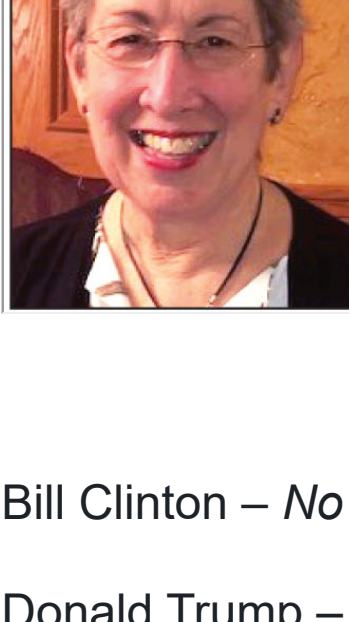

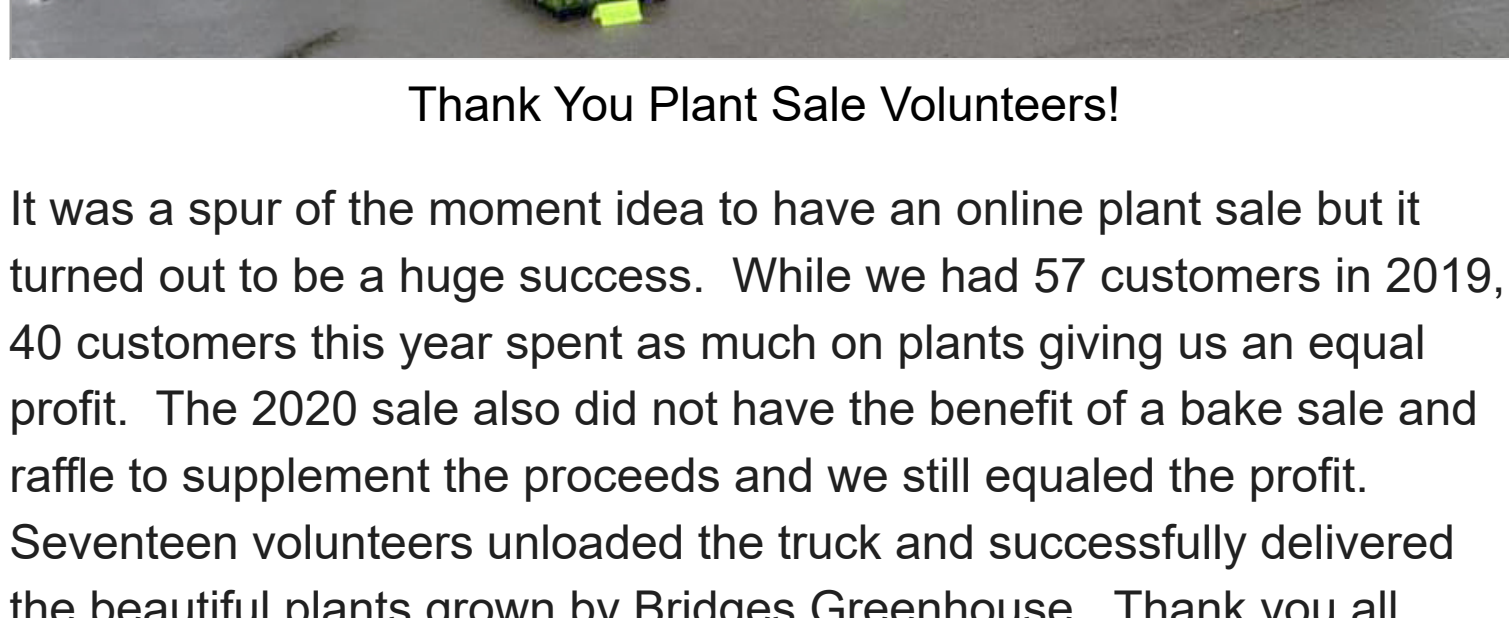
Jimmy Carter – *We are responsible for creating a world of peace and equality for ourselves and future generations.*

