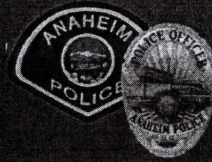
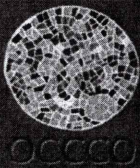

DOGS AND COYOTES

What you need to know

Coyotes are common in urban areas. Understanding canine behavior and modifying our own behavior is essential to peaceful coexistence with our wild neighbors.

UNDERSTANDING COYOTE BEHAVIOR

- Most interactions with coyotes in urban areas result from the presence of a dog, and/or from intentional or unintentional food availability.
- Coyotes are much like our domestic dogs and share similar behaviors. Curiosity and play are often misinterpreted as being “bold” or aggressive.
- Coyotes are naturally timid, but may view dogs as a threat or as competitors for territories, and for resources. They may defend their mates, their territory, and their pups during breeding season (winter) and pup rearing season (spring & summer). Understandably, they have a young family to protect.
- Coyotes may attempt to escort or divert your dog away from a den site or a food resource. Coyotes do not want to injure themselves, so they may put on a show to get your dog to move along, including a bluff charge or hunching the back, dropping the head and showing teeth. These “threat displays” are intended to scare your dog away without the risk of making physical contact. If the dog doesn’t move away, or engages the coyote, the threat may escalate. **Keep in mind that coyotes in the West weigh only 18-35 pounds!**
- Coyotes’ primary food sources in our cities include rats, gophers, insects, fruit. But human and pet foods (and water) may attract coyotes, so eliminate these attractants to reduce negative encounters.
- Many confrontational behaviors are seasonal, and are often a result of bold dog behavior.

HOW TO COEXIST

- Never let your dog chase or play with a coyote.
- In an area where coyotes have been seen, keep your dog closer to you than usual, and keep them under full control (voice-control or leash) at all times.
- Be aware of what is happening around you and what your dog is doing at all times.
- To protect your small dog, in coyote areas:
 - Avoid using a flexi-leash
 - Avoid walking near bushy areas or “edge zones”
 - Stand or walk with other people, and/or larger dogs
 - Avoid walking small dogs at dawn
- If a coyote gets too close for your comfort, and **you can make and maintain eye contact**, leash your larger dog or pick up your small dog, and haze the coyote (learn how to do this correctly using our *Coyote Hazing Field Guide*). If the coyote doesn’t leave, it’s likely there’s a den, pups, or food source that the coyote is protecting. Don’t run. Leave the area calmly. Change your routine to avoid this challenging area for awhile.
- If a coyote performs a threat display, or two or more coyotes charge your larger dog(s), leash up, leave the area calmly, and report it to your local animal control or humane society.

Open spaces and urban areas belong to all of us — people, dogs and wildlife. By being responsible dog guardians and minimizing dog interactions with coyotes, we can give each other “breathing room” and peacefully coexist.

NORMAL URBAN COYOTE BEHAVIOR

- Active in the daytime and nighttime
- Most active at dusk and dawn
- Watching you and your dog in plain view or from a camouflaged position (like dogs, coyotes are curious)
- Sitting on a hill in plain view
- Relaxing or playing in a field or other grassy area
- Walking and not paying attention to you
- Following you and your dog with curiosity from a comfortable distance
- Hunting gophers in fields and meadows
- "Escorting" your dog away from den/territory, food or pups during pup rearing season (spring & summer)
- Bluff charging your dog in an attempt to move your dog away from pups, during pup rearing season (spring & summer)
- Standing his or her ground unfazed by your attempts to scare him/her away, during pup rearing season (spring & summer)
- Waiting at stop lights to cross busy streets
- Dashing across a trail
- More than one coyote relaxing together or greeting each other
- Hearing coyotes howling and yipping (they are greeting, communicating and defining territories)
- When hazed, trots away, then stops and looks back (keep hazing until the coyote leaves)

WHEN TO TAKE ACTION (HAZE)

- If a coyote approaches to a proximity that you feel is uncomfortable and you can make and maintain eye contact, do not turn and run, haze the coyote according to our *Coyote Hazing Field Guide*, available in SF parks or download from ProjectCoyote.org
- When coyote seems interested in the food you are carrying, even if he doesn't approach, but hangs around appearing to wait for a handout
- Coyote is in your yard, unless you think there could be a den on your property

