The Dusk-to-Dawn Lighting Program is an excellent way to provide high efficiency outdoor lighting that turn on and off automatically to keep your home bright and safe. Anaheim Public Utilities offers a variety of lighting options to choose from to best fit your needs.

HOW TO RECEIVE A

FREE

LIGHT

- Contact us at 714-831-0025 to schedule an appointment.
- When fixtures are received, you will be asked to sign an agreement noting the terms of the program (*see program criteria*).
- You will have 30 days to install your lights. We recommend using a licensed electrician.
- Approximately 30 days after receiving your lights, call 714-831-0025 to confirm installation.
- Installations are subject to an inspection.

PROGRAM CRITERIA

- Participants must be Anaheim Public Utilities electric customers with current and non-delinquent accounts.
- Lights must be installed within the 30-days period. For new hardwired fixtures it is recommended that participant obtain multiple quotes from licensed electricians and also obtain a permit from the building department for installation.
- Lights must be maintained and used for five years from installation.
- Participant must provide access for inspection of the installed fixture(s).
- Participants are eligible to receive up to two (2) free light fixtures for their residential home.
- Program is subject to available funding.

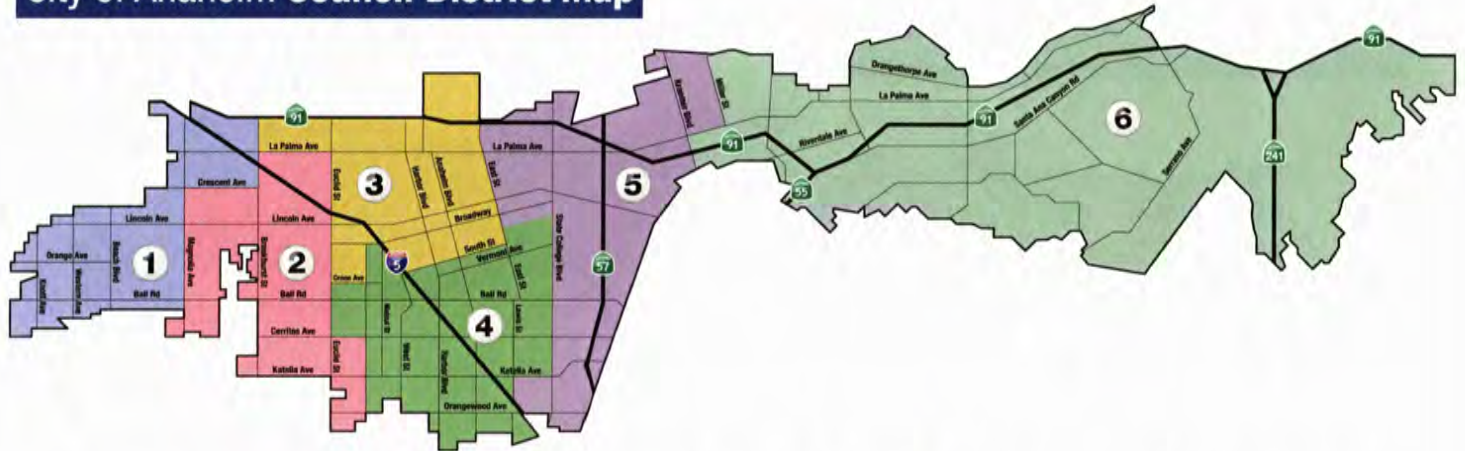

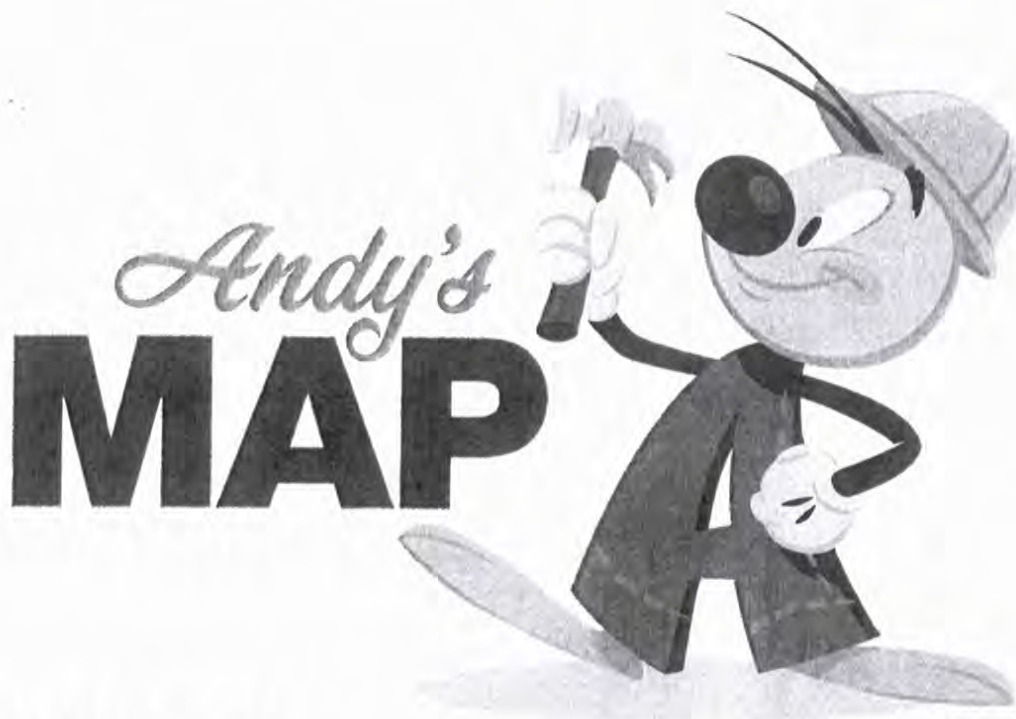

Senior Wheels Program Transportation Program for Anaheim Seniors



Availability and hours are subject to change. Please call (714) 765-4511 for an application or more information.

Transportation services are provided for active older adults aged 60 and above who are residents of Anaheim. Through the Senior Wheels Program, participants can access transportation within a 10-mile radius of their homes in Anaheim. Transportation for **nutrition-related activities** to city-sponsored congregate meal sites is available from 9:00 a.m. to 1:30 p.m. on weekdays. For **social, recreational, shopping, and medical purposes**, transportation is offered from 7:00 a.m. to 6:00 p.m. Monday through Friday, and from 9:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. on weekends.

