Week 1: Foundation of Faith

Day 1: Love Me Tender

Love me tender, love me sweet
Never let me go
You have made my life complete
And I love you so

Scripture Reading

"Love is patient, love is kind and is not jealous; love does not brag and is not arrogant, does not act unbecomingly; it does not seek its own, is not provoked, does not take into account a wrong suffered, does not rejoice in unrighteousness, but rejoices with the truth; bears all things, believes all things, hopes all things, endures all things."

1 Corinthians 13:4-7 (NASB)

Reflection

In this profound passage, Paul paints a masterpiece of divine love—not with broad, abstract strokes, but with precise, practical brushstrokes that reveal what love looks like in action. This isn't just any love; it's the kind of tender, enduring love that God demonstrates toward us and calls us to show others.

The Greek word used here for love is "agape"—a selfless, sacrificial love that originates from God Himself. Notice how Paul describes love not by what it feels, but by what it does and doesn't do. Love is patient—it waits without growing bitter. Love is kind—it actively seeks the good of others. When Paul says love "bears all things," the Greek word "stego" suggests the image of a roof that protects from the storm—love shields and protects.

This description of love serves as both a mirror and a window: a mirror showing us where we fall short in our own expressions of love, and a window through which we glimpse God's perfect love for us. When we understand that God loves us with this tender, patient, kind love, it transforms how we receive His love and how we share it with others.

4. How might your relationships change if you began to love others with the same tender, enduring love that God shows you?
5. What practical steps can you take today to better reflect God's kind of love to those around you?

Application

Take a moment to list three specific situations in your life where you need to demonstrate more patient, kind, or humble love. Next to each situation, write down one practical way you can show this love today, remembering that God's love for you is your source and model.

Prayer

Day 2: Amazing Grace

Amazing grace, how sweet the sound
That saved a wretch like me
I once was lost, but now I'm found
Was blind, but now I see

Scripture Reading

"For by grace you have been saved through faith; and this is not of yourselves, it is the gift of God; not a result of works, so that no one may boast."

Ephesians 2:8-9 (NASB)

Reflection

In these two powerful verses, Paul presents the foundational truth of the Christian faith: salvation is entirely a gift of God's grace. The Greek word for grace, "charis," speaks of unmerited favor—a gift given not because of any worthiness in the recipient, but because of the generous nature of the giver.

Notice the clear emphasis Paul places on the source of our salvation. It is "not of yourselves" and "not a result of works." This repetition serves to eliminate any confusion about the role of human effort in salvation. Like a master artist signing their masterpiece, God ensures that His grace alone receives the glory for our salvation.

The phrase "through faith" is crucial—it's the empty hand that receives the gift, not the means by which we earn it. Even this faith itself is described as "the gift of God," removing any grounds for human boasting. Just as a drowning person contributes nothing to their rescue except the desperate need to be saved, we contribute nothing to our salvation except our need for it.

Questions for Reflection

1. How does understanding salvation as a complete gift of God's grace change your view of your relationship with Him?
2. In what ways do you still try to "earn" God's favor through your actions? What does this reveal about your understanding of grace?
3. Why do you think it's so difficult for humans to accept a gift as magnificent as salvation without trying to contribute something to it?
4. How might your life look different if you fully embraced the truth that your salvation is entirely a work of God's grace?
5. In what ways can you extend this same kind of unmerited grace to others in your life?

Application

Take time today to identify areas in your life where you might be operating under a performance-based mindset rather than grace. Write down specific ways you can begin to live from a position of receiving God's grace rather than trying to earn it. Consider how this truth might transform your relationships with others.

Prayer

Heavenly Father,

Your grace truly is amazing—far beyond my comprehension or deserving. Thank You for the gift of salvation that You freely give, not because of anything I have done or could do, but simply because of Your great love and mercy.

Forgive me for the times I've tried to earn what You freely give, for the moments I've relied on my own efforts rather than resting in Your grace. Help me to fully embrace the truth that my salvation is entirely Your work, Your gift, Your grace.

Transform my heart to better understand and receive Your grace. Let this understanding overflow into how I treat others, that I might become a channel of Your grace in this world. Free me from the need to prove myself, and help me rest secure in Your finished work.

Scripture Reading

"God is our refuge and strength, a very present help in trouble. Therefore we will not fear, though the earth should change and though the mountains slip into the heart of the sea; though its waters roar and foam, though the mountains quake at its swelling pride."

Psalm 46:1-3 (NASB)

Reflection

In this powerful psalm, we find a timeless truth about God's unwavering presence during life's storms. The psalmist paints a vivid picture of extreme circumstances—mountains falling into seas, waters roaring, the very earth changing beneath our feet. Yet in the midst of such chaos, God remains our refuge and strength.

