Lemon	Fertility, prosperity, abundance
Papaya	Health, fertility and sexuality

Avalo (1964)

A colombian artist with a background in jewelry and silversmithing, has been immersed in the world of visual art for over two decades, primarily through sculpture. His work is characterized by creation of exceptional pieces, whose conceptual foundations are rooted in the iconography of tropical fruits, including some exotics like; ***kiwi, watermelon and papaya.***

These sculptural pieces, while simple in terms of their elements, stand out for their exquisite conceptual design. They were created by an artist, jeweler, and craftsman who received training at one of the prestigious jewellery schools of the first world.

Such artwork is reminiscent of iconic creations like the skull entirely adorned and intervened with diamonds by the *British* artist ***HIRST***, or historical masterpieces such as the famous ***FABERGE*** jewellery, wich originated from an egg and was conceived and exclusively created from the *Russian* tsars of the *19th century*.

Avalo has chosen a conscious approach of distancing himself from the conventional art market and media channels. Currently, the artist is presenting his most intriguing artistic proposal to date through the **GLOBAL HERITAGE SUPPORT** Foundation platform, entitled ***FRUITS&ART.***

Incorporating Fruit into artistic installations

1

Interactive Art

Fruit installations can engage viewers through touch, smell, and taste, creating a multi-sensory experience.

Ephemeral Art
