

## **New York**

Many more walk up to me to say that they are already certified as pollinator or wildlife gardens!

We're taking a simple approach to encouraging the formation of these gardens. We are developing a survey that will go to each club in order to identify how many pollinator / wildlife gardens FGCNYS already has in New York. That survey will also ask which organization certified the gardens. We will create a state map so we can understand the extent of current coverage and monitor additions.

Concurrently, we are preparing guidelines on the qualifications for designation as a pollinator / wildlife garden and on the process for applying for such a certification.

We're looking into developing simple signs that can be posted in each garden so that passers-by understand that they are looking at specialized gardens that benefit everyone. We hope that such visible signs of helping the environment will lead to increased membership, especially to developing opportunities to Plant the Seeds of Growth by encouraging activities for children and youth.

In addition to the pollinator / wildlife gardens, we are exploring the feasibility of our members becoming involved in some citizen scientist activities in conjunction with Cornell University.

We are gearing up for the fall planting season, with community window boxes to plant, personal and communal gardens to put to bed for the season, annual and holiday luncheons to celebrate our gardening season and our friendships.

# Xeriscaping

Our weather in the Central Atlantic Region has been redundant the past two years, although this summer has felt a little more sauna-like-above 80 degrees and humid with very little rain. What is a gardener to do?

Practice Xeriscaping! This is not zero-scaping. You can still plant an abundance of plants, just make sure they will survive climate conditions. Here are some Perennials that will not only survive when planted properly but will adorn your gardens with their jewel-like hues.

#### **Kniphofhia or Red-Hot Poker**

They stand out in your garden with their bright colors, love the sun and are drought resistant. It spreads about 3' and 5' tall, a perfect back of the border plant. They are deer resistant.

### Hylotelephium telephium or Orphine (Stonecrop)

Also called witches' moneybags, a succulent that has edible flowers and leaves when young. Most of you are familiar with 'Herbstfreude' Autumn Joy. This brings beautiful color to a fall garden.

## Euphorbia or Spurge

There are hundreds off varieties of this drought resistant plant. It also thrives in dry shade. I have grown *Euphorbia* in zone 5-6 but it really thrives in zone 7. This is a front of the border plant with tiny flowers and spreads easily if you want to cover a large area.

What else to entice you? **Eryngium**-Sea Holly, **Salvia patens**, **Oenothera lindheimeri**-Gaura 'whirling

Butterflies' and **Amsonia hubrichtii** or thread-leaf blue star which tolerates deer and clay soil.

If you're like me, you can't go to a garden center without coming home with a multitude of plants that you never intended to buy but "will find a place for." Garden centers can be helpful in providing growing information and options for your garden.

The contest rules are simple:

- \*Children in 4th through 8th grade are eligible
- \*Sculptures must consist of recyclable, reused and reduced materials
- \*Width of the sculpture can be no more than 8 ½ X 11 inches and height should be in proportion to width
- \*Entries may include as many photographs as can be printed on the back of the entry form, but two 4x6 photographs are recommended. THE SCULPTURE ITSELF IS NOT SUBMITTED.
- \*Entries must be sent to your <u>State Youth Chairman</u> observing State Deadlines.
- \*The State Youth Chairman sends the <u>state first</u> <u>place winner</u> to me, CAR-SGC NGC Youth

Sculpture Contest Chair after the selection has been made.

The Entry Form is on the NGC website and is easy to complete. In addition to name and contact information, list of materials used, describe the sculpture in 3-5 sentences, send photographs and that's it.

Certificates of Appreciation will be distributed at the October CAR-SGC Conference in Maryland to all those creative students who participated in the sculpture contest.

