### York Interfaith visit to RAF Leeming 31 May 2023 by Varsha Gulati



When I got an email about the visit to RAF Leeming in February 2023, I jumped at the chance and booked myself in. At that time, I did not know what is it all about, except it was through Interfaith and that Penny had passed the message to us.

As the time was approaching, I realised that many other faith groups were also given the opportunity to visit and see the new multifaith prayer room, and be part of the opening ceremony.

Avtar hired a 7-seater vehicle and collected us all from our respective houses one by one and, very patiently (Thank you Avtar!), drove us all to our destination. We arrived on time, after a 30-mile journey to RAF Leeming.

We then had to be registered and needed our photo identity. I had completely forgotten to take my passport but luckily had my driving licence with me. Sister Patricia, Avtar, Dee, Penny, Daryoush, Rasha of course did not forget this essential document!!

While we were registering, a couple of Airforce officers came in the office to welcome us and escort us to the waiting buses to the Chaplaincy Centre. We were welcomed and offered tea and coffee, along with some wonderful homemade cakes and biscuits (which, I understand, were made by the Chaplaincy clerk Jane herself). There were representatives of other faith organisations and we all had some interesting conversation and some exchange of ideas.

The time had arrived and we went into a beautiful auditorium where there was a welcome speech by Reverend David Haslam, followed by a presentation by Alexandria, Assistant Commander of RAF Leeming.

There were few other presentations and then we were taken in our bus to look at the new MULTIFAITH ROOM. We all waited while the ribbon was cut by Alexandria, Assistant Commander, and then we entered this important faith room.

It is a simple room with a display cabinet in which the essential symbols and literature of the faiths were each presented on its own individual shelf. It seemed that a lot of thought and work has gone into this achievement.

People can sit down, read, meditate and it is a place to think and reflect.

York Interfaith Group presented Alexandria, Assistant Commander, with a copy of our interfaith prayer book, which is part of their book collection.

Following this we were taken for our lunch in the dining room and had a very nice lunch with coffee to follow.

After lunch the bus was waiting to take us to "Squadron 11", the Qatari squadron. I got a little late coming out of the canteen and the bus had just left. Luckily for me I was rescued by an officer from a neighbouring unit and driven there in style!

Unit 11 is a training unit for the Qatari pilots, and they had arranged a little briefing for us (half of which I missed due to my late arrival...!).

Next, we went to see the place where some of the training aircraft are kept. The trainee Qatari pilots showed and explained how the training happens. We were able to climb up and see the fighter aircraft from close up. It was very interesting and we had some photos taken.

A bus tour was then arranged, of the grounds and air fields of the RAF unit. We also visited the gym facilities in the grounds, which are used for training but can be used by the staff for personal relaxation.

We returned back to the chaplaincy centre for some more tea, cakes and photos and goodbyes were said.

Well, it was around 3:00 pm and time to go home. Our esteemed driver shepherded us all back in the 7-seater and dropped us back safely into our abodes.

The theme of the service was 'Offering Compassion' and it included readings from various faith groups as well as representatives from RAY & YCoS.

### **RELIGIOUS FESTIVALS JULY 2023**



**1** \* July (Saturday) END OF HAJJ Muslim (for details of Hajj, see start date in June)

\* Muslim festivals begin in the evening before the Gregorian dates shown in this calendar.

### 1 July (Saturday) JASHN-E TIRGAN (TIR JASHAN) Zoroastrian (Iranian)

Jashn-e Tirgan is an ancient summer festival, celebrated some three months after the spring NoRuz. Tirgan is devoted to the divinity Tir and is associated with the dog-star Sirius, the coming of the rains in Iran and the fertility they bring. On this day it is customary to visit the Fire Temple to give thanks to Ahura Mazda, and to participate in a *jashan* or thanksgiving ceremony.

### 3 July (Monday) ASALHA PUJA or DHAMMA DAY Buddhist

Dhammacakka day – '*The turning of the wheel of teaching'*. A Theravada celebration of the First Proclamation by Gautama to five ascetics in the Deer Park near Benares. In it he taught the Middle Way, the Noble Eightfold Path and the Four Noble Truths.



