

The Economic Pulse of Río Negro: Key **Sectors and Business Horizons**

Agriculture & Food Processing

- **Fruit production powerhouse:** Argentina is one of the world's top producers of pome fruits, ranking second globally in pear production—surpassed only by China—and 15th in apple production. In 2022, the province of Río Negro accounted for an impressive 82% of the country's total apple and pear harvest, according to official national statistics. The Alto Valle region (e.g., Villa Regina, General Roca) supports major canning, bottling, and juice concentrate industries.
- Value-added processing: The province's industrial parks offer expansion potential in food processing, wine, and sparkling wine production.



🖺 Energy & Hydrocarbons

- LNG export hub development:
 - A joint YPF-Petronas plant at Punta Colorada/Sierra Grande is underway, with \$10 billion in investments planned over 10 years.

- A new pipeline linking Vaca Muerta to Punta Colorada is expected by late 2026– 2027 under the RIGI Incentives framework.
- Petroleum export terminal and pipeline: <u>YPF</u> plans a <u>mega-port & pipeline</u> from Vaca Muerta via Sierra Grande, generating ~4,000 jobs and targeting 2025 operations.
- Shale and pipeline investment incentives: Federal support (e.g. under Milei's RIGI) has opened doors for exploration and infrastructure.

♦ Renewable & Green Hydrogen

- Green hydrogen ecosystem growth:
 - o <u>Fortescue Future Industries</u> has announced a multibillion-dollar green <u>hydrogen</u> venture in Río Negro.
 - o <u>Provincial strategy</u> includes wind and solar farms (e.g., 300 MW windphase + hydrogen plant).
 - o Partnerships with <u>CONICET</u>, local universities, and <u>global firms</u> (ABO Wind, FFI) drive value chain development.
- Infrastructure & industrial parks:
 - A 50-hectare <u>industrial park</u> in Los Menucos is being tailored for green-hydrogenlinked manufacturing.
 - o Strategic alignment is sought with federal hydrogen roadmaps and regulatory frameworks.

Manufacturing & Industrial Infrastructure

- **Industrial parks:** Los Menucos and <u>Villa Regina</u> host modern infrastructure aimed at sectors like wind turbine components, food processing, and hydrogen tech.
- Rail & logistics: Revived freight/passenger rail lines (<u>Tren Patagónico</u>, Tren del Valle) support supply chain flows across the province.

SME Growth & Competitiveness

- IDB-backed SME support: A US \$51.9 million IADB loan focuses on modernizing SMEs for export competitiveness.
- Corporate & business tourism: The Alto Valle–Neuquén corridor is evolving as a corporate tourism center, with demand for event venues and business travel services.

© Key Business Opportunities

- 1. Agribusiness expansion: Projects in fruit processing, wine, and juice concentrate.
- 2. **LNG & petroleum infrastructure:** Engineering, port/logistics, supply chain, and construction services.
- 3. **Green hydrogen & renewables:** Manufacturers of electrolyzers, wind/solar components, plus operations & maintenance.
- 4. **SME modernization:** Technology providers, exports-oriented business incubators, consulting for competitiveness.
- 5. **Corporate tourism:** Event centers, travel services, and hospitality businesses in strategic hubs (Bariloche, Roca).

Enablers & Considerations

- **Investment incentives:** <u>RIGI</u> provides tax & regulatory stability for large projects in energy and mining.
- **Policy backing:** Adoption of federal hydrogen strategy, connectivity infrastructure planning, and sustainability commitments.
- Labor & skills: Local talent through <u>University of Río Negro</u> and technical training in green-hydrogen, agritech, and industrial domains.
- Environmental & social sensitivity: Projects must navigate wildfire risks, indigenous rights, and ecological impacts.
