#### Curatorial note

Categorised as the highest form of holy creation, the design of a human body offers suffering and salvation as its highest reward. Transcribing the human experience into metaphorical representations, the act of making also translates as an act of redemption.

The exhibit delves into the sensitives of the body, revisiting flesh as a spatial and fluid material, a porous surface capable of both receiving and transmitting information. The language of the survey acts as guide, where salvation comes no longer from prescribed rules for an ideal purity, but from our willingness to experience the self in relation to others in our lives.

Emphasizing on the design of the body as a conduit for vulnerability, human connection and condition, the exhibition "Apart" Illustrates the intimate relationship of the self with its truest form – representing violent, sensual, and political underpinnings.


### Hamida hassani

Iln my works i have incorporated my personal concerns revolving around gender, sexuality and emotions especially in the light of societal, cultural and religious perceptions. I have used organic shapes, colors, mark makings and elements of landscape, for example illustrated mountains, stones, greenery and sky in my paintings as a channel to my experiences of belonging to a traditional community. The repercussion of this belonging comes in the form of an exasperating artistic process which depicts an outrage rooted with shame and guilt.

This outrage shows as an obsession to paint and a compulsion to erase the paint from the surface again and again. This act of adding and subtracting is repeated until layers are formed, which is why my process work doesn't often resemble my final work. Working like this allows my interest in transitioning the meanings of the forms where the meaning of the visual is no longer interlinked with its general perception. This analogue strategy embodies bits and pieces of personal, gender and societal freedom.


# Salar Marri


Central to Marri's work is the human figure, exploring how paint can morph, bruise, stretch, and convey both the vitality and lifelessness of a body or an object.





Flash I 8"x12" Oil on linoleum, mounted on plywood, deodar 2023 PKR 35,000




Flash II 9"x12" Oil on linoleum, mounted on plywood, deodar 2023 PKR 35,000








Faint V 8"x8" Oil on canvas 2023 PKR 30,000


1 invite viewers to contemplate the profound concept of shedding skin, much like we do with our clothes and to reflect on the remnants left behind.