Non-emergency medical appointment transportation with the city limits is also available. The Senior Wheels Program will provide transportation to:

- St. Joseph Medical Center - 1110 West Stewart Drive, Orange, CA
- UCI Medical Center - 101 The City Drive, Orange, CA
- Kaiser Permanente - 22550 Savi Ranch Parkway, Yorba Linda, CA
- Some additional medical sites may be approved on a case-by-case basis

Vouchers are priced at \$2.00 each; two vouchers are required for a round trip ride. There is no cost associated with attending the congregate meal program. To be eligible, registration on the meal site is mandatory. We accept payment via cash, check, and money orders. Please note that cash transactions are not permitted onboard the bus. Reservations are allocated on a first-come, first-served basis, subject to availability. Vouchers may be purchased at the Brookhurst Community Center (2271 Crescent Ave.), Downtown Anaheim Community Center (250 E. Center St.), and the East Anaheim Community Center (8201 E. Santa Ana Canyon Rd.), or via mail.

CITY OF ANAHEIM NEIGHBORHOOD CLEAN-UP PROGRAM OVERVIEW & PROCEDURES

Join forces with your neighbors to enhance the cleanliness of your neighborhood! The City of Anaheim offers an annual opportunity for a neighborhood clean-up, complete with the provision of large dumpster bins, free of charge. This program is designed to help residents dispose of oversized items that cannot fit into regular trash containers.

HERE ARE THE GUIDELINES FOR THE NEIGHBORHOOD CLEAN-UP PROGRAM:

Frequency:

Any neighborhood can partake in the clean-up initiative once a year.

Logistics:

Dumpsters will be delivered to specified addresses within the neighborhood on a Friday and collected on the following Monday, between 6:00 a.m. and 6:00 p.m. Bin placement is determined by our dedicated Neighborhood Services staff and clean-up organizer.

Coordination:

The resident requesting the clean-up, will act as the organizer. They may recruit volunteers, preferably neighbors and other residents, to assist with hosting a bin for the duration of the clean-up or various tasks throughout the event.

