We Ignore It

We've been trained to believe what we can see and measure.
We live in a world obsessed with proof and evidence.

The Consequences

- If the spiritual realm is real, then you cannot keep pretending life is just about what you can see.

What Does That Mean For You?

If you are a non-believer — you are already in the battle.
The enemy already owns your allegiance, even if you don't realize it.
The blindness you feel? The hardness of heart? That's not an accident — it's a strategy.

The only way out is surrender — to the One who already won the war on the cross.

If you are a believer — stop sleeping.
Stop fighting the wrong enemy.
Stop thinking your only job is to be “nice” and “good.”
Put on your armor.
Learn how to wield your sword.
Pray like lives depend on it — because they do.
Stop reacting only to what you can see — and start responding to what is unseen.

So what say you?
Will you keep pretending the battle isn't real?
Or will you open your eyes — and stand?

Chapter 7.a: What If the Battle for Your Mind Is Real?

The Quiet War

You wake up tired.

The thoughts come before your feet even hit the floor:

I can't do this.

No one cares.

I'll never change.

Why even try?

We live in a world where mental health struggles are everywhere —
and growing.

Depression.

Anxiety.

Addiction.

Despair.

Suicide.

Some of this is physical.

We are broken people living in a broken world.

Trauma leaves scars.

Bodies misfire.

Brains betray us.

And there is no shame in seeking help,
no sin in needing medicine or counseling.

But what if that's not the whole story?

What if part of what you're feeling —

what you're hearing in your head —

what you're battling in silence —

is spiritual?

What Scripture Says

The Bible tells us over and over:

If the battle for your mind is real —
then you must fight with everything God has given you:

- His Word.
- His Spirit.
- His people.
- His promises.
- His presence.

What You Can Do

- Speak truth louder than the lies.
- Pray when you don't feel like praying.
- Surround yourself with people who will fight with you.
- Read Scripture aloud — and believe it even when you don't feel it.
- Confess the darkness instead of hiding it.
- Get help — and keep asking for help — without shame.

Consider This

- If the battle for your mind is real, then silence is not safety — it's surrender.
- If the battle for your mind is real, then the enemy wins when you isolate.
- If the battle for your mind is real, then you cannot keep treating thoughts as harmless.
- If the battle for your mind is real, then you need to armor up — today.

What Does That Mean For You?

Or will you finally stand up and fight — with Him by your side?

Chapter 8: What If Prayer Really Works?

The Lifeline We Forget

Prayer is our most powerful weapon — and our most neglected.

What Does That Mean For You?

But how many times — in your desperation — have you whispered, “*God, if You're real...*”?

Why?

Because somewhere inside you already know — you were made for this connection.

Don't ignore that.

Speak to Him — and listen.

If you are a believer — stop treating prayer as optional.

Stop using it as a last resort.

Stop mumbling through it without thought.

Start praying like lives depend on it — because they do.

Start praying like you're speaking to a Father who listens — because you are.

Start praying like your enemy fears it — because he does.

So what say you?

Will you keep pretending you can handle life on your own?

Or will you finally grab hold of the lifeline He's given you?

A Prayer

Father,

Forgive me for my silence.

Forgive me for treating prayer like a ritual instead of a lifeline.

Forgive me for doubting You when the answers seem delayed —
and for trying to run my life without You.

Teach me to pray as Jesus did —

with boldness, humility, and faith.

Chapter 9: What If Forgiveness Is the Key?

Why We Cling to Grudges

We all have scars.

Forgiveness is not letting them keep hurting you.

Forgiveness is this:
Releasing your right to revenge.
Laying down your claim to repayment.
Entrusting justice to the Judge who sees all.

Forgiveness is about obedience — not emotion.
You may never feel like forgiving.
That doesn't let you off the hook.

The Weight We Carry

We think holding a grudge punishes them —
but it chains us.
We think our anger keeps us strong —
but it keeps us sick.
We think unforgiveness protects us —
but it eats us alive.

Forgiveness is not weakness.
Forgiveness is how you break free.
Forgiveness is the key that opens the door of your own cell.

Forgiving Yourself

Some of us carry grudges not just against others — but against ourselves.
We replay our sins.
We relive our failures.
We refuse the forgiveness Jesus already paid for.

If God has forgiven you — who are you to say it's not enough?
If the blood of Christ covered it — why do you keep digging it up?

If Forgiveness Is the Key...

Then the locked doors in your life are not waiting for someone else to apologize.

If forgiveness is the key — then you cannot keep calling yourself free while carrying chains of resentment.

Consider This

— If forgiveness is the key, then you cannot keep demanding repayment for what Jesus already paid.

— If forgiveness is the key, then you cannot keep waiting for your feelings to change — you must choose.

— If forgiveness is the key, then you cannot keep excusing your bitterness as “just being honest.”

— If forgiveness is the key, then you cannot keep punishing yourself for what He has already forgiven.

What Does That Mean For You?

If you are a non-believer — maybe your anger at others, at yourself, even at God,

is what's keeping you from Him.

You can't heal yourself.

You can't fix your past.
You can't undo what's been done.
But you can come to the cross —
where justice and mercy meet —
and finally lay it all down.

If you are a believer — stop waiting.
Stop excusing your unforgiveness because “you're just not ready.”
Stop calling it boundaries when it's really bitterness.
Stop rehearsing what they did to you — and start releasing them to God.
Stop punishing yourself for what Jesus already nailed to the cross.

So what say you?
Will you keep rattling the cage of your resentment?
Or will you finally use the key He put in your hand?

Father,
I confess my heart is hard.
I have clung to grudges and called it strength.
I have held others hostage in my mind and called it justice.
I have replayed my own failures and called it humility.

Forgive me.
Forgive my pride in thinking I know better than You.

Chapter 10: What If the Return of Christ Is Soon?

We Forget He's Coming

Chapter 11: What If I'm Not Worthy?

The Lie We Believe