THE 2020 PLANT SALE



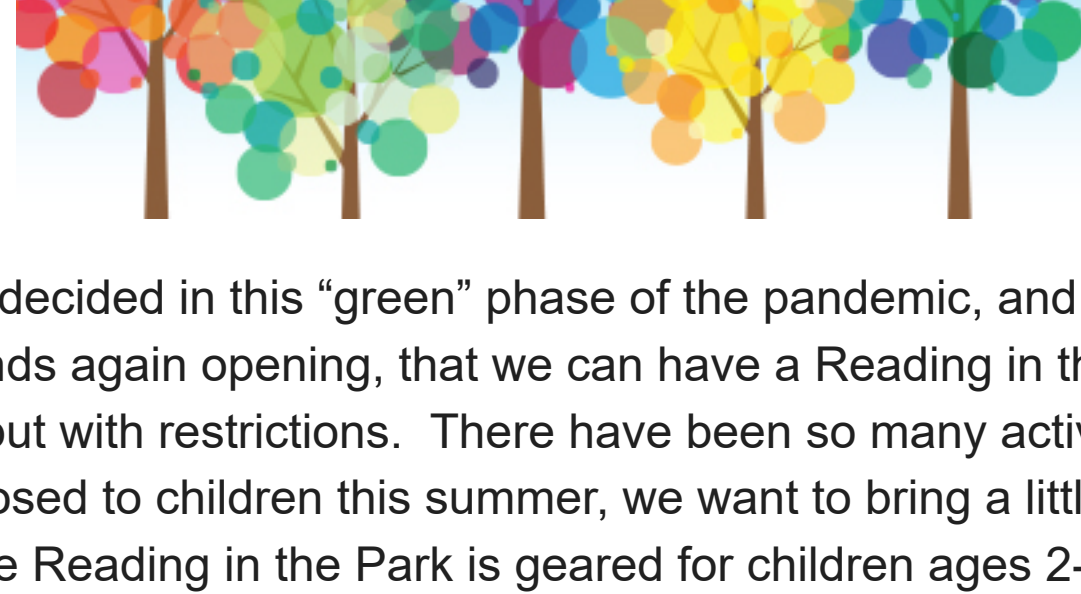
Thank You Plant Sale Volunteers!

It was a spur of the moment idea to have an online plant sale but it turned out to be a huge success. While we had 57 customers in 2019, 40 customers this year spent as much on plants giving us an equal profit. - Masks are encouraged but not mandatory. Penn Hills parks are now open, so the playground will be open. We will have hand sanitizer available to help keep germs to a minimum.

