## Our Confederate Hero's Buried in Texas



Charles Francis Black, born November 28, 1829, in Lancaster County, SC.

He served as a Private in Co. H, 3<sup>rd</sup> Alabama Infantry.

Private Anthony died January 17, 1900, and is buried in Pine Knot Cemetery in Nacogdoches

**Seven Pines:** Suffered heavy casualties during the battle in June 1862.

**Antietam:** Engaged in one of the bloodiest battles in American history in September 1862.

**Gettysburg:** Fought valiantly on July 1, 1863, with notable losses

**Chancellorsville:** Contributed to the Confederate victory in May 1863, but at a high cost of casualties.

The regiment was known for its fierce fighting spirit and was involved in many critical campaigns, including the **Wilderness, Spottsylvania, and Petersburg.**

## Our Compatriots Ancestors

**General Wayne Carter** (2nd Great Grandfather)  
1819-1879

Pvt, Co., B, 24th Tennessee Sharpshooter Battalion

The 24th Battalion Sharpshooters was formed in May, 1863, with three companies. The men were from Humphreys County and included F. Maney's Artillery Battery. It was assigned to G.E. Maney's and Palmer's Brigade, and in April, 1864, it consolidated with the 34th Regiment. The unit participated in the various campaigns of the Army of Tennessee from Chickamauga to Atlanta, moved with Hood into Tennessee, and was active in North Carolina. It reported 22 casualties of the 39 engaged at Chickamauga, and totalled 48 men and 22 arms in December, 1863. The battalion was included in the surrender on April 26, 1865. Major Frank Maney was in command. Buried unknown in Henderson, TN.

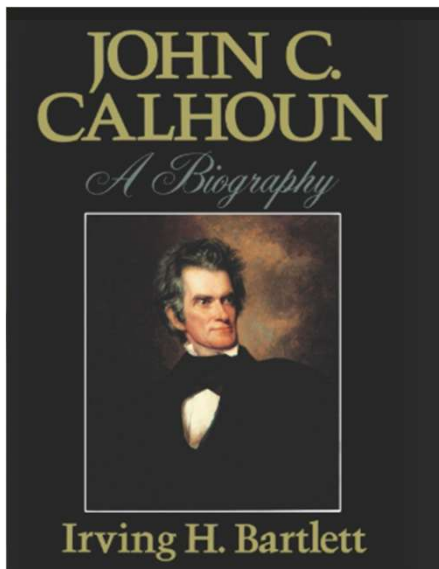