RESPONSIBILITIES

Clean-Up Petitioner:

The petitioner is responsible for organizing volunteers (at least one per bin) to monitor bins during the clean-up. They will also distribute flyers advertising the event to residents in the neighborhood. Flyers will be provided by our Neighborhood Services staff at no cost. The clean-up organizer ensures proper monitoring to prevent hazardous disposals and overflowing bins.

Volunteers:

The City of Anaheim emphasizes the importance of safety as volunteers work to support their neighbors with the collection, loading, and unloading of bulky items and shall assume no legal liability should safety precautions not be followed by the organizer or volunteers recruited by the clean-up organizer.

Volunteers must be at least eighteen (18) years old. If any issues arise, volunteers should contact the Anaheim Police Department. It's crucial for volunteers to inform the clean-up organizer when bins are full for prompt pickup. Carrying a cellular phone is highly recommended.

Neighborhood Services Staff:

Our dedicated staff will verify that the property owners contacted and listed by the organizer understand the expectations of the program during the clean-up. After confirming permission, free flyers advertising the event will be provided, along with coordination for trash bin delivery through Republic Services. The clean-up organizer will receive program guidelines, bin guidelines, hazardous materials procedures, and important contact numbers for use during the event. If the clean-up program doesn't suit your needs, consider the following alternative:

BULKY ITEM COLLECTION

To dispose of items like furniture, refrigerators, stoves, or water heaters, Republic Services offers a FREE bulky item pickup service. Each household is entitled to three bulky item pickups per calendar year, with up to 20 items per pickup. Schedule an appointment by calling Republic Services' Customer Service line at (714) 238-2444. Be ready to list the items you need picked up.

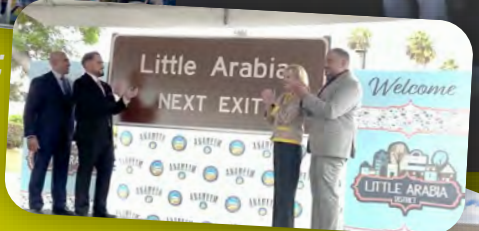
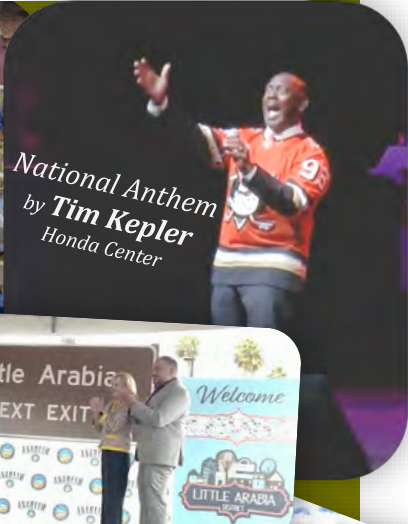
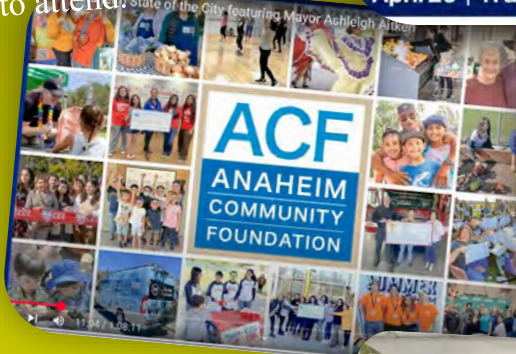
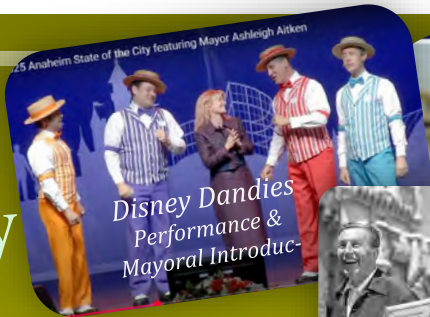
I attended my first State of the City

Mayor Aitken proclaims Anaheim a place for all, highlights immigrants, visitors in State of the City

Mayor Ashleigh Aitken, at the annual State of the City address on Tuesday, proclaimed Anaheim as a place for all, recognizing the city's founding and growth by immigrants who came looking for a better life and the millions from around the world that visit.