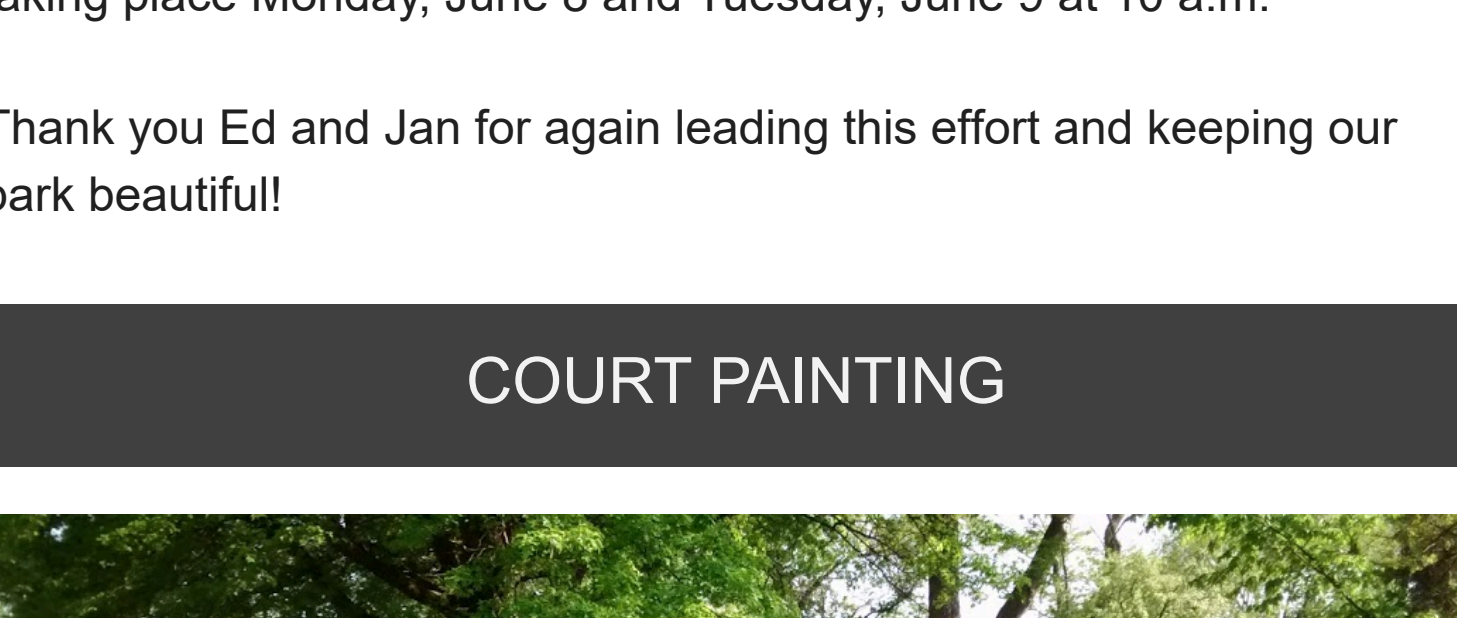

Craft: Ocean zone sensory bottle

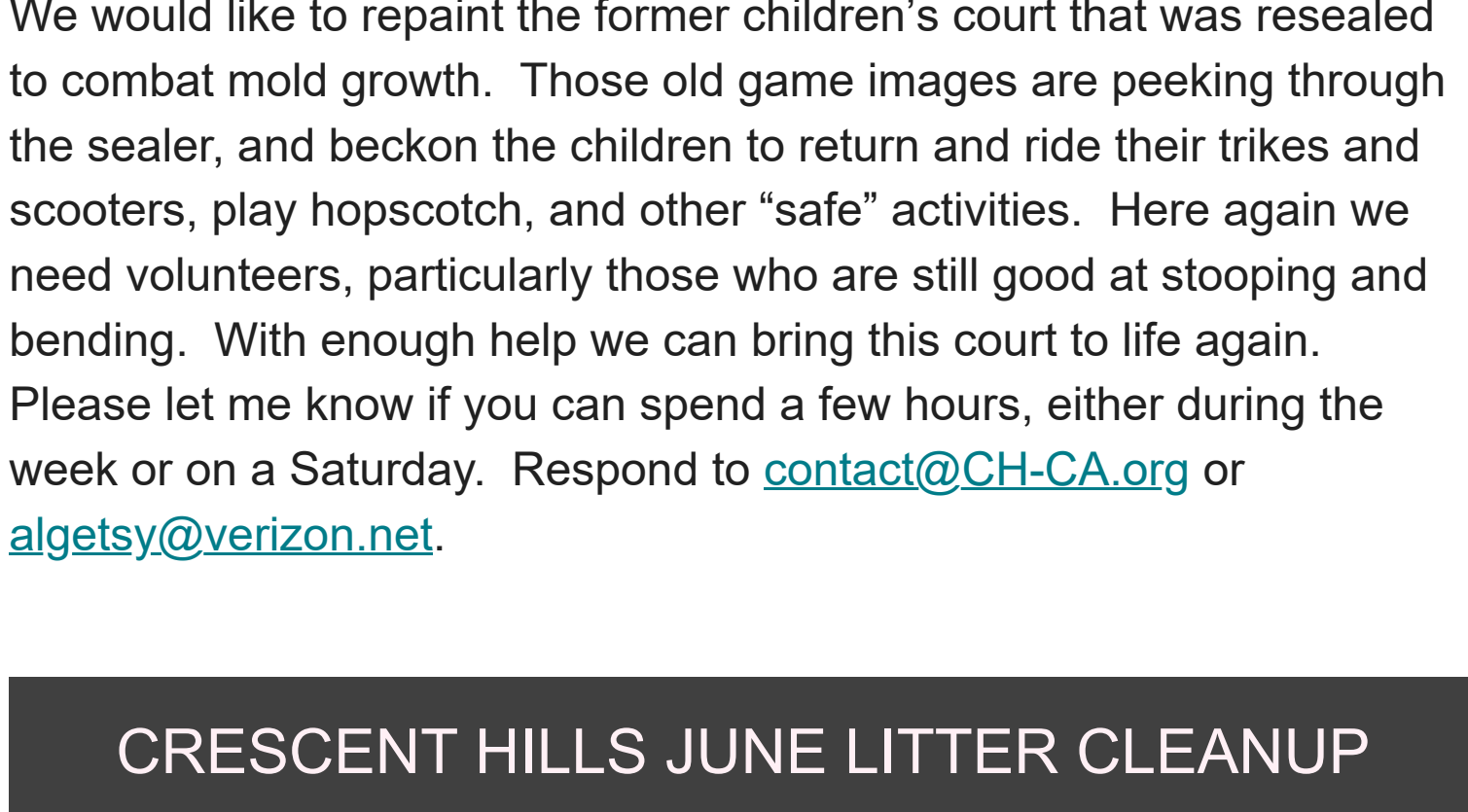
HELP REPAINT PLAYGROUND?

