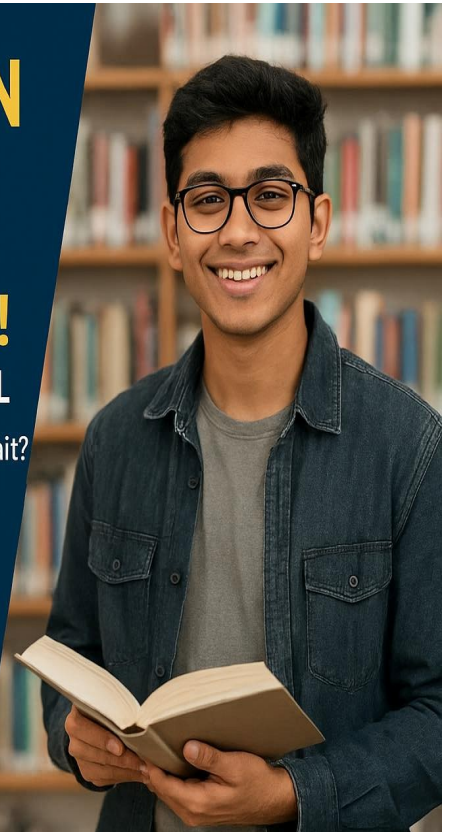
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Drug Enforcement Commission Meeting



On Thursday, October 30th, the Springfields students had the opportunity to meet with the Drug Enforcement Commission (DEC) for a talk on drug awareness. The session gave us a clear picture of how drugs affect individuals and how common drug use can be among students. We learned about the impact drugs can have not just on the person using them, but also on their families and communities, and what the law says about drug misuse and trafficking.

During the session, the DEC officers explained their organization's work and described the different departments involved in addressing drug issues. They spoke openly about the

health effects of drug use and how addiction can take control of someone's life. The officers also discussed the legal consequences of being involved with drugs. What stood out was that they did not just focus on punishment, but also highlighted the support



available for people who want to recover.

The DEC runs programs that offer counselling and rehabilitation to those struggling with addiction.

Throughout the session, the officers were approachable and answered all the questions asked. This meeting helped us understand that drug aware-

ness is not just about avoiding drugs, but also knowing the risks, being honest about the issue, and understanding that there is support that exists for anyone who needs it.

Their visit was impactful as it helped spread awareness and provide guidance about drug misuse.