# Winter Survival -A New Paradigm

Although classic thinking in biology has long assumed a given wildlife species relies primarily on one of the 3 main strategies for winter survival migration, dormancy or cold resistance - that paradigm is beginning to change. In 2022, biologist Gloria Auteri published a paper presenting a new concept for looking at cold-survival strategies. She suggests that rather than relying on a single survival tactic, many animals depend on 2 or 3 strategies. This theory was prompted by her 10-year study of Bats. "A lot of species use at least 2 strategies pretty heavily: hibernating and migrating," she says. Big brown and silver-haired bats undertake southward migrations- either long or short trips, depending on the location of their summer habitats- which means they can decrease the amount of time they spend hibernating in winter.

In talking with other scientists, she found that bats weren't the only animals using multiple strategies. While some species may rely heavily on a single approach, many others including birds and small mammals mix and match, optimize a balance that works best for them. Auteri said if you looked closely enough at any animal, most of them are using all 3 strategies to some degree. "It's a pretty big shift for us as scientists."

Hummingbirds are prime examples of winter survival skills that scientists are just beginning to understand.

Looking more closely, some birds actually shift their internal body temperatures more than was thought by entering short-term spells of dormancy known as torpor. Nighthawks, poorwills and related species as well as hummingbirds are adopting this survival trick. Hummingbirds even in good times require large supply of calories relative to their body size. Torpor is a versatile, energy-saving mechanism for them says biologist, Erich Eberts. New thinking about winter survival strategies leads to a brighter outlook for other wildlife. Hummingbirds along with other species are changing their strategies by trading things off and just thrive in so many different environments. Because they are so flexible, Eberts and other scientists expect will apply to more and more wildlife in the future.

A minimum of 20 quality herbaceous perennials in a section or class are eligible for consideration. Botanical and clear names photographs of exhibits with staging are The required. application is not to exceed 3 single pages.

# Dahlia Shows This Fall In CAR Where are they and How do you enter them?

One of my favorite seasons is the fall, not just because the weather cools off and the foliage is brilliant, but because my garden is bursting with dahlias of all sizes, shapes and colors and I can hardly wait to volunteer at the Greater Philadelphia Dahlia Show. We are fortunate that Longwood Gardens hosts our Society's Dahlia Show every year – what a gorgeous setting for a flower show!

The American Dahlia Society lists all the states' upcoming Dahlia Shows and can be found at https://www.dahlia.org/. If you are not familiar with dahlias, I think you will be amazed at the range of shapes and forms of dahlias. You may be familiar with the stunning dinner plate dahlias or the perfectly symmetrical ball and pompom dahlias, but do you know there are 14 different forms of dahlias? Have you heard of the mignon singles, collarettes, orchettes or orchids?

Perhaps you would like to enter some of your lovely dahlias in a show near you? Entering a dahlia show is similar to entering an NGC Flower Show, but I have learned that there are some differences:

- The Dahlia Society typically supplies all the containers. Transport your dahlias carefully to the show and transfer them into the containers provided. (This may not be true at all dahlia shows.)
- The entry cards require different information than our standard flower show entry cards.
   Dahlias are classified by size, form and color.
   This information must be provided on each entry card. To learn more, watch this 2 minute video: https://www.youtube.com /watch?v=pRX5m3t1ouE
- 3. Each dahlia is assigned a 4 digit numerical code
  -the numbers symbolize the size, form and
  color. This number can be found in the Dahlia
  Classification & Handbook, which will be
  available at check-in at
  https://www.dahlia.org/shop/2025classification-and-handbook-of-dahliasship-tous-only/or purchased

There are typically experienced dahlia society members ready to help you complete your entry cards, but you should come prepared with the name of the dahlia, the size and the form. With that information, an experienced member will be able to look up the 4 digit code you need to put on the form. 4. If you are relatively new to growing your dahlias, you may wish to enter the show in Division 4 entitled "Small Growers." BE SURE TO REQUEST SMALL GROWER ENTRY CARDS. "A SMALL GROWER grows plants for pleasure, does not sell for a profit, has never been employed as a gardener, and grows less than 75 dahlias."

If you've never been to a dahlia show, TREAT YOURSELF! The dahlias will DAZZLE YOU!
