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
Know your Paint Brush



A paint brush comprises of three primary components: bristles, ferrule, and handle.

The bristles vary in shape, size, and material, depending on the intended use. The ferrule's purpose is to hold the bristles in place, preventing them from falling out. Lastly, the handle is made of wood or plastic and can be either long or short, depending on the user's preference.

Brush Shape



Round brush

for outlines, thick/thin lines, adding details

Liner brush

A thin round brush with long bristles for outlines, branches

Flat brush

Square edge, great for washes. Thin lines can be painted with the chisel edge


Bright brush

Same as flat brush but shorter bristles, great for impasto

Filbert brush

Soft rounded edge, best for washes, flower petals

Special Brushes



Fan brush

Great to create clouds, trees & grass

Angular brush

Great to create curved strokes, fill corners

Detail brush

Short thin, round brush, great for highlights and details

Cat's tongue

Great for washes and flowers

Notch brush

Create tree trunk, fur, grass, feathers and hair

Which brush to BUY?

Shape

As a beginner it is best to invest in the basic 3 brushes; a flat, a round & a liner brush.

These can help you create versatile brush strokes

Size

Buying one brush of medium size of a round & flat brush is enough for a beginner

Synthetic/Natural

Natural bristle brushes are expensive and not so compatible with ACRYLICS, whereas the new age synthetic brushes are better suited as they imitate the natural bristles and are easier to clean. For blending / glazing use a brush with soft bristles. For visible brushwork use a stiffer brush

Which brush to BUY?

Long handle/ Short handle

A short handle is usually the size of a pencil and can feel quite natural & comfortable to hold. It is the preferred choice for artists who like to work up close.

The long handle may seem awkward initially but is great for artists who work with an easel and prefer to stand away from their work to render a more loose style

At present I'm using

- Round brush size 4
- Flat brush size 2 & size 8
- Liner brush for fine lines



How to clean your Paint Brush

- Wipe off the excess paint on a rag/ towel
- Swirl the brush in water to remove the leftover paint
- Shake off excess water and move the brush to and fro over Artist's soap or any mild soap
- Shape the bristles to their original shape and let it rest horizontally for 10-15 minutes
- Wash off the soap & reshape
 the bristles
- Leave the brush to dry horizontally on a lint free rag

Do's & Don'ts in Brush Care

Use a palette knife to mix colours





Don't let paint dry on the brush

Don't rest the brush in water