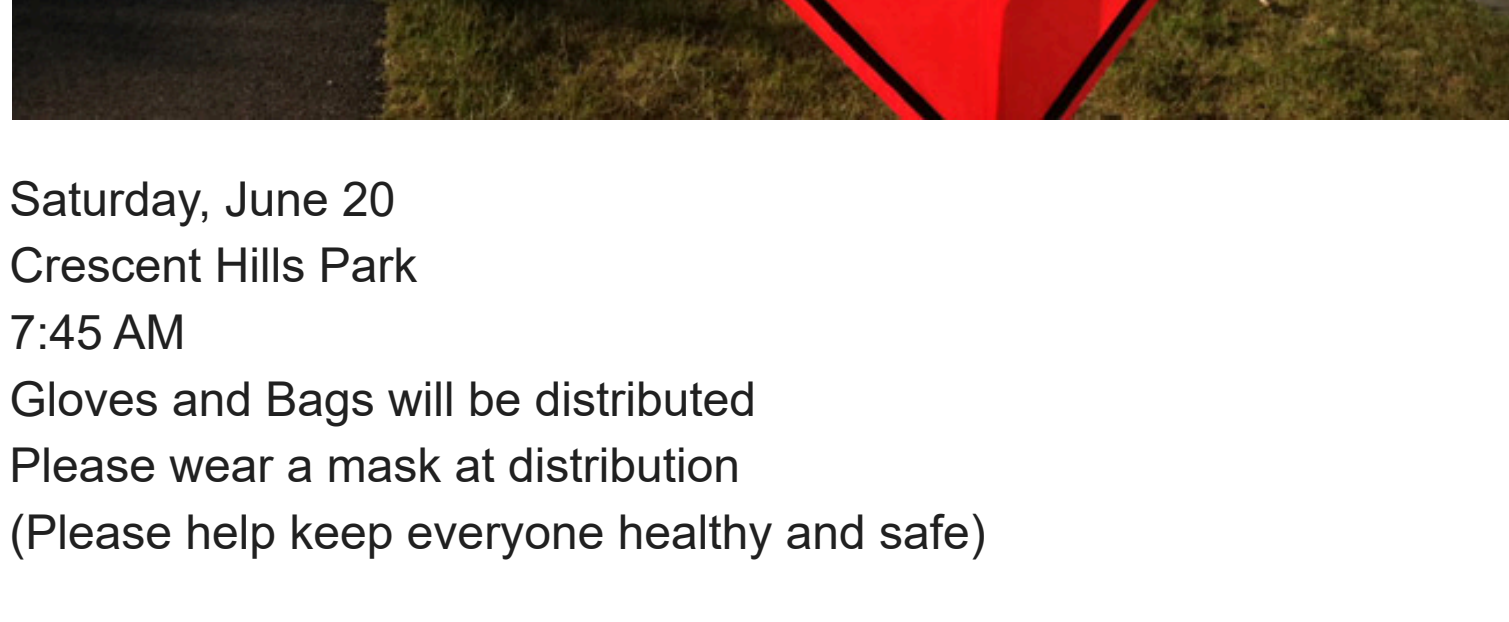
Thank you Ed and Jan for again leading this effort and keeping our park beautiful!