"As a visitor city, we welcome everyone," Aitken said, "from those around the world who have made Anaheim their adopted home to those who come here to visit and enjoy all our city has to offer."

The annual address is a moment for Aitken to share reflections on the city's accomplishments over the last year and point to a broader message about its direction.

Aitken, drawing on the city's immigrant roots, said Anaheim is a place that has welcomed the world in, whether as a new home or an escape for a day at Disneyland.

"So to all looking to build their American dream, to inspire their imaginations, to find prosperity and success, to embrace the future and to be part of something bigger than ourselves, you've come to the right place," Aitken said.

The mayor spoke to a **sold-out crowd** at the Grove of Anaheim made up of the city's business and community leaders. The event is a fundraiser for the nonprofit Anaheim Community Foundation. It's the third State of the City address for Aitken since becoming mayor in 2022.

Guided on stage by a quartet of Dapper Dans from Disneyland singing about the mayor and Anaheim, Aitken's speech went over much of Anaheim's history and some of what's to come that make it a visitor destination, including **DisneylandForward**, **OCVibe** and the **2028 Olympics**.

Aitken said some 25 million people a year visit Disneyland, attend conventions or watch the Angels or Ducks play. Nearly **70% of Anaheim's revenue** -paying for the city's parks, libraries, police and fire departments -comes from visitors, Aitken said.

Aitken brought up several **firsts** that took root in Anaheim, some literally. The boysenberry, Disneyland, St. John Knits, Vans, the American Basketball Association and the grocery store chain Northgate Gonzalez Market all have origins in Anaheim.

Northgate is one of the largest Hispanic grocery chains in the nation, Aitken said, and one of the biggest employers for Anaheim. And it all started on Anaheim Boulevard after Don Miguel Gonzalez arrived in search of the American dream," Aitken said. "Our city's history and legacy of innovation attract others who want to be part of the Anaheim story."

Anaheim is celebrating its **168th anniversary** this year, and **Disneyland's 70th**. The Disneyland Resort is on the cusp of a reinvigoration with the expansion of Avengers Campus and attractions and lands based on the films "**Coco**" and "**Avatar**." And the Honda Center was just confirmed to host indoor volleyball for the **2028 Olympics**.

In the coming weeks, the city will receive the **first \$15 million** that Disney pledged to the city for affordable housing as part of the approval for **DisneylandForward**. This summer, Disney will give **\$8 million** for the city's parks, Aitken said.

One announcement Tuesday is that Anaheim is looking to add a third sister city: **Guadalajara**, Mexico. Anaheim already has the sister cities of Mito, **Japan**, and Vitoria-Gasteiz, **Spain**. The city is in the early stages of forging ties with Guadalajara, Aitken said. "For all our city's ties to **Mexico**, with our shared history as part of Spanish America, with half of our residents tracing their roots to Mexico, with millions of yearly Mexican visitors, with friendly exchanges with the consulate in Santa Ana and with federal and state friends across Mexico, I always thought it was curious that we don't have a sister city in Mexico yet," Aitken said.

On a more street level, Aitken said the city has so far spent **\$35 million** buying and closing **problematic motels** along Beach Boulevard. The **Rebuild Beach Boulevard initiative** will soon hit another milestone when the 39 Commons retail center at Beach and Lincoln Avenue opens and new affordable housing communities are set to be built.

Ending her speech, Aitken highlighted the partnership forged between the city and The Walt Disney Company at the outset of Disneyland, with Walt Disney writing in 1953 that it would be "filled with the accomplishments, the joys and hopes of the world we live in. And it will remind us and show us how to make these wonders part of our own lives."

Mayor Ashleigh Aitken hails Anaheim as a visitor city for all in annual address

The Dapper Dans of Disneyland crooned as they introduced Anaheim Mayor Ashleigh Aitken during her annual State of the City speech at the Grove of Anaheim.

Taking helm of Orange County's most populous city three years ago in a time of turmoil and political corruption, Aitken implied by omission that Anaheim is in a more harmonious place now.

With Disneyland's 70th birthday a few months away and the Honda Center investing in renovations ahead of playing host to Olympic volleyball in 2028, Aitken looked forward to "greater things" to come.

Eschewing a lectern, she confidently strolled along the Grove's stage on Tuesday while boosting Anaheim as a city of immigrants and a global destination.

