Have you ever been house-bound? After falling into a window-well at the Kettering Church one snowy evening many years ago, I had to spend months in a wheelchair. Faith Barney, who drove a vehicle equipped for transporting her husband in his mobility chair, offered to take me out in the sunshine one day!

She took me to the bicycle track beside the Miami River. What a joy it was for

me to be outdoors and to have someone to chat with! That act of kindness was second nature to her. She and Silvia Wynne had ministered regularly to shut-ins, usually taking along a whole meal that could be shared between all three of them, or a game to play, or possibly a CD to listen to. Their purpose was to find ways to spend quality time together. So when Buckeye Sue Parks-Shoemaker, invited me to go with herself and Phyllis Williams to visit Faith, formerly the Beavercreek church Buckeye representative, and now a resident at Quaker Heights nursing home, I was very happy to do so!

We found Faith asleep in her wheelchair, parked beside other residents placed in front of the TV in a public area. She could sleep through the chatter on the screen, but awoke at the sound of Sue's voice, familiar to her, as Sue visits her on a regular basis. With the nurse's permission, Sue wheeled Faith back to her room, and read her the birthday card messages we had brought. Faith tried to answer her questions, but the answers were difficult to understand. One word answers worked best. She enjoyed a strawberry from the small bowl of fruit we brought, but needed guidance with the fork.

Faith was very active at Beavercreek Church—was their church organist for many years. So we were not surprised when she smiled when offered to be taken to the piano in this facility. Unfortunately she could not play it, as the footrest of the wheelchair kept her too far away from the keyboard. But we could see she had wanted to try! Instead, Sue played a couple of her favorite hymns, inviting Faith, Phyllis and I to sing. But after the first few bars, Faith's eyes closed. We could see she was getting tired, so back to her room we went!

On our return, Sue searched for a recording of Pastor Delthony Gordon, the pastor of Beavercreek Church, singing "How Great Thou Art" on YouTube. Faith smiled in recognition, though kept her eyes shut while attempting to sing along with him. She definitely perks up when music is involved!

Sue asked Faith if she would like to go back to bed, and Faith nodded, too tired to speak. Sue offered to recite Psalms 91 in closing, and again we watched Faith's lips move as she joined in as best she could before falling asleep. We then closed our visit with a short prayer, and left after letting the nurse know we were leaving and that Faith wanted to be put back in bed.

Time is our most valuable possession—especially to those of us who have already retired. If you are looking for a way to feel useful, needed, and appreciated, may I suggest that visiting these lonely souls is a great way to spend some time!