QUICK COYOTE HAZING TOOLS

- Surprise with a pop-up umbrella or simple noise maker (keep a penny in a shiny soda can and shake!).
- Wave your arms overhead, make direct eye contact and yell, "Go away coyote!" Don't stop until the coyote leaves.
- Pick up your small dog or put your large dog behind you before you haze so that the coyote focuses on you and your message.
- Download our *Coyote Hazing Field Guide* from ProjectCoyote.org to learn the why, when, where, and how of correcting unusual coyote behavior. Hazing must be done correctly and consistently to be effective.
- Living well with our wild neighbors is a community effort; please share this information widely!

Coyote Facts and Reducing Human Coyote Interactions

Suburban Coyote Population

In suburban areas, coyote population densities can be significantly higher than in wild areas, with some studies showing densities reaching up to one adult coyote per quarter-mile, meaning a much higher concentration compared to the typical wild coyote density of one per several square miles; this is due to the readily available food sources in suburban environments like trash and small pets.

Coyote Dens

Coyote pairs usually dig multiple dens in their territory. Most of which may never be used. Dens are not inhabited by adult coyotes. A pregnant female will give birth to pups in a den then leave to hunt and only return to nurse the pups. Pups may be moved between several dens several times in the first few months of life, usually for safety reasons and due to flea infestation. Pups stay in the den for about six weeks and then begin traveling short distances with adults. By the end of summer, pups are spending some time away from parents and attempting to hunt on their own or with siblings.

Good Practices

- **Keep pets safe:** Keep pets inside at night and leash them when walking. If you do let them out, keep them in a covered run.
- **Use deterrents:** Use solar-powered motion sensor lights, sounds, and sprinklers. You can also try bitter or spicy taste deterrents, or smell deterrents like cayenne pepper, vinegar, and ammonia.
- **Trim vegetation:** Trim ground-level shrubbery and thin out dense bushes and hedges.
- **Remove food sources:** Keep trash covered in secure bins, remove pet food bowls, and pick up fallen fruit.
- **Remove water sources:** Don't leave out pet water bowls, bird baths, or watering cans.
- **Secure compost:** Cover and secure compost bins and never compost meat or dairy products. **Don't feed coyotes:** Feeding coyotes can cause behavioral changes that can lead to problems for people and other animals.

- **Report aggressive coyotes.**
- **Be aware of coyote activity:** Coyotes are more active in the spring when they are feeding and protecting their young.
- **Be aware of coyote behavior:** Coyotes are naturally fearful of humans, but their behavior can change if they have access to food and garbage.
- **Use noisemakers:** Use a whistle, air horn, or other noisemakers to scare off coyotes.
- **Haze coyotes:** If you encounter a coyote, make loud noises like clapping, yelling, or banging on objects. You can also try waving your arms to make yourself appear larger.
- **Learn about coyote behavior:** Coyote behavior changes throughout the year, so understanding coyote behavior can help you be proactive.

Coyotes communicate a variety of emotions and intentions through their vocalizations and body language.

Vocalizations

- **Howling:** A common vocalization that can be used to communicate a variety of things, including greeting, territorial display, and agitation
- **Growling:** A threat used when a coyote is close to something
- **Huffing:** A high-intensity threat used when a coyote is close to something
- **Barking:** A long-distance threat or alert
- **Bark-howling:** A high-intensity threat or alarm that starts with a bark and blends into a howl
- **Whining:** A sound used to express submission, usually by a subordinate coyote to a more dominant coyote
- **Yelping:** A sound used to express submission or startle

Body language signaling fear and/or aggression:

- **Ears down and or pointed back**
- **Raised hackles**
- **Snarling**
- **Lunging**

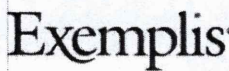

Code Enforcement

Property Maintenance

Those who own, lease, or occupy buildings or property are responsible for maintaining the property. Some common types of nuisance violations are indicated below:

General Conditions

- Unpainted exterior building surfaces causing dry rot, warping and termite infestation.
- Buildings that are abandoned, boarded up or partially destroyed for longer than a reasonable time.
- Broken windows on any property constituting hazardous conditions and inviting trespassers and malicious mischief.