"As a visitor city, we welcome everyone; from those around the world who have made Anaheim their adopted home to those who come here to visit and enjoy all our city has to offer," Aitken said.

While Disneyland's milestone arrives in July with commemorative merchandise already on the shelves, Aitken touted the arrival of a "new era" with DisneylandForward, a \$2- billion expansion plan on its existing properties.

"Our city has cleared the way with approval on zoning and planning that will expand Anaheim as a global visitor economy in the decades to come," she said of Anaheim City Council's vote approving DisneylandForward a year ago.

With nearly 70% of Anaheim's general fund coming from the Anaheim Resort District, Aitken expected Disneyland's expansion to bring more money for the city's parks, libraries, community centers and public safety.

Anaheim also negotiated additional community benefits from Disneyland beyond expected tax revenue increases.

"In the coming weeks we will see Disney's first \$15 million contribution to affordable housing in Anaheim," Aitken said. "It is the first of two payments, with another \$15 million coming in the next few years." The corporation has also pledged to contribute \$8 million to the city's parks.

Aitken hailed OC Vibe, another multibillion-dollar project in Anaheim, as "transformative." The development will turn the land around the Honda Center into a hub of entertainment and housing.

"OC Vibe represents a \$4-billion -with a 'b' -investment in our city," Aitken emphasized. "That's not even counting the \$450 million being directly invested in our Honda Center."

For as vibrant as the business climate in the city appears to be, the Anaheim Chamber of Commerce almost disbanded before the speech in the wake of an FBI political corruption probe that first surfaced three years ago. Todd Ament, the Chamber's former president and chief executive, pleaded guilty to four felonies, including wire fraud, in connection to the investigation.

Ament cooperated with federal agents and surreptitiously recorded former Anaheim Mayor Harry Sidhu wanting to ask for \$1-million from Angels Baseball in political spending in return for negotiating the now-defunct deal to sell Angel Stadium and the land around it to a company controlled by team owner Arte Moreno.

A judge recently sentenced Sidhu to two months in federal prison for related crimes.

Slated to close, a new board of directors announced that the Chamber is going to reorganize a day before the speech. The Chamber also passed a resolution disassociating itself from the Anaheim Chamber of Commerce PAC, a spending vehicle that poured hefty sums into mayoral races, including in support Sidhu against Aitken in 2018.

"Having a Chamber of Commerce is a good thing, in general, for cities and it's a way to bring businesses together for the common good," said Tom Tait, who served as Anaheim mayor from 2010 to 2018 and butted heads politically with the local trade association. "That wasn't was what the Chamber was in Anaheim. It was run by special interests for special interests. Time will tell if this will truly be a fresh start." The Chamber's political influence in Anaheim even extended to past State of the City addresses that it organized until Tait wrested the event away from it in 2015. "Ament wanted to control my speech," Tait said. "If he couldn't, he threatened to have Councilwoman Kris Murray give the State of the City."

Aitken mentioned political corruption in her past two State of the City addresses and the city has approved several reforms under her tenure as mayor to increase accountability and oversight, including the hiring of an ethics officer. But in her latest speech, Aitken preferred to focus on the changes coming to Anaheim, from east to west.

She touted Rebuild Beach Boulevard, an effort to redevelop seedy motels along the highway into housing and retail. The city has spent nearly \$35 million buying, closing and clearing motel properties on Beach.

"In the days ahead, we will tear down the Rainbow Inn, our fourth demolition in four years," she said. "That will clear the way for townhomes and affordable apartments." Aitken praised popular chains slated to come to the intersection of Beach Boulevard and Lincoln Avenue, which will also be home to the first Dutch Bros location in Anaheim.

"As a city, we are building on a track record with our transformation of the Anaheim Resort, downtown Anaheim, the Platinum Triangle, and we are now leading the way on Beach," she said.

The mayor also praised Little Arabia, an enclave populated by small businesses, as a continuum of the immigrant entrepreneurial spirit that led Germans to start a wine colony in the late 1850s that turned into the modern city Anaheim is today.

She concluded with a Disney-like message on Anaheim's behalf to anyone looking to come to the city and better it by their own ambitions.

"To all looking to build their American Dream, to inspire their imaginations, to find prosperity and success, to embrace the future and to be part of something bigger than ourselves," Aitken said, "well, you've come to the right place."
