Renata has now moved over to the hapū Asset Development Company to help secure and grow future assets. This strategic move aims to ensure our sustained success for the future as we move towards Hapū Mana Motuhake.

We are delighted to welcome Jaime Solomon and Jenny Mauger to our team, joining Patricia Nuku in the Pou Taiao and Sustainability Pou. Their expertise and dedication in this field are invaluable assets that significantly enhance our efforts towards recovery and future planning.

Over the past few months, we have witnessed a flurry of activity both within our office and out in the community. These efforts are all geared towards serving the current generation while building on the work of our predecessors, with the ultimate goal of enabling future generations to achieve their aspirations.

We saw the motu come together on 31 May at Te Kāreti, Omahu Marae, for the Hui Taumata ki Kahungunu, which more than 3000 people attended. At this hui, the seeds of what could become a new model for Kotahitanga, or a Māori Parliament, were sown before the motu.

On 21 June, Te Piringa Hapū was acknowledged at the 2024 Matariki Living Taonga Awards, hosted by Te Taiwhenua o Heretaunga. We received the Te Haaro o Te Kahu—Mākirikiri Supreme Award, nominated by the Te Haaro Board.

This event was well attended by our also celebrated the whānau, who success of Jordan Winiata, acknowledged for his Selfless Service, Vicky Jones (nee Wona), acknowledged for Kaumātua Health and Wellbeing.

This month, Piringa Hapū Te implement community а communications strategy with the aim of communicating more regularly with you all. We will also invite other community groups in our takiwā to update, present, or to just be present with us all.

Housing Repairs Programme

Te Puni Kōkiri and Te Whatu Ora funding for repairs to flood damaged houses has allowed Te Piringa Hapū to repair approximately 33 uninsured homes. Damage has varied from removing silt from beneath houses and insulating to full strip out of interiors, replacing kitchens, bathrooms, full paint and new flooring.

Healthy homes is in the forefront of our thinking when we plan repair work. All whānau deserve warm and dry homes, especially for our tamariki and kaumātua. Where possible, we insulate under homes, in ceiling spaces and exterior walls. We also install heat pumps, wood burners and ventilation systems where required.

Six building crews are carrying out the repair work alongside plumbers, electricians and other sub-trades.

The repair programme is well past the halfway mark, the home stretch is in sight. The programme of work will finish before the end of 2024.

TRANSITIONAL HOUSING PROJECT.

Hapū-led, Government enabled

Look at what we've achieved together! Eleven sparkling new whare have arrived on our marae grounds! This is the fruit of our collective labour, built with heart by Ngāti Kahungunu Iwi and generously funded by the Ministry of Business Innovation & Employment. We're working handin-hand with the TW Group who is carrying the on-site work, and we're on track to wrap up by the end of October!

Our Te Piringa Hapū welfare team is in constant kõrero with MBIE to ensure we've got whānau lined up, ready to move into their new whare in early November. This is our community, our whānau, our journey. We're in this together, and together, we're making a difference.











Cabins

Ngati Kahungunu Iwi (NKII) has landed 50 cabins in Omahu. These cabins were fully funded by the Ministry of Housing and Urban Development. There is one yet to be landed.

Whānau have been offered the cabins to purchase at very good prices, much less than the cost to purchase along with the services and access landings/stairs. Most whānau have accepted the offer to purchase.

Even though we have 50 cabins, more are needed. Who knows, the government may look at funding more cabins in the future.

The cabins have been allowed onto flood affected whenua under an Order In Council. This Government mechanism

allows NKII to temporarily bypass the resource consent and building consent processes. This all changes in August 2026. All cabins that require consents must have these conditions met by this date.

NKII has promised to assist whānau in getting their cabins fully consented.

WHAREKARAKIA & URUPA

Since February 14th, we have been dedicated to recovering and restoring our sacred place of worship and cemetery. We are happy to share that after thorough negotiations with the insurance provider, the insurance claim has been approved. We will collaborate with the community to restore the place of worship, memorial wall, and cemetery. We hope to have this restoration project complete over this year.

ARCHIVING MĀTAURANGA-Ā-HAPŪ

Our team has dedicated efforts to protecting our mātauranga, whakapapa and oral traditions by promptly archiving and compiling our knowledge for preservation for the upcoming generations.

At present, our primary focus is on transcribing and sharing the Māori Land Court records from the 1800s.

While we are in the initial phases of establishing our archive, we encourage anyone interested in researching genealogy, customs, or our knowledge to reach out for assistance.