The bottom half of Lime Hollow RD. is closed due to construction and was cleaned in early May.

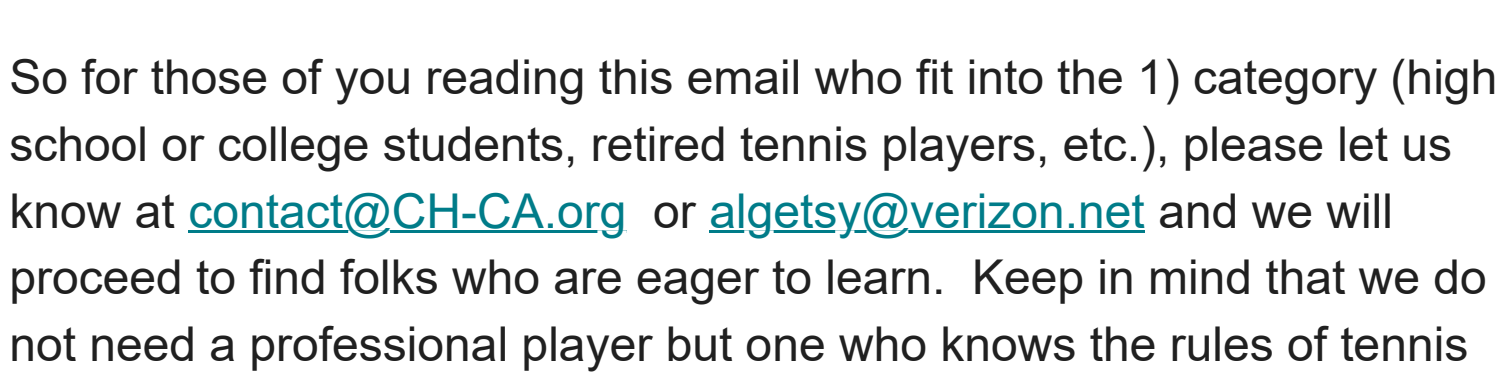

TENNIS ANYONE?