Vegetation

- Overgrown vegetation which causes harm to neighboring properties or causes unsafe conditions for those walking or driving by.
- Dead trees or weeds that are unsightly and unsafe are likely to provide a home for rodents or insects.
- Live landscaping for single-family homes shall make up at least 50 percent of a property's front yard.

Unattractive or Dangerous Property Conditions

- Swimming pools, ponds, or other standing water that is unsanitary or stagnant without self-closing gates or fences.
- Clothes lines in front yards visible from the public street.
- Dry or dead shrubs, trees, or combustible materials may constitute a fire hazard.
- An obstacle or part of the landscape that obstructs the view of street signs, signals, or other directional signage.

Fencing

- Any fence that is not maintained in a structurally sound condition is considered unsafe.
- Rear yard fences must not exceed 6 feet high.
- Front yard fences, walls and hedges must not exceed 36 inches high.

Refuse/Waste

- Items such as rubbish, debris, machinery or parts, furniture, inoperable vehicles, yard waste, or junk of any kind are considered refuse/waste.
- Containers for trash and recyclables must be stored in an area not visible from the street. Such containers should be placed at the curb not more than 24 hours before scheduled pickup and removed within 24 hours of being emptied.
- Scavenging, or removing items from containers for trash and recyclables, is prohibited.

- Free bulky item pick-ups can be scheduled per address each calendar year by calling Republic Services at (714) 238-3300.

Noise

- Noise produced in excess of 60 decibels may be violation of the Anaheim Municipal Code.
- Sound created by construction or building repair is exempt from code requirements during the hours of 7 a.m. and 7 p.m.

Improper Occupancy

- Using any building, or a portion of any building, for living, sleeping, cooking, or dining is permitted only if it was built and approved for that purpose.
- Occupancy in a garage as a living area is prohibited.

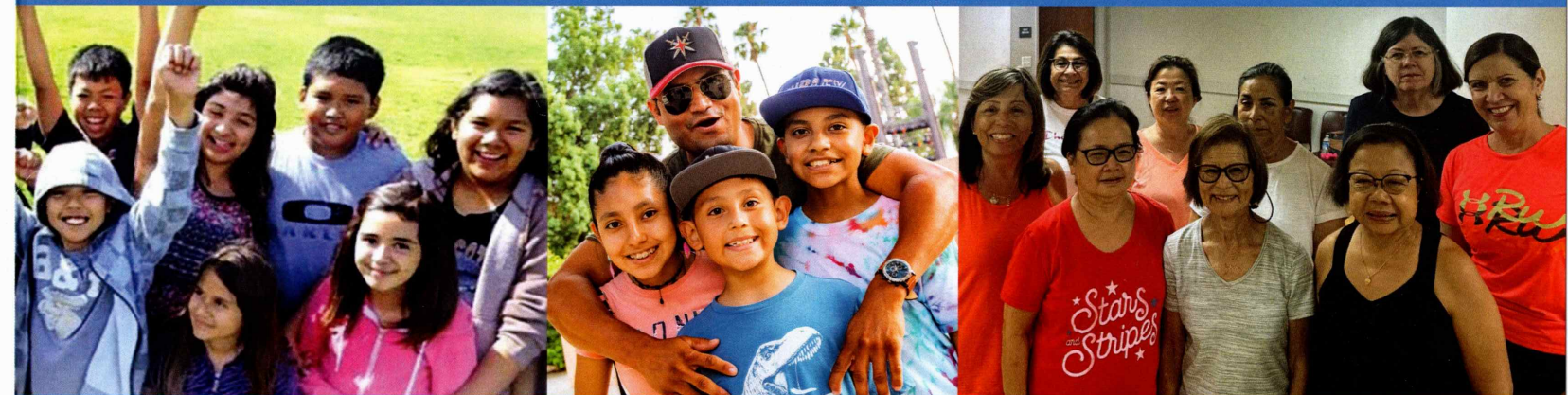

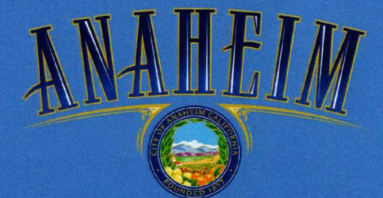

The ACF and the City of Anaheim commissioned Charitable Ventures to conduct a comprehensive community needs assessment. This report builds on a 2012 assessment focused on youth, extending the focus to include both Youth & Families (households with children ages 5-17 years) and Older Adults (ages 55 years or older) living in Anaheim.

