Until I grew older and continued to write him more letters, I realized the life I imagined he had was very different from the one he was currently living.

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him know that there is a mother and daughter on the other side of the world who care about him. Wooram would also send me letters, pictures of himself, drawings, and small gifts. Receiving all these trinkets and letters made me realize that not all children my age have the same privileges and chances as others in life.

After several years of writing letters back and forth, we finally had the opportunity to see Wooram. We met up with him as well as the other kids and adults at USC. My mom invited her friend Liz to help with translating his Korean to English for us to understand. My mom was excited to see Wooram for the first time, and I was nervous to see someone I had only been sending letters to for a number of years.

We were getting to know him on the car ride to our destination for dinner. Liz was doing most of the talking while my mom and I tried to have a normal conversation with him using our broken Korean. I

also invited my friends Natalie and Samuel to tag along and make Wooram feel more comfortable and also try talking to him with their limited Korean speaking skills.

We ate at Din Tai Fung where we learned about Wooram's interests and what he hopes to pursue in the future. We finished our dinner and walked around the mall to buy him anything he wanted and to get to know him a little better. Around this time, I started to use Google Translate to help communicate with him.

After dinner and hanging out at the mall, we drove him to the residence he was staying at where we met a few of the founders of Sharing Love in Korea. We were informed about the rest of Wooram's stay in the U.S and the upcoming dinner for all the sponsors and people involved with SLIK.

We attended the dinner a couple days

later, where it was being held at Ann's house, one of the founders. At the party, my mom and I were asked to give a speech about our experience as sponsors. At first, I was reluctant to speak in front of a handful of people, until Ann told me, "Just speak from the heart. These people aren't expecting a perfect speech. As long as you speak from the heart, that's all that matters."

At first, the three kids, Wooram, Gwanggyu, and Ynji were introducing themselves in Korean and a younger gentleman was translating what they were saying to English. After they were done introducing themselves, Yonah, one of the founders, gave my mom the mic to speak about being Wooram's sponsor. My mom started to get emotional while talking about the struggles Wooram faces with the cards he was dealt in life and how he truly has changed our lives for the better. Everyone was emotional and there was not a dry eye in the house.

Then, it was my turn to speak. I walked up to the middle of the backyard and I was handed the same mic. Initially, I began talking about what it was like



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being 8 years old and trying to write letters in Korean with the help of my Grandmother. As I started talking about the toys and trinkets my mom would send along with the letters, I also got emotional.

I said to the audience, "It wasn't the toys, the trinkets, or the countless letters we would send him that made such a huge difference. Sure, the letters let him know there was another child across the world that he could talk to, but it was the fact that all he needed was a friend. Knowing that this friendship would continue for a long time was all that he really needed."

I told the audience that Wooram has forever changed our lives for good. Meeting Wooram after so long made me realize how important being there for someone is. It made me realize how crucial friendship is and how the time you spend doing what you love is so significant. My mom and I are forever thankful for the founders of Sharing Love in Korea and all that they continue to do. We are forever thankful for them bringing Wooram into our lives and giving us the opportunity for Wooram to be able to call us his family.



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
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Letter from Korea: "We returned home safely"

From Gwanggyu - In the U.S., I noticed how often people express even small things by saying "thank you" and "sorry," and it made me want to become someone who does the same. This was my very first time traveling abroad and now I understand why people say we should travel. I used to wonder what it meant when people said travel broadens your perspective, but now I think I finally understand.

I will never forget this grace, and I will carry it with me as a source of strength in my life, working hard as I move forward...Thank you always, and I will continue to pray every day.