The Hebrew word for "present" in this passage is "matsa," which implies being readily found or available. God isn't a distant observer of our troubles—He is immediately accessible, already there before we call out. Like a mighty bridge standing firm above turbulent waters, His presence provides safe passage through our storms.

Guide me across these troubled waters, keeping my eyes fixed on You rather than the waves below. Let my life be a testimony to Your faithful presence.

Scripture Reading

"Peace I leave with you; My peace I give to you; not as the world gives do I give to you. Do not let your heart be troubled, nor let it be fearful."

John 14:27 (NASB)

Reflection

In this profound passage, Jesus makes a distinction between the peace He offers and the peace the world provides. The Greek word used here for peace is "eirene," which goes beyond the mere absence of conflict to encompass a state of complete well-being and spiritual harmony.

Jesus's words "not as the world gives" are particularly striking. The world's peace is temporary, dependent on favorable circumstances. But the peace Christ offers remains steady regardless of external conditions. It's a peace that can exist even in the midst of turmoil, much like the eye of a hurricane remains calm while storms rage around it.

Scripture Reading

"Great is the Lord, and highly to be praised, and His greatness is unsearchable. One generation shall praise Your works to another, and shall declare Your mighty acts. On the glorious splendor of Your majesty and on Your wonderful works, I will meditate. Men shall speak of the power of Your awesome acts, and I will tell of Your greatness."

Psalm 145:3-6 (NASB)

Reflection

In this magnificent psalm, David attempts to capture the infinite nature of God's greatness, yet acknowledges that it is "unsearchable." The Hebrew word for "unsearchable" (*'ên ḥēqer*) suggests something that cannot be fathomed or fully investigated—no matter how deep we dive into understanding God's greatness, there are always new depths to explore.

The psalm speaks of passing this understanding from one generation to another—a beautiful picture of how the recognition of God's greatness transcends time and culture. When we contemplate God's majesty, we participate in this timeless chain of worship, joining countless generations who have stood in awe of His greatness.

Scripture Reading

The bird also has found a house, and the swallow a nest for herself, where she may lay her young, even Your altars, O Lord of hosts, My King and my God. How blessed are those who dwell in Your house! They are ever praising You."

Psalm 84:1-4 (NASB)

Reflection

In this beautiful psalm, we encounter the heart's deep yearning for God's presence. The Hebrew word for "longed" (nikhsephah) expresses an intense desire that consumes both body and soul. Like a homesick traveler, the psalmist's entire being craves the comfort found in God's sanctuary.

The psalm's imagery of birds finding nests near God's altar presents a powerful picture of finding security in His presence. Just as these small creatures find safety within the temple courts, we too can find our place of refuge in God's presence. The sanctuary becomes more than a building—it becomes a spiritual home where our restless hearts find peace.

Day 7: He Touched Me

He touched me, oh, He touched me

Scripture Reading

"And a leper came to Jesus, beseeching Him and falling on his knees before Him, and saying, 'If You are willing, You can make me clean.' Moved with compassion, Jesus stretched out His hand and touched him, and said to him, 'I am willing; be cleansed.' Immediately the leprosy left him and he was cleansed."

Mark 1:40-42 (NASB)

Reflection

In this powerful encounter, we witness a profound moment where divine compassion meets human suffering. The Greek word for "moved with compassion" (*spagchnistheis*) describes a deep, gut-level emotional response—Jesus wasn't merely sympathetic; He was deeply moved by this man's condition.

The significance of Jesus touching the leper cannot be overstated. In that culture, lepers were untouchables, forced to live in isolation. Yet Jesus, breaking social and religious barriers, reaches out and touches him. This physical contact wasn't necessary for healing—Jesus could have spoken the word from a distance. Instead, He chose to touch the untouchable, showing that His healing extends beyond the physical to restore dignity and community.

Then identify someone in your life who needs healing and write down specific ways you can extend Christ's compassionate touch to them this week.

Prayer

Thank You for Your Son Jesus, who willingly reaches out to touch our broken places. Thank You that no condition is too desperate, no situation too defiling, and no person too far gone for Your healing touch.

Lord, we come like the leper, falling at Your feet, acknowledging our need for Your cleansing touch. We believe in Your power to heal and restore. Touch those areas in our lives that need Your healing presence—whether physical ailments, emotional wounds, or spiritual brokenness.

Give us courage to reach out to others with Your love, to be Your hands and feet to those who feel untouchable in our world. Help us remember that Your touch not only heals but restores dignity and worth.

May we never lose our wonder at Your willingness to touch our lives and make us whole.