Researchers employed various data collection methods, including analysis of publicly available data, surveys, and focus groups with youth & families and older adults.

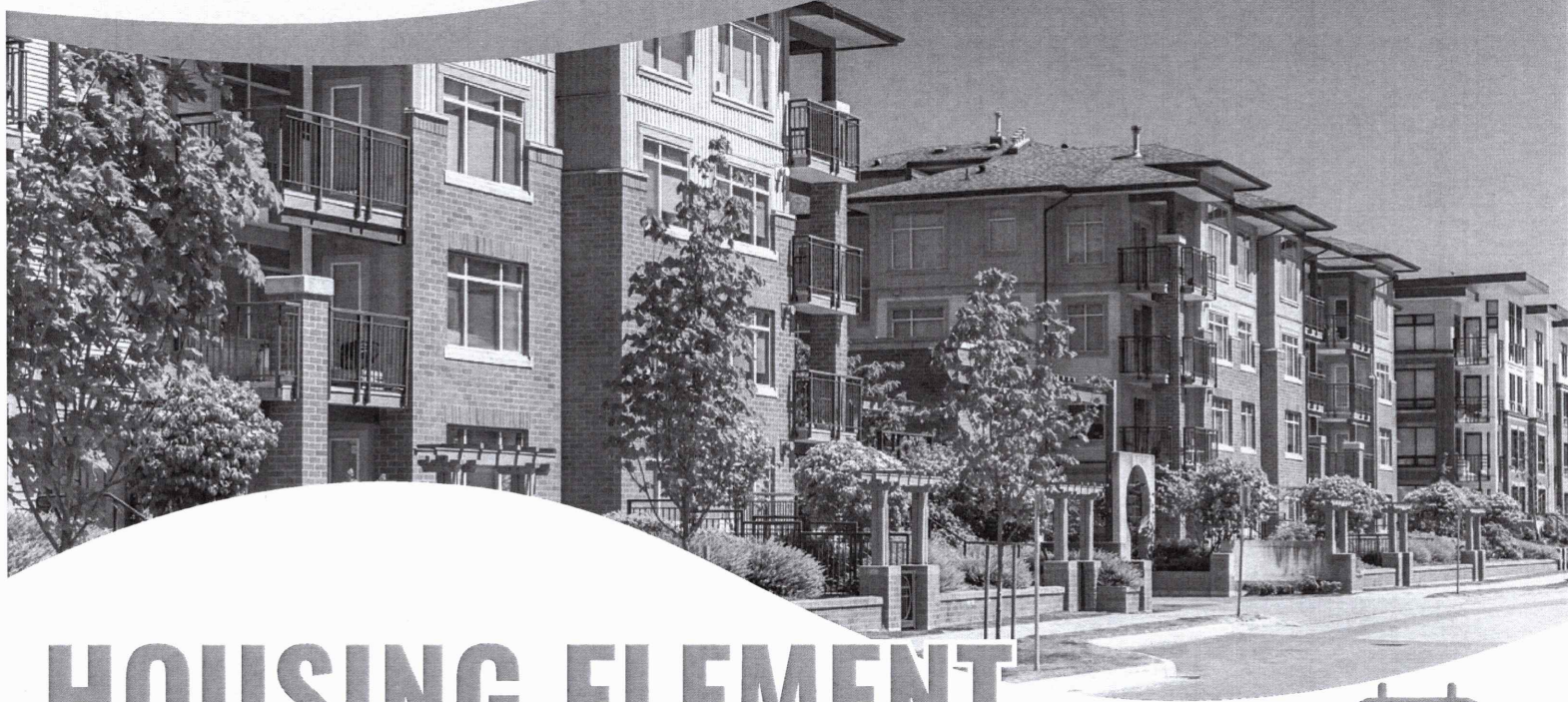
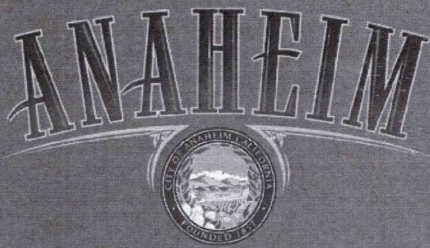