### 6 July (Thursday) BIRTHDAY OF HH THE DALAI LAMA Buddhist

### 7 \* July (Friday) EID UL GHADEER / EID-UL-GHADIR [Festival of The Pool] Muslim (Shi'a)

This is a festival observed by Shi'a Muslims, for whom it is an extremely important day. It commemorates an event shortly before the death of the Prophet and his announcement concerning Ali, which they understand to be his clear appointment to be successor to the prophet as the spiritual and temporal leader of Islam.

### 7 (Friday) to 16 (Sunday) July FRAVARDIGAN Zoroastrian (Kadmi)

In the Fravardigan festival the immortal souls, together with their *fravashis* (the guardian spirits of departed ancestors, half man/half bird), come to reside in the place of worship. Many Zoroastrians take time off to pray, recite the five *Gathas* and cleanse their houses. Daily samples of sacred food are tasted by them during the daily ceremonies.



### 10 \* July (Monday) ANNIVERSARY OF THE MARTYRDOM OF THE BAB -1850 - Baha'i

The *Bab* was executed by firing squad in Tabriz, Persia, at noon on this day. The *Bab's* death is commemorated at noon with readings and prayers from the Baha'i Scriptures.

\* Baha'i festivals commence on the evening before the date given



**13 July (Thursday) to 15 (Saturday) O-BON Japanese** (Eastern Japan, including Tokyo. Elsewhere in Japan, celebrated in August).

A Japanese festival when the spirits of the departed are welcomed back home with feasting and dancing. Fires are often lit to illuminate their arrival and departure.



### 17 July (Monday) NAVROZE / NO RUZ Zoroastrian (Kadmi)

New Year's Day on the Shenshai Calendar. By the twentieth century the Parsis of India had become the largest group in the world practising Zoroastrianism, and in the twenty first century over 95% of Zoroastrians in the UK are Parsis. Like their Indian counterparts, they celebrate two new years – giving more time for making merry!



### 19 \* July (Wednesday) AL-HIJRA 1445AH / RA'S UL 'AM (Muharram 1) [Islamic New Year 622CE] Muslim

This day commemorates the Hijra or migration of the Prophet Muhammad from Makkah to Medina in 622 CE, which led to the establishment of the Muslim community there. The day is not universally celebrated amongst Sunni Muslims but is notable as Muslim years are dated from this time and are marked AH (After the Hijrah). In 2022 CE the Muslim year 1444 AH begins.

### <sup>7</sup> 22 July (Saturday) KHORDAD SAL Zoroastrian (Kadmi)

Khordad Sal is the Birthday of Zarathushtra and falls on the sixth day after NoRuz. *Khordad* means perfection and the festival of Khordad Sal symbolically celebrates the birthday of Prophet Zarathushtra. It is customary on this day to visit the Fire Temple, to give thanks to Ahura Mazda for giving humanity the Prophet Zarathushtra, to participate in a *jashan* or thanksgiving ceremony, to listen to stories of the miraculous birth and life of Prophet Zarathushtra, and to share in a happy community meal, a drink and a dance.

### 23 July (Sunday) BIRTHDAY OF HAILE SELASSIE I Rastafarian

One of the holiest days of the Rastafarian year. It is celebrated with *Nyahbinghi* drumming, hymns and prayers.

### 27 \* July (Thursday) TISHA B'AV Jewish

Full day fast mourning the destruction of the first and second Temples in Jerusalem and other tragedies in Jewish history. The Book of Lamentations is read.

\* Jewish festivals commence at sunset on the evening of the day prior to the date shown.



28 \* July (Friday) ASHURA (10th Muharram) Muslim

For Sunni Muslims Ashura is a minor fast observed by the Prophet. Shi'a Muslims recall a great tragedy that took place in AH 61 (680 CE). The Imam Husayn (son of Ali and Fatimah and therefore grandson of the Prophet) was attacked and killed at Karbala (now in Iraq) along with his family and followers by the troops of the Caliph Yazid.