Scripture Reading

"Bear one another's burdens, and thereby fulfill the law of Christ."

Galatians 6:2 (NASB)

Reflection

In this succinct yet profound verse, Paul captures the essence of Christian compassion. The Greek word for "bear" (*bastazete*) implies not just carrying something temporarily, but sustaining the weight over time. This speaks to the deep commitment required in truly sharing another's burdens.

The phrase "law of Christ" refers to Jesus's command to love one another as He has loved us. This love is not theoretical but practical—it requires us to step into another's situation and share their load. Just as Christ took on our burdens, we are called to do the same for others.

Day 9: If I Can Dream

Scripture Reading

"For I know the plans that I have for you," declares the Lord, "plans for welfare and not for calamity to give you a future and a hope."

Jeremiah 29:11 (NASB)

Reflection

This powerful promise was originally given to Israel during their exile in Babylon—a time of national crisis and uncertainty. The Hebrew word for "plans" (*machashavot*) suggests carefully crafted thoughts or designs, indicating that God's plans for us are intentional and detailed, not haphazard or arbitrary.

The promise of "welfare" (*shalom* in Hebrew) encompasses more than just material prosperity—it speaks of complete well-being, peace, and fulfillment. When God promises a "future and a hope," He's speaking of an expected end that brings about His divine purpose. Even in our darkest moments, like Israel's exile, God is working out His perfect plan.

Elisha's reaction, calling out "My father, my father," reveals both the personal impact of loss and the recognition of divine purpose in this supernatural event.

The instruction to "lay aside every encumbrance" points to the ancient runners who would strip away anything that might slow them down. The word "encumbrance" (ogkon) refers to any weight—not necessarily sin—that might hinder our spiritual progress. Just as a runner wouldn't wear a heavy coat during a race, we must identify and shed whatever slows our spiritual journey.

The command to "be strong and courageous" is directly linked to God's promise of presence. Our courage isn't based on our own strength but on the certainty that God goes with us. The word "goes" (holek) is in the present continuous tense, suggesting God's ongoing, active accompaniment through every situation.

The promise that God will not "forsake" us uses a word (ya'azoveka) that implies abandonment or leaving behind. This is more than just physical presence—it's a commitment to never abandon us emotionally, spiritually, or in any other way.

The connection between submission to God and resistance to evil is significant. True surrender to God becomes our strongest defense against temptation. When we fully yield to God's authority, we find ourselves empowered to stand against spiritual opposition.

The promise that God will draw near to us when we draw near to Him reveals the relational aspect of surrender. This isn't about blind submission to an impersonal force, but about moving closer to a loving Father who responds to our approach with His presence.

The phrase "day of salvation" speaks to more than just initial conversion—it encompasses every opportunity to respond to God's work in our lives. Each moment presents us with choices that have eternal significance, making "now" always the critical time for spiritual decisions.

Notice the present tense of "gives"—this isn't just a past event or future promise, but a continuous reality. God is constantly extending to us the victory that Christ has already secured, making it available for every challenge we face.

Psalm 103:1-5 (NASB)

Reflection

In this psalm of praise, David speaks to his own soul, commanding it to remember and respond to God's goodness. The Hebrew phrase "bless the Lord" (bareki et-YHWH) implies actively speaking well of God's character and deeds—a deliberate act of grateful recognition.

The command to "forget none of His benefits" suggests our natural tendency toward spiritual amnesia. The list that follows provides a comprehensive view of God's care: pardoning (spiritual), healing (physical), redeeming (emotional), crowning (relational), and satisfying (provisional).

The metaphor of youth renewed like the eagle speaks to the rejuvenating power of remembering God's goodness. Just as eagles molt and emerge with renewed strength, our spiritual vitality is renewed through conscious reflection on God's benefits.

Reflection

The description of voices like "many waters" and "mighty peals of thunder" suggests the overwhelming magnitude of this heavenly praise. This isn't a quiet, subdued ceremony but a thunderous celebration of God's final victory and reign.

The marriage imagery presents the culmination of all history—the eternal union between Christ and His church. This celebration marks not just an ending but a beginning, the start of an eternal fellowship of joy and victory.

Elvis Presley: A Journey of Faith

From Tupelo to Eternity

Elvis Aaron Presley's spiritual journey began in the humble surroundings of Tupelo, Mississippi, where he was born on January 8, 1935. His earliest exposure to faith came through the Assembly of God church, where the Presley family were regular attendees. It was here that young Elvis first experienced the power of gospel music, which would influence him throughout his life.

Growing up in poverty, the Presley family relied heavily on their faith and the support of their church community. Elvis's mother, Gladys, was particularly influential in nurturing his spiritual foundation.