Youth & Families High-Level Report Findings

	Demographics: The 1,300 survey respondents were demographically diverse.	
	Housing: Challenges around high rental costs are leading to shared living spaces; need for financial rental assistance and housing advice.	While 37% of survey respondents reported not needing any housing resources, 20% needed financial rental assistance and 11% needed one-on-one housing advice.
	Health: Identified priorities around having physical and mental health resources, with significant interest in mental health support and safe community spaces.	Among survey respondents, 19% were interested in physical health information and 18% wanted mental/emotional health information.
	Education: Need for STEM classes, college prep, vocational training, and career opportunities.	Among survey respondents, there was high interest for academic achievement information (37%) and post-high school opportunities (35%).
	Food Access: Some families are food insecure.	Nearly one in three survey respondents (29%) expressed being concerned about having enough food to eat.
	Active Living: Interest in recreational facilities, sports teams, and safe outdoor spaces.	Just over half of respondents (51%) reported an interest in facilities for active lifestyle/recreation programs and 47% expressed interest in available sports activities/teams.
	Social Well-Being and Inclusion: Opportunities for engagement, including community events, outdoor activities, and social connections.	Survey respondents reported engagement with community events (35%), outdoor activities (33%), time with friends (30%), and participating in arts and crafts (29%).

	Housing: Need for affordable housing and assistance with home maintenance.	Eleven percent (11%) of respondents received rental assistance and 7% had access to affordable housing. In addition, 18% wanted financial rental assistance and 15% wanted assistance with necessary housing repairs and deferred maintenance.
	Health: Identified priorities of maintaining an active lifestyle and receiving physical health information.	A plurality of respondents (35%) were interested in learning more about how to maintain an active lifestyle and 30% wanted to know more about physical health.
	Affordable Aging/Financial Stability: Concerns around food insecurity, financial stability, and need for financial planning and fraud prevention programs.	While more than 70% indicated that they never lacked access to food, 13% indicated they were sometimes or always food insecure.
	Social Well-Being and Inclusion: Need for social activities, outdoor engagement, and community.	Almost half of respondents (47%) indicated that they never feel lonely, whereas 35% sometimes feel lonely and more than 10% often or always feel lonely.
	Caregiving: Challenge of accessing affordable and reliable caregivers.	Less than 10% of respondents currently have a caregiver, about 60% of those are paid.
	Transportation: Limited public transportation options and accessibility issues.	Only 15% of respondents used public transportation in the past 12 months. Of those that did not use public transportation, 72% drove themselves, 12% had another family member drive them, and 6% did not feel safe or comfortable.

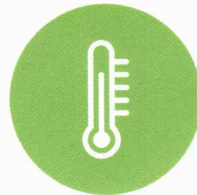
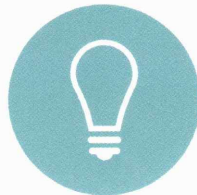

Anaheim welcomes immigrants as part of our community and, following California law, is not involved in immigration enforcement.

Our job is public safety for everyone in our city, regardless of status.

We do not work with federal Immigration and Customs Enforcement or Border Patrol unless called to respond to a broader public safety concern.

Be Aware

ICE and other federal agencies can come into our city with administrative and judicial warrants and detainers.

Where federal immigration is enforced in Anaheim, we ask that it be fair, reasonable and based on law.

Your Rights • What To Do

You are not required to answer questions, provide comments or offer information without a lawyer.

You have the right to have your case heard by a judge.

You are not required to provide your status or birthplace.

You are not required to sign any documents without legal review. Never sign anything you are unsure about.

Never use or show false or fraudulent documents or give a false name.

Administrative immigration warrants do not allow entry. A warrant issued by a judge can.

You are not required to open your door for an administrative warrant. Ask to slide under the door, carefully review.

Provide written authorization for an emergency contact to make decisions for your children if detained.