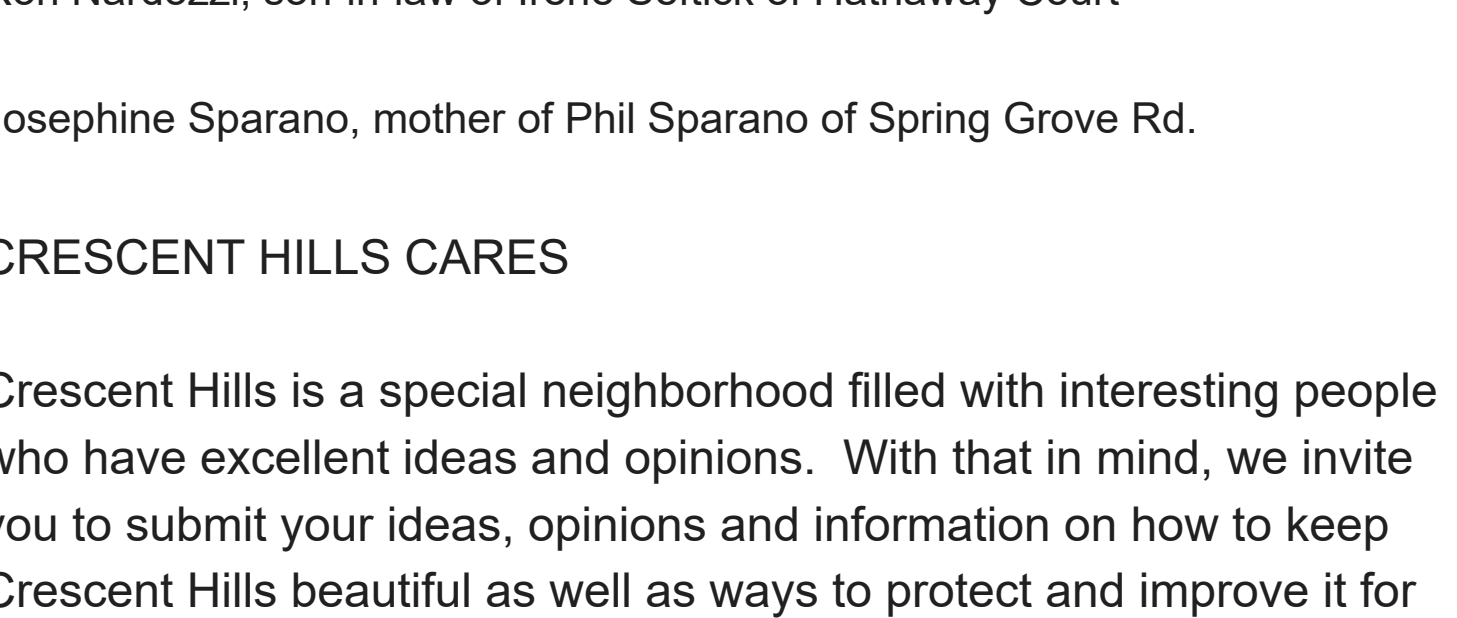
We know our tennis court is not in the best shape, but it still could be used to teach young folk (ages 7 to 10) how to play this "safe" outdoor sport. We can do this, if:

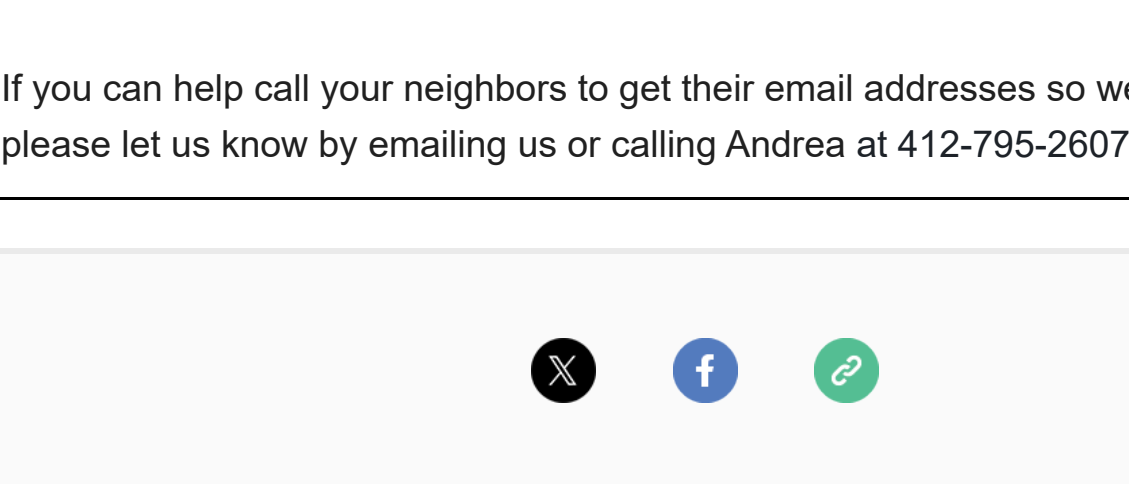
