

GO BAGS CHECKLISTS





1. PRIMARY ESSENTIALS BAG



This is the bag that the person in charge of the evacuation grabs. It contains key documents that may be needed during the emergency.

Valid ID (military/dependent)
Power of Attorney copy (digital + printed)
Emergency contact list (hard copy & phone)
Phone charger + backup battery
Flashlight or headlamp
Extra keys (home, car, mailbox)
\$200 cash (in case of tech outage)
Notebook + pens for quick info capture
Basic first aid kit
USB drive with important files, password-protected



2. ADULT BAGS



Each adult in the household will grab their bag. This contains clothing in their size and style to keep going for 72 hours. These should be labeled with a name and color-coded.

3–5 days of clothes (comfortable, layered)
Comfortable shoes
Ball cap
Toiletries (travel kit or duplicates)
Prescription medications (at least 1 week)
Refillable water bottle
Burner phone



3. CHILD BAGS



Each child in the household will have a bag. The primary will grab the appropriate bags. This contains clothing in their size and style to keep going for 72 hours. These should be labeled with a name and color-coded.

3–5 days of clothes (comfortable, layered)
Comfortable shoes
Toiletries (travel kit or duplicates)
Prescription medications (at least 1 week)
Refillable water bottle
Child ID card copies (school, military, medical)
Copies of custody documents (if relevant)
Emergency pick-up plan (backup person & contact info)
Comfort items: blanket, toy, book
Snacks (non-perishable)
Activity pouch (crayons, puzzle books, etc.)
A recent printed photo of a service member
Parent-out-of-pocket letter ("Open when Mom/Dad is gone")
Medical documents (allergies, IEPs, emergency meds)



4. PET BAGS



Each pet in the household will have a bag. The primary will grab the appropriate bags. This contains food and accessories in the pet's size and type to keep going for 72 hours. These should be labeled with the pet's name and color-coded.

3-7 days of food (dry or canned)

Non-tipping food/water dishes
Cage or carrier for each pet (label with your contact & emergency contact info)
Leash, collar, harness for each pet (attach tags)
+/- Muzzle for each pet (in case of painful injury needing first aid care)
Stakes and tie-outs
Litter pan, litter, litter scoop
Newspaper or puppy pads
Can opener and spoon
Favorite toys, treats, blankets
Mild dish detergent
Hand sanitizer
Paper towels
Trash bags
Flashlight with batteries



5. UTILITY POUCH



Use a bag from a dollar store, such as a makeup bag or a tool bag. It should be compact. Create one bag for each person, regardless of age.

Prescription medications (30+ days) Add these when needed Over-the-counter meds (pain relievers, antacids, cold meds) Chapstick, lotion, sunscreen Eye drops & contact lens supplies (if needed) Earplugs and a sleep mask Small first-aid kit Uniform & Clothing Full uniform sets (per branch/command requirements) Add these when needed if they are worn for your current assignment. Undershirts, socks, and underwear (7+ each) PT gear (shorts, t-shirts, shoes) Cold-weather layers (if needed) Civilian clothes (1–2 sets)

Shower sandals