SHARE YOUR MEMORIES

As a part of preserving our tribal memory we welcome urī to get in touch with us if you would like to contribute a korero to our archiving project. We are currently working through and getting in touch with our kaumatua, but welcome all.

UPCOMING WĀNANGA

Te Wānanga o Kahukuranui is set to kick off this year with 3 wānanga on Te Reo and Tikanga of our kāenga.

We will be putting out information and registrations for these wananga in the coming few weeks.

NGARURORO AWA RESEARCH HUI SUMMARY

Scott Wilson: Hydrogeologist, Lincoln Agritech Dr Jo Hoyle: River Geomorphologist, NIWA Richard Measures: Hydrodynamic Scientist, NIWA Ngaio Tiuka, Shade Smith NKII Taiao & Marei Apatu TToH.

The Ngaruroro awa research hui, held on the 1st of July at Omahu, provided an opportunity for Scott Wilson and his team to present their five-year scientific research on the Ngaruroro awa. They emphasized the necessity of protecting the aquifer recharge area at Roys Hill, creating space for rivers to widen,

establishing flood runoff areas river, and implementing wetland projects to safeguard the river's braided system. Additionally, they stressed the importance of overseeing any industrial activities on the river, such as gravel extraction holding them to HBRC policy & process, protecting our taonga species and ensuring our well-being.

Whānau engaged in the hui by adjusting maps to show areas for river widening and providing feedback on their selections. The hui was successful in engaging our whānau and strengthening meaningful discussions.





SAMOAN HIGH COMMISSIONER VISITS OMAHU MARAE

High Commissioner Afamasaga Faamatalaupu Toleafoa of Samoa was formally welcomed onto Omahu Marae on July 31st

He requested a discussion with our whānau to assess how prepared our hapū was for disasters, how we responded post-Cyclone Gabrielle, and our current recovery efforts, including the Utaina 10-year recovery plan.

A presentation by our General Manager was shown to the High Commissioner, his wife, and his visitors. Whānau from our hapū also attended the hui.

For the Samoan Commissioner, this visit underscored the importance of maintaining our relationship and recognizing the significant work that has been done to reach our current state. They emphasized the need for clear communication, especially since communication resources can fail during major events. Therefore, it is crucial to focus on preparation beforehand.








UP COMING HUI UPDATING OUR EMERGENCY RESPONCE PLANS!

Pou Taiao and Pou Tangata will be working with whānau to update our emergency response data. This includes ensuring we have accurate contact details, the number of whānau members per home, and identifying those needing urgent medical assistance.

In preparation for potential future disasters, we aim to develop whānau plans that align with our overall hapū plan. All the information collected will help us frame an emergency plan that will safeguard our community.

Following on from this work we are looking to bring the Hikurangi Trench roadshow to socialise it with Hapu.

OTAGO UNIVERSITY SCIENCE WĀNANGA

Otago University, in collaboration with TMT, will run a Pūtaiao Wānanga at Omahu Marae in September. Invitations have been sent to select kura, allowing their rangatahi to attend. This event has been running for the

past ten years, targeting future Māori scientists.
The focus this year will be on our river (monitoring), whenua (soil), air quality, and eDNA testing. This will provide mana whenua with all the data collected during the week.

My name is Jaime Tuihana Solomon, no ngā whānau Hakiwai, Tutaki, Rongotoa, I grew up down 4 Ngahiriwa place.

During my childhood, I attended Omahu kura and enjoyed countless days swimming with my cousins in our beautiful awa, at our marae and around our community - such fond memories!

I have a background in manaakitanga, where I assist whānau in navigating their trauma using indigenous models like Tā Mason Durie's Te Whare Tapa Whā. This holistic framework has four equal dimensions, providing a strong foundation for healing.

The impact of Cyclone Gabrielle left our whānau and whenua severely affected, causing immense devastation within our community.

I feel **privileged** to collaborate with Patricia Nuku in our shared commitment to **caring for and serving our people** through the **Pou Taiao workstream.**

Our commitment lies in safeguarding our Taiao (environment), integrating

- both traditional Mātauranga (indigenous knowledge)and scientific ecological methods. Through this holistic approach, we monitor and manage our natural resources."
- Ensuring our cultural values and practices as a whānau are integrated into environmental policies and management plans at all levels.
- Assisting our whānau in preparedness and response to any emergency.

'Te toto o te tangata, he kai; te oranga o te tangata, he whenua' (while food provides the blood in our veins, our health is drawn from the land).
